RESALES OF WHEAT LIKELY WITHIN FEW DAYS IN PORTLAND

Slightly easier tone is indicated in the fresh egg trade here with further declines in the California market which are acting as an influence against the local trade.

With the recent declines of more than 5c a dozen in the price of fresh eggs in California and with eastern markets not so firm of late, the situation in Portland is easier and some sales of fresh eggs are reported down to one a dozen...

Announcement is expected at any time of re-sale prices on wheat by the Grain Corporation and this is causing a general cessation of buying at Pacific Northwest primary points.

There has been a general disposition on the part of the Grain Corporation to work with the millers in supplying the home wants of wheat without forcing premiums to such a high point that the price of flour would be affected.

There is a greater offering of millstuffs than in the past and this is causing a decided fractionally easier. While some of the mill continues to ask \$40 a ton for stuffs...

Armistice Day November 11, 1919

A year ago star shells were breaking over No Man's Land; artillery moved up behind the advancing infantry; airplanes were the eyes of opposing forces; ships at sea were being guarded by the steel monsters of the navy; factory, loom and farm were giving their all—because war was our chief business.

American pride and patriotism swelled at the valiant deeds of Chateau-Thierry, Soissons, St. Mihiel, the Argonne and Sedan. The stamina and courage, that irresistible spirit of America's great fighting forces, was applying itself to the consummation of those noble purposes to which the nation had dedicated itself.

In those trying days, men had but one thought—to do the job and do it well. All else amounted to little. If doing the job meant death, with deliberation and calmness, then, giving up life was the most glorious, noble and honorable thing man could give his country.

A new era is here—an era in which living for one's country should be the all-important, all possessing determination of the day.

If to die for one's country in time of war is man's most noble act, then living for it in time of peace will justify the deeds of our valiant dead. Let us live for our country today, tomorrow and always.
