First Time Orchards Yield in Commercial Quantities, and Fruit of Excellent Grade.

Stanfield, Oct, 18 .- With the crops of this vicinity having a value of nearly half a million dollars, this community is experiencing an era of prosperity such as it has never known. Everybody has money and everybody is getting a share of the wealth which the soil is producing.

The big item this year will be alfalfa hay, as the farmers will receive about \$250,000 for their crop. On the Furnish project alone more than 10,000 tons of first-class hay has been produced, with a value of \$18 per ton in the stack, and from the tributary lands west of Stan-field at least 5000 tons will be placed on the market. Part of this crop has al-ready been sold to feeders. With a strong demand for baled hay from out-side points, hundreds of carloads of hay APPLES ARE EXPORTED

This is the first year that the orchards here have been producing in commercial quantity, and between 40 and 50 carloads of the finest quality apples will leave Stanfield.
