

DEFENSE OF CLARK IS THAT TAYLOR WAS SHOT BY UNKNOWN HUNTERS

Witnesses Tell of Seeing Hunters and Hearing Shots Time Taylor Met Death.

Eugene, Nov. 1.—(P.)—Martin Clark charged with the murder of Charles Taylor on Mount St. Helens last summer, will be placed on the witness stand in his own behalf today. Martin and Taylor were out hunting when Taylor was killed.

The state closed its case Friday night with expert testimony to prove that the bullet that killed Taylor came from the gun of Clark, the regular markings on the shells found nearby corresponding to the shells used by Clark and made by a defect in the breechlock of the gun he carried.

Eugene, Nov. 1.—That Martin A. Clark, now on trial for the murder of Charles L. Taylor, was willing to aid in the search for Taylor's body was testified to Friday. Evidence was introduced to show that the morning after Taylor was missing in the mountains near McKenzie bridge, Clark refused to go out breakfast at the Boone house, saying he would go to camp, as he expected Taylor would show up and he wanted to have breakfast ready for him when Taylor was reported as saying Taylor was in hard luck.

Robert H. Cradock, police inspector of Portland, testified as a gun expert, saying that the breech block of certain guns had defects and this would show on the shell. In closing the prosecution, two sheep men testified that no hunters were in that part of the mountains the day Taylor is supposed to have been killed.

C. W. Cushman, old time hunter at the McKenzie bridge, and first witness for the defense, swore that when searching for Taylor's body he met two hunters who were not with searching parties, and that the men carried 30-30 calibre rifles. D. A. Hoag, teacher at Marion, also testified as meeting a hunter when with a searching party. There was also evidence given that Taylor was an experienced hunter and preferred to hunt alone.

E. T. Templeton and E. S. Warner of Oakridge testified showing several shells from a .30-30 Winchester calling attention to the various markings on the shells.

For his first evidence the defense is introducing testimony to prove that several hunters were in the vicinity of the place Taylor was killed July 25, and also that any Winchester will leave marks on the head of a shell.

Labor Leaders Say Government Sides With Coal Barons

Washington, Nov. 1.—In a joint statement issued from the headquarters of the American Federation of Labor by Samuel Gompers, Frank Morrison and Matthew Woll, the deliberate charge is made that the government by its inaction in Indianapolis is taking the side of the "coal barons" as against the miners.

There was an ominous ring to the federation's statement, especially because Gompers amplified it to the extent of saying that the "four brotherhoods were in general agreement with it."

Two Autos Dragged By Streetcar but Slightly Damaged

Dragged 150 feet by a speeding street car, one on each end of a tow wire, two automobiles were found to be only slightly damaged after an accident at Broadway and Oak streets at 12:30 this morning.

An automobile owned by C. Keegan of 46 North Twentieth street was towing a machine belonging to H. J. Tessor of the Railway Exchange building west on Oak. A 20 foot cable was utilized as a tow line. Crossing the car tracks on Broadway, the engine of the first car stalled, leaving a machine on either side of the tracks, firmly held by the cable. A street car driven by Motor-man R. R. Buyers descended on the two machines, and not seeing the tow line crashed into it at unslacked speed.

The automobiles were whirled almost an entire block before the car was brought to a stop.

LARK EVANS IS FREED OF HOLDUP CHARGES; ALIBI IS ESTABLISHED

Medford, Nov. 1.—Lark Evans, who was indicted by the grand jury here last week on the charge of robbing, on September 13, J. G. White, Grants Pass jitney driver, and who was arrested at Klamath Falls Sunday and brought back here by Sheriff Terrill, has been exonerated by County Attorney Roberts and released from custody.

The indictment and notoriety given Evans was due to a case of mistaken identity. Evans and his wife, who voluntarily accompanied him when he was brought here by the sheriff, will return to Klamath Falls, where he will resume his work in a garage there. His father, who came here from La Grande, Or., following his arrest, left for home satisfied that the son was innocent.

Suspicion was directed toward Evans because White and others identified a picture of Evans secured from the Portland police, as the man who, with a woman companion, robbed White on a lonely road near Jacksonville.

