Tension Over Doubt in English Official Circles on Shantung Amendment Greatly Relieved.

LONDON PAPERS COMMENT

Efforts to Wreck Peace Treaty Prove More Noisy Than Formidable, It is Stated. .

London, Oct. 18.—(U. P.)—The last fears of British officialdom that the United States would repudiate the peace treaty appeared today to have been dispelled by rejection of the Shantung amendment. In official quarters, as well as in a section of the press, this is accepted as final proof of the administration's strength. Adoption of the covenant, in the view of the sentiment here, is virtually assured.

Declaring that the vote on Shantung was satisfactory, the Daily News says the fate of a further amendment, elim-Inating the Shantung clause altogether. is immaterial.

"If America prefers to disassociate herself from that particular provision, no serious harm will be done," the paper says. "It is of first importance that the American representatives be in their places the day the League of Nations starts active work.

"Next to the treaty ratification the most important question is America's fecision with regard to mandates. The hope of a favorable answer will not be dismissed until an unfavorable answer

Program Also Includes Normal Classes to Be Held on Each Sunday Evening.

A city wide missionary educational campaign will be conducted in Portland within the next month by the Portland Church federation, according to a decision made Friday evening at a meeting of the committee. Every church in the city will be involved. A school of missions in every church will conduct the

Every denomination enlisted in the Portland church federation and the Multnomah County Christian Endeavor union are cooperating. The mission school will last for six weeks, beginning November 9. Each church will work its own plan for conducting the school, but normal classes will be held each Sunday evening about 6:30 o'clock. As separate classes have been provided for young people, the study work need not inter-fere with their regular program.

Classes have been arranged for every age. Special emphasis is to be laid on the class provided for men. Preceding the school of missions a normal school will be held in the First Congregational school for six nights, beginning October 27. Seven persons from each church in the city will be expected to attend this training school




