EGG MARKET BEGINS TO FEEL EFFECTS OF THE EXTREME PRICE

Fresh Values Had Been Placed High to Stimulate Storage Demand for All; Australian Product Now Offering.

Trade in the egg market showed no price change for the day but there is a general feeling of unrest among the bigger operators, due to the lack of snap in buying fresh goods.

While Portland prices have been far more conservative for fresh eggs than shown in competing centers, the fact that the market here was generally at the prices quoted while in many instances other markets quoted artificially high prices from lack of order to stimulate the storage business.

One of the big leasds of the storage business, in fact, one of the leaders of the market, has been the fact that the northern markets put fresh egg values high in order to stimulate the demand for storage goods, but they also thought that the public was disgusted and did not purchase any eggs.

COUP DISCUSSED

Steel Strike Head Requests Blow at Roads of U. S. Steel Corporation.

Washington, Oct. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Plans for trying up all the railroad transportation facilities of the United States Steel corporation were discussed today at a conference between John H. Fitzpatrick, chairman of the national committee in charge of the steel strike, and the presidents of the four big brotherhoods.

The brothershood will be asked to call out all members handling cars used for the shipment of steel from the mills under strike ban.

Fitzpatrick said the strikers "were marshaling their forces for victory."

"We've got 'em," he said, with a grin, "and all organized labor is going to help us to hold them. Our position shows increased strength this week. The Ladies' Garment Workers gave us \$350,000 for the commissaries we are starting to feed the strikers and their families. Other unions are also contributing generously."

Fitzpatrick also said he had come to Washington to request the government to send American troops to Pennsylvania to suppress the steel strike.

Fitzpatrick will also confer with the executive council of the American Federation of Labor and request again that it issue a general appeal to affiliated bodies to help the strikers by contributions.

The strike leader charged the Steel corporation with "manufacturing propaganda in the strike districts."

"Its publicity bureau," he said, "is importing 'Red' literature by the ton into the strike districts and sending emissaries into our meetings to pose as revolutionists and stir up trouble."

Navy May Release 3 Million Pounds Of Sugar to Trade

Washington, Oct. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Three million pounds of sugar may be released by the navy department to relieve the sugar shortage, it was learned late this afternoon.

What the consumer will have to pay for sugar next year was the subject of controversy today, when a hearing was granted Louisiana plantation owners, sugar refiners and officials of the United States sugar equalization board by the senate agriculture committee.

Senator McNary took issue with Claus A. Spreckels, president of the American Sugar Refining company, who attributed high prices to government control.
