

BUSINESS LOOKING UP IN THE NORTHWEST, SAYS RAIL CHIEF

Increased Movement of Cars
Over Corresponding Period
Of Last Year.

Business conditions in the northwest show a general improvement for the week ending September 23, as compared with the previous week and the same week last year, according to a report on car movements made by E. E. Ashton, regional director of the northwestern district of the railroad administration. The report shows an increased movement of 11,340 cars over the same period last year and 2531 cars over the previous week.

The demand for all manufactured articles, says the report, is such that the sales forces of a good many concerns have sold their entire output in less than one-third the usual time. Instances are reported where salesmen were on the road only three weeks to sell the same amount of goods as was sold last year in seven weeks.

The movement of lumber and forest products, 18,767 cars, shows an increase of over 5000 cars compared with 1918, and is the record movement so far this year. Of this amount, 12,000 cars were loaded in the Pacific northwest, notwithstanding car shortage and the fact that only 60 per cent of the orders were filled.

Divorce Proceedings Will Seek Evidence Of Hotel Employees

London, Oct. 7.—(L. N. S.)—Testimony by hotel chambermaids in Paris will play an important part in the divorce case in high life—the suit entered at Dublin by Lady Carbery, wife of Lord John Evans-Freke Carbery, a celebrated Irish nobleman. This testimony, which is being taken by a commission in the French capital, will not be made public, however. A bill for the dissolution of the marriage will be presented in the house of peers after parliament convenes on October 22.

Sir Charles Russell, attorney for Lady Carbery, in moving the appointment of the commission to take testimony, said that evidence was wanted from a Spanish chambermaid, a French chambermaid and a Swiss hotel porter in Paris. The couple have been living apart and there is one child to the marriage. Lord Carbery, who is 27 years old, served in the royal naval air service and was injured in a flying accident in Belgium in September, 1914. He was the first British peer to fly across the English channel. Lady Carbery, before her marriage, was Miss Josie Metcalf of London.

General Strike Vote Of Boston Police Is Narrowly Averted

Boston, Oct. 7.—(L. N. S.)—All the persuasiveness of the officers of the Boston Central Labor union, it was made known today, were required to avert a general strike vote on the police situation when two representatives of the striking policemen appeared before the delegates and demanded a showdown as to the support the parent body was to give the police union. The striking policemen went away with the assurance that the "fight of the C. L. U. for the policemen is just beginning."

Johnson's Buncombe Explained Away By Senator McCumber

Washington, Oct. 7.—(L. N. S.)—Great Britain and her dominions not only were unable to outvote the United States in the League of Nations assembly and council, but the influence of the United States in the league would be paramount to that of the British or any other nation. Senator McCumber, (Republican, North Dakota), a league advocate, declared in a speech in the senate Monday afternoon.

Tobacco Signs Are Ordered Torn Down

Chief of Police Nels Johnson ordered his captains Monday to direct patrolmen to tear down all tobacco signs on the exterior of buildings. Complaint had been made, it is said, by Mayor Baker that a city ordinance prohibiting these signs has been violated.

MUSIC POPULAR COURSE AT PACIFIC UNIVERSITY

Pacific University, Forest Grove, Oct. 6.—The enrollment at Pacific university has continued to increase since the opening of the fall term, September 17. The student body is twice the size it was at this time last year. The number of young men is slightly below that of young women.

The conservatory of music is again popular. Miss Taylor, who succeeds Wilma Waggener-Fischer as head of the department, has been teaching in eastern colleges for six years. The violin department, under William Wallace Graham, and the voice, under Virginia Spencer-Hutchinson, are notably larger than they have been in recent years.

The outlook for athletics is bright with Coach Day from Grinnell in charge. He also has classes in political economy. The commercial work is under Miss Helen Wood of Salem. Rev. Walter Blair, pastor of the local Congregational church, offers special work in biblical literature, and Burrill of the government entomological station conducts a class in economic zoology, new this year.

Increased Prices in Meats Predicted at Committee Meeting

Washington, Oct. 7.—(L. N. S.)—Increased prices of meat to the consumer may follow a meeting Monday between representatives of the packing and fer-

tilizer industries with members of the price-fixing committee of the department of agriculture.

Wide reductions in the prices of fertilizers, in some cases of nearly 100 per cent, were proposed by the price-fixing committee to the representatives of the industries. The department of agriculture has authority to put such reductions into effect under war legislation and it was evident today that the reductions would be carried out. Since

the fertilizers are by-products of the packing industry, it was considered that prices of meats might be boosted to absorb the price reductions in fertilizer. Some of the price reductions offered the fertilizer committee were in ammonium sulphate from the present market price of \$2.25 a unit to \$2.00; tankage, from \$4.55 a unit to \$3.40; dried blood, from \$7.50 a unit to \$3.75; and fish scraps, from \$8.82 a unit to \$3.75.
