

DRAINING OF LAKES RESULTS IN DEATH TO MALHEUR BIRDS

Alkalies in Water Poison Birds on
Government Reservation, Is
Report Brought to Portland.

DROWNING AFTER SICKNESS

Limbs of Fowls Cannot Be Moved
and They Sink; Others Are
Burned in Fierce Tule Fires.

That the draining of Malheur and Klamath lakes is slowly but surely exterminating the bird life on the government reservations about these bodies of water, is the report brought to Portland by Dr. G. W. Field, in charge of government reservations for the biological survey of Washington, D. C.

Dr. Field, with M. S. Garretson, secretary of the American Bison society of New York, has just completed an inspection of these two bird reservations and the antelope range in northern Lake country.

The draining of the lake, he asserts, is serving to put an end to the very thing the bird reservations were created to protect. The lowering of Klamath lake, in particular, has had the effect of causing the alkalies in the water to concentrate in such degree that the water-fowl are dying in considerable numbers from poisoning. The birds are first affected by paralysis of the wings and legs. This condition progresses until the birds lose all power of motion and drown.

MANY ARE STARVING

Many others are dying on both reservations from starvation. Dr. Field asserts, and great numbers of fowls were burned to death in the tule marsh fires this past summer.

According to Dr. Field, the colony of American egrets on the Malheur reservation is steadily increasing. This colony, one of the few left in the United States, was practically exterminated 10 years ago as a result of ruthless slaughter by professional hunters. State protection later resulted in government protection under the biological survey. In 1918 there were 27 nests in the colony, with more than 100 birds, and according to Dr. Field, the number of nests is now about 40. The white faced glossy Ibis also lives on this reservation, and the colony is becoming larger. There are more than 100 pairs now, Dr. Field said.

In connection with Garretson's work, a survey was made of the conditions on the antelope range. This is one of the animal life species, formerly numerous in Oregon, which is rapidly passing, and no encouraging reports of conservation can be made as a result of the recent investigation, Garretson says.

ANTELOPES ARE KILLED

The antelopes are protected, but nevertheless the killing continues. Much evidence of this was found, and several instances of where the animals had been used as wolf bait were found. According to William L. Finley, state biologist, the sheepherders of Lake County kill the antelope, generally in the spring, and use the carcasses to lure wolves and coyotes into traps.

While examining the remains of an antelope a few days ago, Garretson stepped on two traps concealed in the vicinity. In another place where the investigators found that coyotes had been skinned, there were the remains of an antelope dog nearby.

No protection is given these animals, which range Lake county in summer and generally through Northern Nevada in winter.

The antelope has practically disappeared from Oregon, except in Lake county. The most optimistic estimate of their number does not exceed 400, Mr. Garretson states. Although the antelope is technically protected by state laws, in reality there is no protection, he says, for no wardens have been appointed, and there is little disposition on the part of the residents of the county to refrain from hunting them.

Dr. Field and his companion will remain in Portland for a few days and then leave for their homes in the East.

Brother Heroes Are Students at O. A. C.

Albany, Oct. 6. — Harrison Phillips, who lost his left leg in the battle of Chateau Thierry, July 18, 1918, a Linn county boy from Shelburn, was in Albany Saturday arranging to enter the commerce department of the Oregon Agricultural college. He was accompanied by his brother Clifford, who rushed to his assistance on the battlefield when he was first wounded. Clifford had barely finished rendering first aid when Harrison's wounded leg was again struck by a larger piece of shrapnel, which necessitated amputation. Clifford afterwards went unscathed, through four major offensives, being cited for conspicuous bravery in caring for wounded under shell fire.

Arrested Twice for Breaking Liquor Law

The cards were against V. B. Murphy when he appeared in the municipal court Saturday morning to face two charges of violating the prohibition law. Murphy was arrested twice within 24 hours on Friday. The first arrest was made early in the morning by Officers Rockwell and Thomas. The second was made later in the day by Officers Abbott and Hamilton.
