CARLYON AS NEXT **WASHINGTON CHIEF**

Father of \$30,000,000 Road Plan

NUMEROUS PARDONS ASKED

Vocational Survey of Graduates of Schools Shows Big Per Cent Planning to Become Farmers.

Olympia, Wash., Oct. 18 .- Senator P. H. Carlyon of Olympia is being discussed as the next governor of the state of Washington. Senator Carlyon is the father of the \$30,000,-000 road plan in this state and a bitter opponent of the "Black Top" paving advocates. He has been the leader in the senate of this state for

The bonding plan, which he worked out and which passed the legislature during the last session, was to use the money secured from automobile licenses to pay for the paving of the principal highways in the state. The people of the state will vote on this project in Nevember, 1920.

Other candidates to whom political prophets are pointing a steady finger are: Governor Louis F. Hart, present incumbent; Roland Hartley of Everett, defeated for governor at the last election, and Clark V. Savidge, state land

Governor Hart has recently received many petitions asking for the pardon of nmates of the various institutions. 




