A city permit for this work was issued Tuesday. The permit states that the work of reconstruction will cost approximately \$25,000. The work is to start as soon as the freight now stored in the dock is removed and this is

The piling is to be cut off at the low water line and a grillage of heavy beams will be laid on top. From this grillage heavy posts will be carried up to the floor system and braced. This is expected to make the dock safe for its usual capacity again. The superstructure of the dock is pronounced by city inspectors to be in fair condition. The property is controlled by Balfour,


