The pressure is moderately low also in the extreme Southwest. Over the remainder of the country the pressure is high, the highest readings being in New England, Pracipitation has occurred from the Washington and British Columbia coast eastward over Mentana and Alberta, and in the upper lake region, upper Missiasippi valley and central plains region. The weather is much warmer in New York and Pennsylvania, and in parts of Montana, Oregop and Washington, and is much cooler in Oklahoma, Kanasa, Iowa and Missouri. The temperature is below normal in the northern plains and southern plateau states, and over parts of the Facific slope, and is generally above normal in other parts of the country.