White has been in Phoenix, Ariz., for some time, but a wire was received from him that he would leave there November 9 for Medford, to appear against Evans. The authorities here had wired him to come before Evans had established his alibi and had been released on his promise to keep in touch with Phoenix police.

Not only did Evans establish an alibi by witnesses and a time card showing that he worked at a local garage more than 13 hours the day of the robbery, but witnesses who saw the man and woman who got in the jitney with White said that Evans was not the man.

Prosecutor Roberts said that Evans established a satisfactory alibi. "We had not a thing to hold him on," he said, "therefore, it was only justice that I released him. It was a case of unfortunate mistaken identity."

The photograph was taken January 24 last, when Evans was arrested in connection with a burglary in Portland. He was placed on probation for a year. He was not an ex-convict.

OREGON LUMBER TRADE IS TO BE DEVELOPED IN PERU AND CHILE

Ransom Goes to South America to Stimulate Interest in Pacific Coast Woods.

For the purpose of developing the trade in Oregon pine and other Pacific Coast forest products in the markets of Chile and Peru, Frank C. Ransom, foreign trade representative of the Pacific Export Lumber company, left San Francisco October 20 for an extended business trip through South America, according to an announcement made by officials of his company Friday.

Ransom is a son of F. H. Ransom, manager of the Eastern & Western Lumber company, and is thoroughly schooled in the field of wood technology. He goes not in the capacity of a lumber salesman, but rather as an expert to disseminate knowledge in the extended uses of the woods of the Northwest, thus stimulating demand which will be handled by the agents of the company in that field.

MISSION IS IMPORTANT
Although his journey is made as a representative of the Pacific Export Lumber company, the importance of his mission has been generally realized that the Lumber Manufacturers' association furnished him with complete data of the products of all its mills and factories, and with a large range of samples of woods and wood products.

After finishing his work on the west coast Ransom will proceed by the Andes railway from Santiago, Chile, to Buenos Aires, Argentina, where his headquarters have been established. Oregon pine and silver spruce will be especially exploited in these markets. Both varieties are practically unknown in the territory, as the lumber supplies have been drawn almost exclusively from the Gulf States.

STUDIES MARKET REQUIREMENTS
His company has been making a special study of the requirements of the Buenos Aires and Montevideo merchants and its efforts have been meeting with success, as indicated by the fact that during the past 18 months it has shipped five cargoes to those markets. Two of these were repeat orders from merchants starting the first cargo.

Buy Land at Dee to Grow Strawberries
Dee, Nov. 1.—George Potthoff of Tulsa, Okla., is in the valley looking for land for five families who plan to locate in the Hood River valley and engage in strawberry raising. Potthoff says that Oregon fruit and its average prices will bring hundreds here from his state, and reports the Oregon fever growing in his state.

2 Paved Roads Now Through Washington
Beaverton, Nov. 1.—Road repair work in Washington county is expected to be completed within the next 30 days, giving two paved highways to Portland via Tervulizer and Clatsop roads. The last stretch in the improvement is the concrete and paving of the main thoroughfare in the business section of Beaverton.

Passenger Committee Meets
Members of the North Pacific coast passenger committee held their monthly meeting in the offices of A. D. Charlton, chairman of committee, Friday morning. Those present in addition to Charlton were: P. Chapman Jr., Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul; C. W. Meldrum, Great Northern; William McMurray, Oregon-Washington; and John M. Scott, Southern Pacific Oregon lines.

Hundreds Stand in Rain at Funeral of Pendleton Pioneer

Pendleton, Nov. 1.—Hundreds of persons stood in the rain outside the Church of the Redeemer Friday during the funeral services of John F. Robinson, pioneer laundryman, killed Wednesday in an auto accident near here. Several hundred others packed the little church to pay tribute to the memory of one of Pendleton's most beloved citizens.

The funeral was the most largely attended in Pendleton's history, delegations from every branch of the Masonic order, the Elks and Knights of Pythias attending. Portland laundrymen were represented by a delegation of five. Every business house was closed between 2 and 3:30 o'clock. Elaborate floral offerings were sent from near and far.

