

OFFICIAL OREGON TO BE PROMINENT BY ITS ABSENCE

Johnson's Proposed Reception in
Portland Doesn't Bring Re-
sponsive Echo From Salemites.

MANY NOT EVEN INVITED

Olcott Undetermined, Brown Is
Busy and Supreme Court Jus-
tices Have Various Alibis.

Salem, Oct. 4.—Very few state officials included in the list of those on the list to receive Senator Hiram Johnson of California on his visit to Portland next Tuesday were aware of the honor that had been conferred upon them this evening. And very few who were approached on the subject were inclined to leave matters of state to hear the senator lambaste the League of Nations. Not a one of the entire list could be found who would openly endorse the stand taken by the California solon and his cohorts in their fight against the league.

Attorney General George M. Brown was the only official in the entire list who had been officially notified of the Johnson reception. Brown expects to hear Johnson in his speech at the Auditorium, but will not be able to attend the luncheon because of press of state business.

GOVERNOR UNDETERMINED

H. H. Corey of the public service commission is in favor of a league of nations, and wants to hear both sides of the argument before making up his mind on the league, so he will attend the Portland meeting.

Governor Olcott was unable to say whether he would be able to attend the reception or not.

Justice H. J. Bean of the supreme court will not be able to attend because of court business. Neither will Justice Burnett have time to greet the vociferous Californian. Justices Benson and Bennett were not sufficiently informed on the plans for the Johnson meeting to express themselves. None of the justices, true to their judicial training, would express themselves regarding their attitude toward Johnson's stand on the League of Nations. Justice Johnson was in Portland, and Chief Justice McBride could not be located.

BUCHTEL TO BE ABSENT

Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the public service commission, will not be able to attend the reception, and William A. Marshall, chairman of the industrial accident commission, as well as Labor Commissioner Grant, are both in the East and will not return in time for the meeting.

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of instruction, who has been with teachers' institutes that he was not aware of the date of the Johnson visit, as was also the case with Percy A. Cuper, state engineer.

State Treasurer Hoff is in Marshfield for several days, and A. C. Barber, state insurance commissioner, is also out of the city.

To say the least Oregon officialdom will not be very largely represented at the luncheon table at which Johnson is the guest of honor, unless there is some radical change in attitudes before Tuesday evening.

could hardly act as a member of the reception committee.

"I do not care for Senator Johnson's method of attack," James B. Kerr declared, in declining committee membership.

Much the same sentiment was expressed by Charles H. Carey, who said: "I do not like Johnson's unstatesmanlike arguments."

All of which is contradictory to the statement of Thomas Mannix, chairman of the committee on arrangements, that 90 per cent of the invitations sent out by his committee had been accepted. A large majority of those named on the committee had not been advised of their selection for the honor Saturday afternoon.

Others who offered statements regarding their membership on the reception committee are quoted below.

Federal Judge Charles Wolverton: "I have notified the chairman that I can not act as a member of the reception committee for the visit of Senator Johnson. My first reason is that I shall be in Southern Oregon on Tuesday."

Federal Judge Robert S. Bean: "I had not been advised that my name was on the published reception committee and have had no word to that effect from the chairman."

Dr. Edward Ziegenfuss: "I haven't followed Johnson's speeches very closely. If he comes here to make a fair and square attack on the League of Nations, I'll be glad to serve on the reception committee. But if I find he's here for mudslinging, I won't serve. As yet I haven't received notification I was to be a welcome committee member."

IMPOSSIBLE, SAYS FLEISCHNER
I. N. Fleischner—It will be impossible

for me to meet Senator Johnson.
W. Y. Masters—I haven't received any invitation yet, but it will be all right to let my name stand on the list.
Ethel Metachan, Mrs. Metachan—My wife is out of the city, but her name may remain on the committee.

Fredrick H. Drake—You place me in a rather unusual position. I haven't received an invitation and until that arrives it will be impossible for me to decide. In the meantime, my name should be taken off the committee list.

James B. Kerr—Think I'll decline. I don't believe in anti-League of Nations controversy. Neither do I care for Senator Johnson's method of attack.

Charles H. Carey—I have declined to meet Senator Johnson. I am glad to be out of the city. I am on my way to Bend to attend the session of the state federation.

GLAD TO BE AWAY
Otto R. Hartwig, President of the State Federation of Labor—I was not aware of the honor of being selected to meet Senator Johnson. I am glad to be out of the city. I am on my way to Bend to attend the session of the state federation.

