

WELLESLEY WOMAN HAS MESSAGE FOR COLLEGE ALUMNAE

Miss Ruth Hanford, Councillor of Girls' School, Is Here to Meet With Former Students.

SUPPORT COMES FROM WEST

Representative Wishes to Make Bonds Between Graduates and Alma Mater All the Stronger.

To strengthen the bond between the college and the alumnae and to bring to the West the new note of Wellesley, its increased power, usefulness and beauty, I am making this Western trip," said Miss Ruth Hanford, councillor of Wellesley college, who arrived this morning for a two-day stay in Portland, during which time she will be entertained by prominent Wellesley women.

Mrs. Vincent Cook, president of the Wellesley club, gave a luncheon for her today at the University club. This evening she will be honored at a supper party given by Mrs. Boudinot Seeley and Miss Alice Rowe. Tuesday she will be given a drive over the Columbia river highway by Mrs. Lewis McArthur and the party will be luncheon guests of Mrs. Cook at Forest Hall. During her stay in the city she will be the guest of her former classmates, Mrs. Joseph E. Withrow and Mrs. Tracey.

"The aim of the Alumnae association is to become a real vital factor in the life and success of the college and its graduates," Miss Hanford said. "We have recently opened an office at Wellesley, placing in charge a permanent secretary and assistant, who will be in charge of all records of graduates with a view to coordinating their interests with those of the college and of stressing the advantages by becoming active members of the association."

GROWTH IS RAPID
"The growth and development of the college in the past 10 years has been so great that we may almost call the institution today the new Wellesley. The erection of the group of new buildings on the hill to replace those destroyed by fire has been a tremendous task, yet the Founders hall, which will be devoted to liberal art classes, is now nearly completed and is itself a thing of unusual beauty."

"Following the trend of the times, Wellesley is considering increasing the salaries of its faculty members. All over the country there is a new realization that if the educational institutions are to stand and are to do good work, the teaching forces must be compensated. It is probable that a fund to meet this demand and for additional buildings will soon be asked for."

ENTRY BY EXAMINATION
"With registration so much greater than ever before at most colleges, I think I should explain why it is somewhat less at Wellesley. Smith, Vassar and Mount Holyoke this year. These colleges are trying out for the first time this year a plan whereby all entering must take examinations. Heretofore students were admitted by certificate. The new plan makes admission a little more difficult, hence a slight dropping off. Our registration is about 1500. This includes a number of graduate students and we have a number of foreign students, including the two daughters of the French ambassador to Japan, Miss Catherine Hughes, daughter of ex-justice Hughes, is a senior this year."

"While the plan for putting in vocational courses was not adopted, the college does offer a number of occupational courses leading to further training along many lines. The courses in botany, education and economics are also sufficient to enable graduates to go into school and college work. One of the finest courses is in the conservation of natural resources in geology. Miss Elizabeth Fisher, of this department, did some interesting things in locating oil in Pennsylvania last summer and a book which she has just issued in line with her work has been taken over by the government."

"It is an interesting fact and one that is highly gratifying to the college, that over 50 per cent of the students at Wellesley are western women. By that I mean they come from that region west of the Allegheny mountains."

JURY IS DISMISSED IN CEMENT MEN'S TRIAL; IS UNABLE TO AGREE

Officers of Portland Company Charged With Violation of Sherman Anti-Trust Law.

Because the jury could not agree after 12 hours' deliberation, Federal Judge Bean late Saturday night dismissed suit of the government against Clark M. Moore and R. P. Butchart for alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust act. Moore and Butchart, officers of the Oregon Portland Cement company of Oswego, were on trial three weeks. The government sought to prove they were in a conspiracy of Pacific coast cement makers to restrict territory and hold up prices.

The defendants flatly denied they were members of any conspiracy, affirming that they waged active competition against Washington and California mills.

That the government does not intend to let the case drop was indicated today, when Assistant United States Attorney Barnett Goldstein said he would move for a new trial. Evidence in the government's possession, he says, proves to his mind the fact that the Oregon cement makers were in an illegal combination. The new trial will start before February or March, 1920, however.

It is understood the jury was even for and against conviction. It returned at 10 p. m. Saturday.

U. S. Vice Consul to Sweden Kills Self; Miller Leaves Note

New York, Nov. 10.—(U. P.)—A Masonic funeral was arranged today for Cary A. Miller, United States vice consul to Sweden, who shot himself last night at the Waldorf hotel.

Miller, who was to have sailed for Sweden with his wife within a few days, directed the nature of the funeral in a note which he wrote a few minutes before he committed suicide.

PRICE OF CLOTHES WILL BE BOOSTED HERE THIS SPRING

Merchants Returning From East Say High Priced Labor Has Control of Clothing Houses.

SOME GET WAGE OF \$79

Foreigners Who Can Hardly Read or Write Get Wages That Come to \$4000 a Year, Is Report.