The Rev. Alfred Lockwood, pastor of the church of which Mr. Robinson was senior warden, conducted the services. The vested choir sang, "The Angels' Sirenade," a favorite air of Mr. Robinson, was played on the violin by H. S. Rood, a friend of long standing. Leon Cohen, Fred E. Judd, W. E. Brock, Frank Frazier, E. P. Marshall and Dr. F. W. Vincent were pallbearers. Services at the grave were conducted by Rev. Mr. Lockwood and by the Masons.

Funeral services for Guy S. Holmington, killed in the same accident, will be held Sunday at 2:30 at the Methodist church. The Rev. H. E. Gornall will officiate and Knights Templar will be in charge of services at the mausoleum.

East Side Lights Go Out; Perhaps to Let "Spooks" Celebrate
"Hobgoblins," whispered awed ones, "celebrating Halloween prank," muttered the disgruntled.

It was neither. When two transformers at the P. B. L. & P. company power house station, Sixtieth and East Stark streets, burned out at 7:20 Friday evening, Sunnyside, Mount Taylor, Piedmont and Rose City Park and other east side districts were plunged in darkness.

Halloween parties became realistically spooky. Jack O lanterns came in handy instead of terrifying as workmen at the power station toiled over the remains of the transformers.

The "burning" was really an explosion that shattered most of the windows in the substation and startled residents for blocks around.

As they burned a display of sparks held riot with the brick wall of the station. Fire department apparatus was sent out.

PLAN TO PROFITEER IN LOGANBERRY JUICE IS DISASTROUS FOR MILLER

Municipal Judge Fines Man \$50 for Selling 50-Cent Bottle for \$1.50.

Oregon loganberry juice displayed a kick Friday, when H. O. Miller, 188 Lincoln street, was fined \$50 in police court. "That's fine stuff," a friend remarked to Miller after sampling a bottle of the famous Oregon product. "Can you get me any?"

"Sure—at \$1.50 a bottle," Miller replied. Later the friend discovered that the bottles for which he paid \$1.50 sold for 50 cents.

He complained to the police. "Why did you misrepresent the value of this loganberry juice?" Judge Rossmann asked Miller.

"I didn't," the salesman said. "If a man offered you a dollar for a pair of worthless paper gloves, wouldn't you take the money?" he asked.

"If you're that conscienceless, what would you say if I stuck you for a \$500 fine?" the court queried. "Do you think that would be right, simply because I was in position to take advantage of you?"

"Pay a fine of \$50 and profiteer no more," Rossmann said as he dismissed the case.

Baillie Wins New Point in \$20,000 Suit On at Baker

Baker, Nov. 1.—Frank S. Baillie won another victory in his suit for \$20,000 against E. W. Backus of Minneapolis and the Columbia Gold Mining company Friday when Judge Anderson of the circuit court issued an order throwing the defendants' answer out of court on the ground that it has been made in bad faith, is incoherent and that it attempts to introduce new evidence.

The case had been decided by the local court in favor of Baillie, was appealed by Harris Richardson, attorney for Backus, and was remanded for another hearing in the lower tribunal, with an order for the plaintiff to produce an amended complaint. The subsequent answer is the one just ejected.

Baillie started suit against Backus four years ago to recover money alleged to be due him for work done while the plaintiff was managing the Columbia Gold mines near Baker. Since the case was started the mines have been abandoned and dismantled. The suit is considered one of the biggest that has ever been brought for trial in Baker county.

VANCOUVER WOODEN SHIPYARD OFFICIALLY CLOSES OPERATIONS

Plant Has Record of 12 Vessels, and at One Time Employed Total of 2300 Men.

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 1.—With a record of 12 wooden boats to its credit, the Star Line corporation's wooden shipyard in this city was officially closed Friday night. The yard was put into operation in the summer of 1917, and as many as 3300 men were employed in it at one time. Two boats were brought here from Portland and out-fitted in the local yard. A small force will be maintained for a few days clearing up the site.

Two ways will be released to the city at the east end of the yard and converted into a city dock, if present plans are carried out. Sufficient money to make a preliminary survey for the dock has been raised through the efforts of the Commercial club and turned over to the city for that purpose.

Mayor Percival said that under the terms of the lease which the shipbuilding corporation holds on the site it must furnish employment for as many men as were employed during the shipbuilding period or the site will revert to the city.
