

### NIGHT HORSE SHOW ENTRIES PROMISE EXCELLENT PROGRAM

California and Seattle to Compete in Blue Ribbon Contest at North Portland.

T. T. Strain, who will have charge of the night horse show at the Pacific International Livestock exposition in November, moved into Pacific International headquarters, 431 Northwestern National Bank building, Thursday, and is busy working up entries for the four evening performances and Friday matinee that will be given in the main stadium of the new quarter-of-a-million dollar pavilion at North Portland this week of November 17-22.

Strain expects some particularly fine entries from San Francisco and other California points and from Seattle, Idaho and Montana will send strings of blue ribbons also.

Arrangements are being made to have the school children released at noon on Friday, November 21, so that they may enter their Shetland ponies in the matinee to be given on that date.

Beginning with the November exposition the Western Dairy Products show will be a permanent part of the Pacific International's annual stock show, a spacious hall with moving picture facilities and other special equipment having been provided for lectures and demonstrations. The educational program in this department will be continuous and will cover the breeding, feeding and production of dairy cattle, and the manufacture of the various dairy products, such as butter, cheese, ice cream, etc.

Several hundred county agents, extension workers and dairy instructors from Pacific slope states will come to Portland for the educational benefits of this division, which will also be open to the general public. An outstanding feature of this section will be daily lectures by Professor O. E. Reed of Purdue university, Indiana, and Professor M. Mortensen of the Iowa State university, two of the foremost dairying authorities of the country.

He favored the plan of allowing naval radio stations on the west coast to accept commercial messages to relieve cable congestion.

### MEMORIAL TABLE PROPOSED IN PLACE OF LIBERTY TEMPLE

Recommendations for the Razing of Present Structure to Be Made to City Officials.

Recommendation that the Liberty Temple be destroyed and a permanent memorial placed in its stead, will be made to the council by the department of public works, it was announced Thursday morning. Quarters for the American Legion will be provided in another building, under present plans.

The department will suggest that the mayor appoint a committee of three, representing the legion, Liberty loan committee, and council to select a tablet to be erected at Sixth and Yamhill streets as a permanent memorial to the building which served as headquarters for the loan drives and other patriotic movements that placed Oregon at the head of the list of loyal states.

To move the building to another location would cost almost \$2500, it is stated, and the heavy maintenance would make its retention extremely costly to the city.

#### Tillamook Cheese Omelet a la Cream for Five People

Nine eggs, beat up well, 5 ounces of Tillamook Cheese, 1 ounce of butter, capers, pepper, Worcester sauce, salt to convenience. Let cheese melt, add half-pint of cream and two tablespoons of beaten eggs. Make real smooth by whisking, then put pan on fire, put in a little butter and start to scramble your eggs. After the eggs are nearly well cooked, take 1/2 of the scrambled cheese and spread over eggs in the pan and fold it up into the shape of an omelet. Let it get a little brown on one side and put on plate and garnish with the balance of the creamed cheese.