The policy of clothing workers in the eastern factories will cause another increase in the price of clothes this coming spring, according to Portland merchants who returned from a trip through the eastern manufacturing centers.

A letter from Pershing, Coombes & Levinson, New York manufacturers, was received by a local firm last week. This letter, which was signed by James Pershing, brother to General Pershing, stated the prices which could neither speak, read nor write English were getting \$79 for a 44-hour week, or \$180 an hour, or \$4000 a year, and that the firm is not sure there will not be a further increase before work is begun on the spring goods. The letter stated:

DEMANDS INCREASING
"We are getting in addition to this, less and less work from our shops all the time." A Portland merchant, commenting on this situation, said:

"Due to the great demand caused by the return of our soldiers and the needs of a public that held off for as long as its clothing held together, due also to the desire of another section of the public to live high while the wage is high, we are now facing a high demand for clothes and a growing scarcity of garments with which to supply this demand."

"I was startled to see the seeming prosperity of the East, where the price was paying all kinds of fancy prices, prices we of Portland cannot imagine."

In Marshall Field's in Chicago, overcoats that were priced from \$50 to \$125 were selling faster than coats of a similar quality that sold for half the price in 1914. Today, however, it is the white-collared salaried man who is purchasing the \$60 coats, while the artisans and mechanics are paying the higher prices.

LABOR IN FULL CONTROL
"When I went East, I felt, in common with many retailers, that the manufacturers were bleeding the public. When I arrived on the ground and found that labor was costing twice as much as materials and that manufacturers were like puppets in the hands of walking delegates and organized foreigners, I came to the conclusion that there is profiteering among the masses. It is not among the manufacturers of clothing. Many of them have been so menaced by labor that they have gone out of business."

It is stated by Portland clothing retailers that it is no longer possible to order what the dealer or the trade wants. Each dealer is allotted so many suits of clothes or overcoats, according to his past volume of business. It is said the situation is not due to any marked shortage of materials, but mainly to the decreased output of the high-priced labor that has a strangle hold on the industry.

GET \$79 A WEEK
A traveling man who was exhibiting his samples in the Hotel Portland this week said that he witnessed a walking delegate parade through the office of an eastern clothing manufacturer, rap on a table in the workroom and announce, "Next week you get a \$6 advance." The delegate then turned to the employers and gave them this order. This salesman stated that tailors and pressers who were paid from \$18 to \$22 a week in 1914 for a 40-hour week are now paid from \$50 to \$75 for a 44-hour week, and get time and a half for overtime.

A rail was made by federal officers, November 6, on the Chicago headquarters of the Amalgamated Clothing workers, in which it is alleged that incriminating evidence was obtained, indicating that walking delegates were using their authority to extort large sums of money from manufacturers.

The secretary points out that the proposed annex includes Larch mountain, with its fire lookout station, and says this addition would be of great material benefit in guarding the Oregon national forest and the Bull Run watershed from fire menace.

Bloodstains May Indicate Murder on Lombard Street
Mysterious murder rumors from the district about Lombard and Wilbur streets prompted an investigation Sunday morning by Patrolman J. B. White, who found a pool of blood on the sidewalk.

Marks across a vacant lot indicated that some heavy body had been dragged on an outhouse about 20 yards away. Blood stains were found on the door of the house, but no trace of a body or any other evidence of violence.

Woods in the neighborhood were searched and the surrounding district carefully investigated, but no signs were found, either of the perpetrators or the victims. Police have been unable to account for the presence of the blood or the stains.

Prominent Klamath Resident Drops Dead

Klamath Falls, Nov. 10.—L. F. Willets, former county judge and a prominent settler of Klamath county, dropped dead while getting his mail at the postoffice, Judge Willets for years had been vice president of the First National bank. Prior to that he conducted a general merchandise store here and engaged in farming. He is survived by his wife.

Rural Mail Carrier Examination
Examinations will be held by the federal civil service commission at Hillsboro and Portland December 12, to fill the position of rural mail carrier at Sherwood and Beaverton, in Washington county. Admission of women to this examination will be limited to the widows of service men who are physically disabled. Postmasters at these places will supply application blanks and other information.

AIMS REVEALED BY ANARCHIST

MANIFESTO STARTLES PALMER
Washington, Nov. 10.—Copies of the manifesto of the so-called Communist party, seized by department of justice agents at New York, were given out by Attorney General Palmer, to show the public that the objective of the anarchists is overthrow of the government.

"The manifesto is entitled, 'Novamirsky,' and was published by the 'Federation of Unions of Russian Workers of the United States and Canada' at New York. Extracts showing its violent revolutionary character follow:

"Communism in the economic field must inevitably be crowned with anarchy in the field of politics. Therefore, along with complete destruction of private ownership must go complete destruction of the state."

GOVERNMENT SUPERFLUOUS
"The state is unnecessary, because with the extermination of classes, its principal function will cease, the preservation of the dominion of one class."

