QUEEN MAY BE PUT

Admiral Line Announces Plans for Improvement of Service Now Cared for by City of Topeka.

× 7-A third liner will be added to the regular passenger service between San Francisco and Portland next month, according to an announcement made today by Frank O'Conner, manager of the Portland offices of the Pacific Steamship company (Admiral line), when the steamer Curação is placed in operation by the Admiral line.

The demand for more service along the Coast has been strong for many months. The two steamers now in the service, the Rose City of the San Francisco & Portland Steamship company and the City of Topeka, operated by the Pacific Steamship company, have long been inadequate.

inaugurate the service about November 15. She is somewhat larger than the City of Topeka, being 245 feet long and 38 feet beam. She has capacity for 1500 ions of cargo and accommodations for 107 passengers. The vessel was built in operated in the Puget Sound-Southeastern Alaska trade. She is a well-built steel steamer and has given excellent service on the northern line.

The City of Topeka now makes the round-trip between the Golden Gate and Portland in nine days, stopping at Coos Bay and Eureka. The Curacao will make these ports also, and running opposite the Topeka, a service every five days will be furnished by the Pacific Steamship company.

In connection with this news comes the rumor, substantiated in some particulars, but not confirmed by O'Conner, that the steamer Queen, one of the largest of the Pacific Steamship company's coast liners, will be added to the Portland service. The Queen is now running between the Sound and San Francisco, and should she be switched to the Columbia river run, would ply between Portland, San Francisco, San Pedro and San Diego, with no intermediate stops. It is said that the business offered would be more than ample to pay for the operation of the Queen in this serv-



While the Republicans may not realize it, they will discover before long that the senate may refuse to vote for a ratification that contains reservations so far as to amount to amendment of the treaty itself.

KILLING OF TREATY FEARED Conservative men in the Republican ranks who refused to join with some of their colleagues in killing the treaty by means of drastic amendments are still counted upon to stand with the Democrats as against reservations that would indirectly strangle the whole treaty.




