STORAGE BUTTER IS LIKELY TO RESULT IN SEVERE LOSSES

Speculators Would Gladly Part With Their Stocks If They ould Get Oregon beans. Their Money Back; Fresh Situation Continues Favarable Here.

Market for fresh butter continues firm at the moment to make any changes in values. The output of fresh butter is slowly gaining and immediate wants of the trade are being more easily taken

While there is no doubting the present strength of the fresh butter market here, the undertone in storage sfock is not in a position where it is pleasing to speculative interests.

So much butter is coming to Portland from Canada and the middle west as well as from Colorado that fears are expressed here that except for the very best fresh stock, some very handsome losses will be suffered by storers.

Storage stocks here are unusually heavy and as there is more butter coming here than the trade is able to absorb, indications point to depression before the season is over. In fact there is not a butter interest here who would there is not a builter interest here who would not gladly let go of storage stock at actual cost. Fresh butter along the coast is holding firm.