"The destruction of the state means the principal work in the formation of the new society . . . down with the state."

Long live Anarchy!
"What must we do, the vanguard of the proletariat? We must consciously hasten the elementary movement of the struggle of the working classes. We must convert small strikes into general ones, and convert the latter into an armed revolt of the laboring masses against capital and the state."

MAKE WORKERS MASTERS
"At the time of this revolt we must at the first favorable opportunity proceed to an immediate seizure of all means of production and all articles of consumption and make the working class the masters in fact of all general wealth."

"At the same time we must mercilessly destroy all remains of governmental authority and class domination, liberating the prisoners, demolishing prisons and the offices of the state. We must take care that everything is wiped from the earth that is a reminder of the right of private ownership of property; to blow up barracks, gunnery and police administration and shoot the most prominent military and police officers must be the important concern of the revolting working people."

SAVE NEEDLESS BLOODSHED
"In the work of destruction we must be merciless, for the slightest weakness upon our part may afterward cost the working class a whole sea of needless blood."

"In completely destroying all vestiges of the dominion of capital and state we must try as soon as possible to start production upon new foundations; that is, extend the existing labor organizations and their unions and give production over to them. Every city should begin the work separately and proclaim a commune; that is, the union of free labor organizations will become masters of the city."

SUMMON TO REVOLT
"See how productive and commercial life is still, how dark and dismal stands the silent mills, manufacturing, workshops and warehouses."

"Who created all this wealth if not the worker? To whom should it belong if not to you, the proletariat? Throw away your slavish respect for the law. Destroy everything you need, feed all the hungry. Destroy your dirty collars and move into the palaces. Whoever shall hinder you, remove him from your path as a foe to your freedom!"

"But they may still say to us: 'Is it possible that you dream of breaking such a formidable force as that of present day government?' We answer that the general strike is the best means of weakening and destroying that force. The army is strong only at the time when it is concentrated at a few points. But what will become of the army when it has to be scattered all over the country? What will become of discipline when the soldier is convinced that he has to do, not with the army, but with internal enemies, but with the whole of the working people?"

THEY "HATE" RELIGION
"Does not the heart of the worker in uniform quake before the grand majority of the people in revolt? Does there not awaken in him a fraternal feeling of the solidarity of all toilers of all the oppressed? In that hour the army will at once stand in the van of the rebellious toilers."

"We may therefore formulate our tactics thus: By participating in the struggle of the working class, guiding it, and by unintermittently widening and dropping that struggle, kindle and maintain the conflagration of civil war until we have torn up by the roots capitalism and government."

Two grand divisions will parade through downtown streets. Captain James F. Shaw and Harry Anderson are division commanders.

In Shaw's division will be the navy recruiting band, here from San Francisco; official color-bearers from Portland marine corps recruiting office, American Legion, Canadian veterans; army, navy and marine corps recruiters; Aero Club of Oregon, G. A. R., Spanish-American war veterans, Sons of Veterans, Multnomah guard, fathers of service men, Boy Scouts, canteen girls, Red Cross workers, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., Knights of Columbus, War Camp Community service, Jewish Welfare board, American War Mothers and other war organizations.

THOUSANDS TO MARCH
City and county officials will lead the second division, under command of Harry Anderson. Fraternal and labor organizations, war drive officials and wounded war veterans and veterans of the civil war in automobiles are included.

The line of march is as follows: From courthouse west on Main to Broadway, north to Morrison, east on Morrison to Sixth, north on Sixth to Ankeny, counter-march on Sixth to Morrison, east on Morrison to Third, south on Third to The Auditorium.

Hubert Hudson, of Jacksonville, Or., and Rudolph Minch of Portland will be

decorated with the French croix de guerre with star at The Auditorium. The decoration ceremony will be conducted by Captain LeRoy Philip Hunt of the marine corps recruiting station.

A dance for ex-service men at the Multnomah hotel at 8:30 p. m. will conclude the official celebration.

Colonel John Leader, formerly of the Royal Irish Rifles, British army, but because of severe wounds sustained during America's participation in the war at the University of Oregon as military instructor, will lead the Canadian veterans' section in the Armistice day parade.

The Portland pipe band—the Klitties—will furnish music for the veterans in the parade. Pipe Major McDonald is in command.

Fire at Leona Investigated
Drain, Nov. 10.—Fire, thought to be incendiary, destroyed the Leona Mills store and office and the postoffice, located at Leona, three miles north of here, at 3:30 o'clock this morning. The loss will exceed \$10,000, partly covered by insurance. New buildings will be built and business resumed as quickly as possible.

Has Power to Raise Streetcar Fares

Washington, Nov. 10.—(U. P.)—State public utility commissions have the power to increase streetcar fares in municipalities, the supreme court held today in effect, by refusing to review the decisions of lower courts so holding.
