

WILSON IS JOYOUS OVER VOTE RESULT IN MASSACHUSETTS

Law and Order Triumph Accorded Coolidge Causes More Rejoicing Than a Party Victory.

RETURNS PUZZLE LEADERS

League of Nations Not an Issue in Kentucky, Where Wet Republicans Returned Winners.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 6.—Everybody is happy over the election in Massachusetts, New Jersey, Kentucky and Maryland, everybody, including President Wilson. But for the most part it is not the usual happiness over party triumph, because unmistakably the White House was more joyful over the victory in Massachusetts of Governor Coolidge, Republican, than it was over the remarkable conversion of a Republican plurality of 58,000 in New Jersey into a Democratic victory of at least 10,000.

The president himself sent a message of congratulations to the Republican governor, describing his reelection as a victory for law and order. Party emulation gave way entirely to a sense of abiding satisfaction that in the election in Massachusetts, where law and order was the big issue, the forces of stability compelled an overwhelming victory.

DEMOCRATS ANTI-WILSON

The Democratic organization had not only scorned the Wilson administration by looking to alienate certain hypenate voters in the League of Nations question, but went so far as to attack Governor Coolidge for the method in which he handled the recent police strike, the method that President Wilson had publicly supported in his speech at Billings, Mont.

So happy was the White House over the well deserved rebuke that had been administered to the Democratic organization in Massachusetts for seeking to capture class votes and appeal to the laboring class in the law and order controversy that congratulatory words for Governor Coolidge were abundant and it was suggested that large bodies of Democratic voters must have joined the Republicans in increasing Coolidge's 1218 majority from 17,900 to 150,000 this year.

VICTORY IN NEW JERSEY

As for New Jersey, the White House was plainly satisfied, for Chairman Hays of the Republican national committee had addressed a letter to the Republican state chairman, saying that Republican national success could only be made certain by Republican victory in the state.

Tony's Poverty Fades In Touring Car and Smoke of Black Cigar

—Tony Piattro sat on his back porch smoking a long, black cigar. Four sturdy children romped about him. Mrs. Piattro, his buxom wife, clattered pans in the kitchen. Outside a bright sun smiled on the family.

Tony, when not at home through enforced layoffs and strikes, digs coal in the Jeff mine of the Sangamon County Coal company here. He has wielded a pick and shovel in the coal mines of Central Illinois for the past 12 years. Although native-born, Tony speaks with an Italian brogue. That was why he had some difficulty in explaining the strike—"the great fight"—when asked about it today.

TWELVE YEARS, HE WORKS

"Twelve years I work by the mine," he said. "I come for \$3.25 a day. Hard work. On my back I lay in the damp for four sometimes. The pick she get tired and I have to quit and rest. At night I come home, dirty and maybe not much to eat in the house. Next day the work is stop. This way it goes. Some days work, some days loaf. Then the mine who give me my pay say I must buy company house to work. I buy and pretty soon company quits work. I lose my house. For 12 years I live so. The company he don't care."

"But the work she is better now," Tony continued, brightening. "I make pretty good money in last two years. Maria and me have nice house and nice kids—see," and Tony pointed with a

wrote Chairman Hays, "with a majority so tremendous that from New Jersey will go a voice reassuring the nation in most emphatic terms that the Republican party is moving unflinchingly into that complete control which the people want and the country needs so much."

MAKE COUNTER CLAIMS

Unquestionably the result in New Jersey was disappointing to the Republicans, but they excused it on the ground that it was a wet and dry fight and that the conspicuous gains in Kentucky and Maryland, where normally the Democrats predominate, were worth thinking about.

Certainly the wet and dry issue worked different ways in different states. In New Jersey, where the Democratic candidate was outspoken on the wet side, considerable assistance was derived from the president's vote on the prohibition enforcement bill, while in Kentucky, where the Democrats nominated a dry candidate, the Republicans swept the state by nearly 15,000. Telegrams received here from Louisville quote the Republican managers in Kentucky as saying the League of Nations was not an issue in that state.

REPUBLICANS GAIN

The most significant incident was the result in Maryland, where the Republican gains were unquestionably large. There seems to be no doubt that while a Democrat is in the lead for governor, he is a stronger political position. Results in the normally Democratic state of Maryland and Kentucky were very comforting to the Republican side, who, of course, conceding that Governor Coolidge's victory in Massachusetts was a victory for law and order, they pointed to the fact that he held the Republican vote lately.