Eugene E. Smith, editor of Labor Opinion and member of the legislature, is in Washington, D. C., attending the labor conference.

R. E. Clanton, Master Fish Warden—Tuesday I will be in Tillamook. This is not to evade the question, however, for I will be in the city on Wednesday and serve on the committee in the belief that every man should be given a fair hearing.

W. D. McWaters—Depends whether or not I'll be in town. If I am in Portland, I'll be glad to welcome Johnson.

Charles C. Hindman, Former Deputy City Attorney—I will welcome Johnson. An spirit of fair play demands we hear both sides of the League of Nations controversy.

Arthur O. Jones, Assistant Cashier First National Bank—All I know about my being on the Johnson welcome committee is what a friend told me. I saw my name in a newspaper. But I'll be glad to act on the reception committee.

C. H. Weston, President of the C. H. Weston Co.—What will my duties be on such a committee? I have not been notified of my selection. I may accept.

Mrs. C. W. Hopkins—I will have visitors that day and will not be able to act on the committee. I want my name left out.

S. C. Spencer—I will be out of the city Tuesday, so it will be impossible to serve on the reception committee.

Jay Bowerman—I have not been notified of my appointment on the committee. As to the question at issue, I have taken no stand either in favor of the treaty as it exists nor of the amendments proposed by Johnson and the other senators. Some reservations could be made, I believe, without sacrificing the spirit or efficiency of the covenant of the League of Nations.

DOESN'T KNOW JOHNSON
Dr. J. F. Donnelly—I am a Democrat in politics. I am not a member of the committee and I know nothing about Senator Johnson which would induce me to become a member.

Grant Phegley—I noticed my name in the published list of members of the committee and I guess I'll have to serve.

Sam Solomon—This is the first notification I have had of my appointment to this committee. I have no idea what is expected of me and have no intention of serving on the committee. As for my opinion of the League of Nations, I am strong for American interests and would favor any reservation which promises to insure this country against entanglements in the affairs of other nations. It is essential to the commercial interests of the United States that the treaty of peace be signed quickly as possible.

Presiding Judge Gates—I am for Wilson and the League of Nations. I have declined to serve on the reception committee.

District Judge Bell—Would not serve if I could. Am in favor of the League of Nations.

Circuit Judge Kavanaugh—I may not agree with everything Hiram Johnson stands for, but will serve on the committee because I believe we owe it to him as a guest of the city.

County Commissioner Ralph W. Hoyt—I will be very glad to serve.

I'LL SERVE, SAYS MUCK
County Commissioner A. A. Muck—Johnson is one of our coming men. I will serve.

Circuit Judge Robert Tucker—I will be out of town and do not wish to express an opinion as to whether or not I would serve.

District Judge Dayton—Will be unable to serve because of court work, but want to hear Johnson.

Dan J. Maloney—Am quite in sympathy with Johnson. Will serve gladly.

Franklin T. Griffith—I noticed my name in the newspaper, that's all I know. I don't care to discuss the matter—I've got troubles enough as it is.

M. H. Butler—I'll have to think it over. This is the first I've heard of it.

E. V. Littlefield—It all depends on the source of the appointment as to what action I shall take. I won't agree to anything that will help break up the League of Nations.

CALIFORNIA CALLS RUDEEN
Charles S. Rudeen—Leave me out. I'm going to California.

Rosa Plummer—I won't serve on this.

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Europe's Gifts to Wilson to Be Listed For Use of Congress

Washington, Oct. 4.—(U. S. A.)—A complete inventory of the gifts received by President Wilson during his stay in Europe is being prepared at the White House, it was stated today, and will be forwarded to congress probably next week.

The White House inventory, it was said, will show that the intrinsic value of the presents was negligible, and that they were taken with the knowledge and tacit consent of Attorney General Palmer and Secretary of State Lansing, who assured the president that their acceptance was in violation of no law.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Oct. 4.—(U. S. A.)—Twenty-five union men, representing the Oregon Short Line and the Denver and Rio Grande shophmen, marched on the legislature today in protest against consideration of any bill repealing the law which permits picketing.

Repeal of the law has been requested by the foremost civic and commercial bodies of the state.

The shophmen presented a petition to the governor protesting any such action. It bore 1500 signatures.
