

THOUSANDS MEET TO PAY TRIBUTE TO REAL AMERICAN

Great Crowd Gathers at Auditorium to Honor Memory of Former President Roosevelt.

HAD STERLING QUALITIES

Judge Henry McGinn Delivers Eloquent Address on Incidents in Life of Late Statesman.

A typically Roosevelt crowd—over 4000 strong—of all ages and all creeds, 100 per cent American, cheered and sang until the Auditorium echoed the fullness of their hearts at the Roosevelt memorial meeting Monday night.

It was the kind of audience that would have brought the fullest response from that warrior-statesman whose name thrilled them all. There were scores of boy scouts, a scattering of olive drab uniforms, and here and there a man in blue wearing the bronze button of the G. A. R.

GENERALS SEND MESSAGES

There were many of the young and many more with white heads; but most of all it was a middle-aged audience, men and women who remembered Roosevelt well, who had fought for him and against him politically, but all of whom respected and loved him. A middle class audience, it was, warm hearted, hospitable family of men and women, who have comfortable homes that they own and small automobiles, and who enjoy balcony seats at the theatre—the kind in which Roosevelt placed his faith and the nation's security.

"We came in commemoration of the birthday of our friend," were the opening words of Henry Waldo Coe, state chairman of the executive committee.

Cablegrams from abroad were read, "I can never forget the sentiments that Colonel Roosevelt inspired in the hearts of the French people," was the message sent by General Foch. Joffre, Lord Northcliffe and the mayor of Rome also sent messages of affection that were read.

In introducing Judge Henry McGinn, Coe said: "In Judge McGinn we have one whom Theodore Roosevelt loved."

DENOUNCES COAL STRIKE

Theodore Roosevelt believed in his country above all other things," declared McGinn, "and he was ready to make the sacrifice of his own life for his country. He reared four sons who were ready to give up their lives, and more than this no one could do. Roosevelt did not believe his country was going to pass away. He knew it was going to keep on. And neither the malefactors of great wealth nor the proletariat could overcome the country that Washington founded and Lincoln conserved."

Cheers and applause greeted McGinn's statement:

"Tonight the American people are not going to be without coal. Neither coal operators nor coal miners are going to keep the American people from having coal. The words of Roosevelt are as true tonight as in 1902, when he said, 'If you don't bring out the coal, I'll put an army in to do it.'"

"The best service he ever did for America was the service he did from the time he commenced to uphold the American people for their supineness when they looked upon the struggle between democracy and autocracy and did not step in. We rose to it, and we did it as no other people ever did anything of that kind before. We did it because we have the best government that the sun of God ever shone upon before. It was Roosevelt's spirit that the boys took to France that won the war for democracy. And the buddies that saved the world will see that the red flag never gets a foothold here. Theodore Roosevelt is gone, but his faith remains with us."

The meeting opened with the singing of "America." The invocation was delivered by the Rev. William T. McMillen.

Vocal duets by the Misses Harriet and Florence Leach were well appreciated by the audience, and the Portland Boy Scouts presented their colors in an impressive ceremony. The awards of prizes for essays on Roosevelt by the public school children of the state were announced by Judge Jacob Kanzler, chairman of the Multnomah county committee. After the singing of the "Star

Spangled Banner," benediction was delivered by the Rev. Edward H. Pence. The following winners of the essay contest were announced: Gibson Bowles, Jefferson; Dorothy Rude, James John; Louise McCurdy, Clinton Kelly; Dorothy Hill, Glenoe, and Margaret Steckle, Thompson.

Because of their excellent work, honorable mention was announced for Harold E. King, Lincoln; Albert Deerevel, Franklin; Emmett Kennedy, Glenoe; Gusie Viter, Elliot; Benjamin Eaton, Central; Abe Holmquist, Felling; James Yates, Benson Polytechnic; Elizabeth Ogden, East; Lillian Miller, North; Bessie Allen, Lewis.

The singing of patriotic songs was led by Walter Jenkins. Mrs. Gladys Morgan Farmer was pipe organist.

VEHICLE LICENSE FEES FOR 1920 KEEP PACE IN HIGH COSTS RACE

Thousands of Application Blanks for Next Year Ready for Distribution; New Rates Made.

Motorists who desire to get a low license number for their automobile in 1920, will have a chance to try after this morning at 8:30 a. m. Harry P. Coffin, safety commissioner with offices at 20 Police headquarters, has received several thousand application blanks from the secretary of state. These will be given out gratis to owners of machines who call at his office. A few copies of the state motor vehicle law were also received for free distribution.

License fees for 1920 are greatly in excess of those for 1919. Following are the new rates, as given by Coffin. Motor bicycles, \$1; motorcycles, \$5; electric pleasure vehicles, \$18; electric service vehicles under one ton, \$25; steam and gasoline vehicles under 23 horsepower, excepting trucks, \$15; 23 to 28 horsepower, \$22; 28 to 30 horsepower, \$28; 30 to 38 horsepower, \$34; 38 to 40 horsepower, \$48; in excess of 40 horsepower, \$58.

The rates for trucks are: Trucks up to 1½ tons, \$32; 1½ to 2 tons, \$48; 2 to 2½ tons, \$60; 2½ to 3 tons, \$72; 3 to 3½ tons, \$84; 3½ to 4 tons, \$96; 4 to 4½ tons, \$108; 4½ to 5 tons, \$120. All vehicles carrying over five tons must secure a special permit. All trailers must carry a license next year, the fee being one-half of that required for the motor vehicle.

Paris, Oct. 23.—The proprietors of the foundries in the northern provinces of France today declared a complete lock-out and shutdown of their plants. The decision is the result of the coal famine.

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Negro Wins Decree In Supreme Court, Then Pleads Guilty

Medford, Oct. 23.—Houston Cox, colored porter at the Hotel Medford, whose bootlegging case was carried to the state supreme court and remanded, pleaded guilty Monday when his case was called for retrial, because, as his attorney explained, he could not stand the expense. Cox was arrested a year ago while carrying a suitcase filled with liquor, which he maintained was being taken from a train to a guest at the hotel. Emil Mohr, proprietor of the hotel, paid the expense of appealing the case to the supreme court. He maintained an ad-

verse decision would lay all hotel keepers who handled guests' luggage in which there might be liquor open to a bootlegging charge.

Cox was fined \$100, with a 30-day jail sentence, which was suspended. Lenine Vitali of Portland pleaded guilty to having two suitcases filled with booze when he was taken from a train here last week. He was given 30 days in jail and fined \$100.

Man, Too Old for Jail, Draws Fine
Medford, Oct. 23.—Because he was a cripple and because he was old, E. A. Worden of Portland was not sentenced to jail upon pleading guilty of violation of the prohibition law. Instead, Justice Taylor fined him \$250. Worden was en route to Portland in an automobile laden with 25 quarts of whiskey.