Wets in the capital were jubilant over the victory they won in Kentucky and New Jersey. Yet disinterested observers saw little opportunity for any comfort to the wet or dry side in the elections, because Kentucky, where whiskey making is not at all an insignificant industry, hardly furnishes a fair test of the issue.

Most gratifying, too, from a neutral standpoint, is the fact that neither side won a landslide, for party politicians are apt to permit election results to affect them too easily and just now a complicated election result with hardly a clear cut party victory for either side will make both parties in congress more responsive to public opinion and less

This is only one instance out of many of the wealth of coal miners in Springfield and Central Illinois. True, some are not so well fixed but a large majority of them own their own homes and automobiles.

A review of the coal miners in this city today brings out the fact that they are solidly in favor of the strike. They regard it as their sole salvation in the struggle for an existence with the high cost of living. Only a few are dissatisfied with the walkout.

Union headquarters here report all the miners in the state continued idle today without disturbances.

Interested in the votes of special classes than they otherwise would have been. 6 CONGRESSIONAL ELECTIONS NEXT WEEK BEING WATCHED

Washington, Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—Six congressional elections are scheduled for the next few weeks. They will be closely watched in Washington, as even more indicative of the trend of public sentiment than the state elections of last Tuesday.

Three elections are necessary because of election of congressmen to other offices. Tuesday, Representative J. Hampton Moore became mayor of Philadelphia; Representative La Guardia president of the board of aldermen of New York city; and Representative Reuben L. Haskell was elected to a judgeship in Brooklyn.

The first congressional contest occurs in Oklahoma Saturday, where Claude Weaver, Democrat, and J. W. Marshall, Republican, are contending for the seat made vacant by the death of Representative Thompson of the Fifth district.

Another vacancy is made by the senate action yesterday in confirming Representative Webb federal judge in North Carolina.

The sixth vacancy is in the Milwaukee district, which sent Victor Berger, Socialist, to congress. Berger has never been seated. The house elections committee recommended that he not be admitted because of his conviction under the espionage law.

Broadway Block Is Leased to Company For \$72,000 a Year

Negotiations were closed Wednesday for the lease of the quarter block at the northeast corner of Broadway and Washington streets to the Broadway & Washington Investment company. The lease runs for five years and the rental price is said to be \$72,000 annually. This corner belongs to the Brooks estate and is considered one of the most valuable locations in the downtown district. Improvements consist of a two-story brick building and basement. The lower floor is occupied by retail stores and the second story is leased for office purposes.

The lease was taken as an investment and is subject to renewal at the expiration of the five-year period. Negotiations were handled by the Frank Kern Real Estate agency.

27 Smallpox Cases Among Students Of Private School

Twenty-seven mild cases of smallpox have broken out among the pupils attending the Holy Cross school, according to information given out by Health Officer Parrish this morning. Dr. John Abele, assistant health officer, is investigating conditions and reports that none of the cases is serious. The entire school, including the pupils and instructors, were placed under quarantine this morning and no spread of the disease is expected.

Six new diphtheria cases were listed at the health bureau, which brings the total number of quarantine to 113. Twenty-nine cases of smallpox and 59 scarlet fever cases are listed.

SORORITY SISTERS OF ESTHER DIGGLES ARE ACCUSED OF MEDDLING

Aunt of Alleged Wife of Ex-Soldier Who Attempted Suicide Blames Women Students.

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—At the request of Esther Diggles, alleged wife of H. J. Milesham, members of her sorority, the Alpha Delta Gamma, today petitioned university officials for an indefinite leave of absence for the girl. The sorority sisters continued to refuse to divulge the whereabouts of the girl.

The sorority has information from the girl's aunt, Mrs. A. G. Diggles, which, it is said, will cause the dismissal of the girl from the university.

Mrs. Diggles today accused the sorority of meddling. "If these girls had kept out of the affair at the start and let my niece follow her own wishes this disagreeable situation would not have come up," she said. Mrs. Diggles has admitted that her niece married Milesham. The girl came here from Idaho and, according to the aunt, left the train in Utah to marry the man.

VETERAN WHO SHOT SELF FOR LOVE IS IMPROVING

Moscow, Idaho, Nov. 6.—H. J. Milesham, farmer, soldier and student in vocational training, who attempted suicide last Friday morning because his wife, known as Esther Diggles, a student and sorority girl at the University of California, refused to come and live with him, is improving, and Dr. Adair, attending physician, thinks he has a fair chance for recovery.

