

CARLYON AS NEXT WASHINGTON CHIEF EXECUTIVE TALKED

Father of \$30,000,000 Road Plan Has Been Leader in Senate of State During Many Sessions.

NUMEROUS PARDONS ASKED

Vocational Survey of Graduates of Schools Shows Big Per Cent Planning to Become Farmers.

Olympia, Wash., Oct. 18.—Senator P. H. Carlyon of Olympia is being discussed as the next governor of the state of Washington. Senator Carlyon is the father of the \$30,000,000 road plan in this state and a bitter opponent of the "Black Top" paving advocates. He has been the leader in the senate of this state for years.

The bonding plan, which he worked out and which passed the legislature during the last session, was to use the money secured from automobile licenses to pay for the paving of the principal highways in the state. The people of the state will vote on this project in November, 1920.

Dr. Carlyon refuses to say anything concerning his candidacy. He says this is not strange, for he rarely takes concerning political matters, but "he acts."

Other candidates to whom political prophets are pointing a steady finger are: Governor Louis F. Hart, present incumbent; Roland Hartley of Everett, defeated for governor at the last election, and Clark Sawdige, state land commissioner.

Governor Hart has recently received many petitions asking for the pardon of inmates of the various institutions. Among them were those asking for the pardon of Charles Finner, a Milan, convicted of second degree murder for the killing of Nelson and George Verbeck; Albert J. Woods of Medical Lake, charged with having beer with more than the legal amount of alcohol in it; and Stephen Reitner of Odessa charged with grand larceny.

The petition sent in for Palmer is signed by Judge O. R. Holcomb, chief justice of the supreme bench, and Judge Kenneth Macintosh of the supreme bench. Palmer killed the two Verbeck brothers in March, 1917. The people of the state are planning to have a fight in his courtroom. He said that the two men were drunk and were plotting over getting Straton Verbeck, 15-year-old son of Nelson Verbeck, drunk. When he remonstrated with them, he said, they jumped on him, and he pulled his revolver for self protection.

Pardoners for Woods include Senator Harvey H. Phipps of Spokane, Judge Rooker of Spokane and Prosecuting Attorney Joseph B. Lindsey. They say Woods made the beer for his own consumption on the prescription of a doctor to be used as a tonic, as Woods is suffering from tuberculosis. He was fined \$100 and costs, which he is serving in jail.

Mrs. Josephine Corliss Preston, state superintendent of public instruction, has completed a vocational survey of the sixth grade graduates of 1910. Many callings were chosen by the 10,575 graduates from whom she heard.

Of the number reporting, 4252 students were undecided as to what they should make their life work. Politicians, glowers, cooks, presidents of the United States, hair dressers, bankers, farmers, bakers, aviators, school teachers—all had their names mentioned.

"Back to the farm movement" found advocates, as the largest per cent signified their intention of becoming farmers. Of the 6229 who are decided upon their vocations 1286 are planning to be farmers, 1116 will teach school, 696 will be stenographers, 320 bookkeepers, two presidents of the United States, 128 electrical engineers, 400 nurses, 222 musicians, 121 business men, 119 electricians, 198 engineers, 87 physicians, 78 housekeepers, 57 lawyers, 421 mechanics.

There were 150 different callings represented.

"It is not the women in industry that we need to make a special effort to reach and interest in safety work, because these women are brought in touch with this work each day, but the housewives and the children of the state," asserts Martin Flysik, member of the state safety board. "We hope to start a campaign soon to teach school children that walking is safer than stealing rides."

Flysik recently attended the National Safety council meeting in Cleveland, and the national mine rescue and first aid meet at Pittsburg.

He reported that the Roslyn Fuel

company mine and rescue team of this state took third place at Pittsburg among 47 teams.

Dr. J. S. Kloeber, chairman of the state safety board, announced the appointment of Ira Lockney as consulting engineer of the board. Lockney's duties will consist of supervising installation of safety devices and cooperating in directing the board in the mechanical line of its safety work. He comes to Washington from Wisconsin, where he served the safety board of the industrial insurance commission and had been engineer for a number of large steel plants.

Old Military Wagon Roads Need Fixing To Get Trade Here

Place the old military wagon road over the Willamette pass in condition that it may satisfactorily be used by automobiles and tourists and trade that otherwise goes through Central Oregon to other markets will come to the Willamette valley and Portland.

This is the proposition Eugene is backing, together with other communities of Central and Southern Oregon, according to information received this morning by the State Chamber of Commerce from W. E. Gilstrap, secretary of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce.

The Willamette pass route follows the middle fork of the Willamette river from Eugene through Oak Ridge and passes at its highest point south of Diamond peak near Summit lake. The road enters Central Oregon in the vicinity of Crescent.

"This road runs nearly parallel to the proposed Natron cut off railroad route to Klamath Falls and is almost on a direct line from Portland to Klamath Falls, with a slight deviation at Eugene," says the Eugene communication. "This pass may be used two weeks earlier than the McKenna pass upon which work is progressing."

Navy Is School for Men in Addition to Its Fighting Policy

"Years ago the navy was looked upon simply as a branch of the nation's fighting forces. Today it is considered as a career for ambitious young men," asserted Lieutenant Commander Fred K. Elder, who is in charge of naval recruiting for Oregon. His offices are in the Dekum building.

According to Commander Elder, there is a wide field in naval aviation for those who favor that branch of the service. He states that development in lighter-than-air craft has been rapid. At present the navy has numerous types of free balloons, kite balloons, non-rigid and rigid airships. Ten rigid airships will be constructed by 1925 in addition to a large number of the other four types of lighter-than-air craft.

Vacancies caused by the release of reservists have caused the navy aviation schools to work at top speed in turning out gas engine mechanics, gunners, photographers, carpenters and riggers. These men are finding rapid promotion. This year the navy department has decided to pick a number of air pilots from the enlisted force. Commander Elder believes that this policy will hold for future years.
