

REDFIELD BLAMES LABOR FOR HIGH COST OF LIVING

On Eve of His Resignation, Secretary of Commerce Analyzes Economic Causes and Effects.

PRODUCTION HAS DECREASED

Strikes, Walkouts, More Wages and Shorter Hours Contribute to Soaring Prices, He Says.

Washington, Oct. 29.—On the eve of his retirement from the cabinet, Secretary of Commerce Redfield, in an address Tuesday, made this analysis of the labor, high cost of living and industrial situation:

"Labor is responsible for a large part of the industrial chaos in the United States and is the only agency which can quickly reduce the cost of living. Labor has by its conduct since the armistice, lost heavily in public esteem and can regain public confidence only by an energetic campaign of production."

Redfield declared there was not a single instance in any industry where a general decrease in wages had been effected or even attempted. He said employers generally had increased wages, but that labor has failed to produce as much as heretofore.

"The laboring men of this country constitute the only group which can reduce the cost of living," he said. "If organized, labor, through the agencies of its various organizations, would resolve to increase production to the limit of its ability and let the American people know of this determination, the cost of living would decrease next week. 'If manufacturers knew that in the next six months, next year, and from now on they could count on big outputs, they would begin scaling down prices immediately. The magnitude of output, through the forces of competition, would bring prices lower and lower until the cost of living would be on a normal plane. But with men striking, laying off on vacations, cutting down hours and, on top of this, demanding higher wages, production is greatly restricted and it is necessary for manufacturers to place higher and higher prices on their goods to cover their overhead."

Game Preserve in Vicinity of Eugene Will Be Dedicated

Eugene, Oct. 29.—Carl D. Shoemaker, state game warden, in an address before the Eugene Chamber of Commerce, said that the game preserve near Eugene would be inspected and officially dedicated November 12, and that Governor Olcott and members of the state game commission would attend. Within a few years, he said, he hoped to establish game preserves in Southern and Northern Oregon, as well as in the eastern part of the state, and eventually planned to have 15,000 Chinese pheasants ready for hunters. Charges against the commission were without foundation, Shoemaker said, and he asserted it would be shown that the commission did not use its money to favor commercial interests. He also intimated that the next legislature would be asked to double the angling and hunting fees.

Benton County Is Over Top in Drive of Memorial Fund

Corvallis, Oct. 29.—Benton county has gone over the top in the Roosevelt memorial fund. The \$100 allotted to the county was practically subscribed in Corvallis without the aid of a soliciting committee.

Red Cross Drive Planned
Corvallis, Oct. 29.—Plans for the big Red Cross drive are being perfected in Benton county under the direction of Dr. William T. Johnson, chairman of the Benton county chapter, who has appointed Herschel Ellenberg, formerly president of Withycombe post No. 11, American Legion, chairman of the Red Cross roll call.

Employers Seek to Break Dock Strike

New York, Oct. 29.—(I. N. S.)—The most determined effort the shipping owners have yet made to break the longshoremen's strike was put into effect today. Frederick Topp, vice president of the International Mercantile Marine, announced that strikebreakers would be employed during the day and that every effort would be made to release the 400 ships tied up in port by the strike.

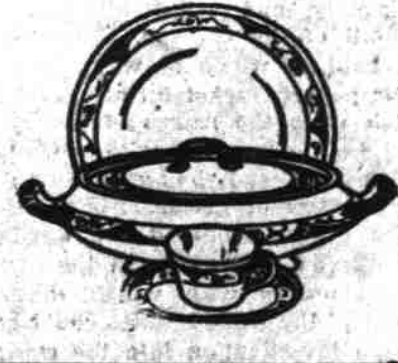