Milesham continues to ask for his wife and begs those about him to use their influence to have her come to Moscow. A letter from her addressed to him came Tuesday, but Dr. Adair did not think his condition such that it would be all right to let him read the letter if it contained unpleasant news.

It has just been learned here that soon after coming to Moscow, Milesham made application to have \$35 of his allowance of \$115 per month from the government allotted to his wife, and made the application and affidavits through E. C. Boom, commander of the American Legion for Idaho.

MINERS' ATTORNEY ASKS DISSOLUTION OF INJUNCTION

By J. L. O'Sullivan Indianapolis, Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—Henry Warrum, chief counsel for the United Mine Workers of America, today filed a petition in federal court here asking dissolution of the restraining order which prevents union miners' leaders from furthering the strike.

The action gave the miners the initiative in the court battle. Government attorneys will be on the defensive when arguments are heard Saturday by Judge A. B. Anderson in the injunction proceedings.

The petition is in seven paragraphs and is sworn to by Acting President John L. Lewis and Secretary Treasurer William Green.

The motion declared that "the United States is without clean hands in the prosecution of the suit." It states "the real and substantial purpose of this suit is to have and procure this court to extricate the administration from the unfortunate state of disorder in which it has involved itself by imprudent conduct and to destroy the mine workers' union and to destroy the right of working men to strike, and these defendants say that mine working men now are, are ever have been, ready, willing and able to confer with the operators of mines for the satisfactory adjustment of the issue between them as to wages, hours of service and rates of compensation for the labor of mine workers."

BILL WOULD HAVE U. S. OPERATE MINES

Washington, Nov. 6.—Government operation of the coal mines for one year or as much longer as may be necessary for the public good was proposed in congress today as a solution of the coal strike.

The proposal was made in a resolution introduced by Representative Burke of Pittsburgh. It directs the president to take over and operate the mines, effect a satisfactory wage and working conditions.

GOVERNMENT PRIORITY LIST GOVERNS COAL DISTRIBUTION

Details for the distribution of coal by the railroads were contained in a message received by J. P. O'Brien, federal manager of railroads under federal operation in Oregon, from T. W. Procter, newly appointed chairman of the North-western regional coal committee. The message follows:

"Bituminous and lignite coal will be disposed of in accordance with the government priority list in the following respective order: Railroads, army and navy together with other departments of the federal government, state and county departments and institutions, public utilities, retail dealers, manufacturing plants on war industry boards priority list, manufacturing plants not on the priority list, jobbers, lakes and tidewater."

FREIGHT COMMITTEE WORK TO BE FINISHED JANUARY 1

Instructions which will enable the Portland district freight traffic committee to bring its work to a close by January 1 have been received by the committee from Edward Chambers, director of the division of traffic, and Max Thelen, director of public service of the railroad administration. The railroad administration discontinues maintenance of all such committees after that date.

Under the order, no new applications will be received nor dockets after November 9 except those that may be classified as emergency cases. The Portland committee has been instructed to give preference to subjects that have been before them the longest and which appear to them to be of the most importance.

Railroad Cars Inspected

Interchange inspection of railroad cars in the future will be made in the same manner as before federal control, according to an order received by local railroad offices this morning from the railroad administration. Under the cancellation of the war time orders inspection of equipment will be made by inspection gangs both of the road releasing and the road receiving a car. During the war this work was simplified by having all inspection done by one gang of workers.

60,000 Workmen Locked Out

Madrid, Nov. 6.—(U. N. S.)—Sixty thousand persons are idle at Barcelona as a result of the lockout by the employers, said a dispatch from that city today. The president of the employers' association remains obdurate in refusing to deal with the men.

Convicts Offer to Work Mines

McAllister, Okla., Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—Convicts in the state penitentiary here have volunteered to work in the state coal mine. Officials are planning to start operating Friday morning. It is estimated that the output will be 300 tons a day. Troops were moved to the pits this morning.

Woman Dies on Train

Los Angeles, Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—Bernie Grandahl, 436 East Fifty-sixth street, Portland, Or., died on board a Southern Pacific train near here last night while en route from San Bernardino to Portland.

New York, Nov. 6.—(U. P.)—Union drug clerks who struck here today issued a statement announcing that registered pharmacists would be kept available for filling prescriptions. "Our men will go back to their old jobs or volunteer where needed should an epidemic occur," the statement said. Union leaders blamed more than 3000 men were out but all drug stores remained open. The strikers demand recognition of their union, a minimum wage of \$50 weekly for registered men and an eight hour day.
