

### FREE MEMBERSHIP IN SUMMER SCHOOL IS OFFERED BOY OR GIRL

Trip to Corvallis and Two Weeks' Stay, Without Expense, to Industrial Projects Winner.

Salem, Nov. 13.—A free trip to Corvallis and membership in the boys' and girls' summer school, with all expenses paid for two weeks, will be given as the capital prize for the boy and girl who make the best showing in an industrial club project, according to announcement by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction. The industrial club work is under direction of N. C. Maris of the state educational department.

Funds to cover the expense of sending the winner in the work to Corvallis are provided by a group of Oregon business men and firms, there being no state appropriation to cover the costs. Contributors to the fund are the following:

**INJURED WORKMEN SLOW IN REPORTING ON ACCIDENTS**  
Salem, Nov. 13.—Working men entitled to compensation under the provisions of the compensation act frequently delay payment due them by their failure to send in their report of the accident, according to a statement issued by the state industrial accident commission. The commission finds that in the majority of cases the report of the worker is the last of the required reports received.

In the 841 cases coming before the commission during the week ending on November 8 it was found that on the average the surgeon sent in his report 12 days after the accident, the employer in 16 days and the worker in 21 days or over.

**APPLICATIONS FILED FOR USE OF WATER TO IRRIGATE LAND**  
Salem, Nov. 13.—Applications for permit to appropriate water have been filed in the office of State Engineer Percy A. Cupper by Ralph C. Hartley, Baker, for water from Sutton creek for the irrigation of a small tract; by C. H. Brooks, Richland, for water from Squaw gulch, as supplemental supply for the irrigation of land near Richland; and by Russell Maxwell, Payette, Idaho, for water from Snake river for irrigation of 250 acres on the Oregon side of the Snake, across the river from Payette.

J. W. McWhinney, Philomath, called at the office of the state engineer and made a personal application for water

from Stiltner creek, for the irrigation of a small tract near Philomath.

Mine owners recently claimed they could not meet the miners' demands. Negotiations to prevent a strike failed. The state, by proclamation of Governor Frazier, took over operation of the mines.

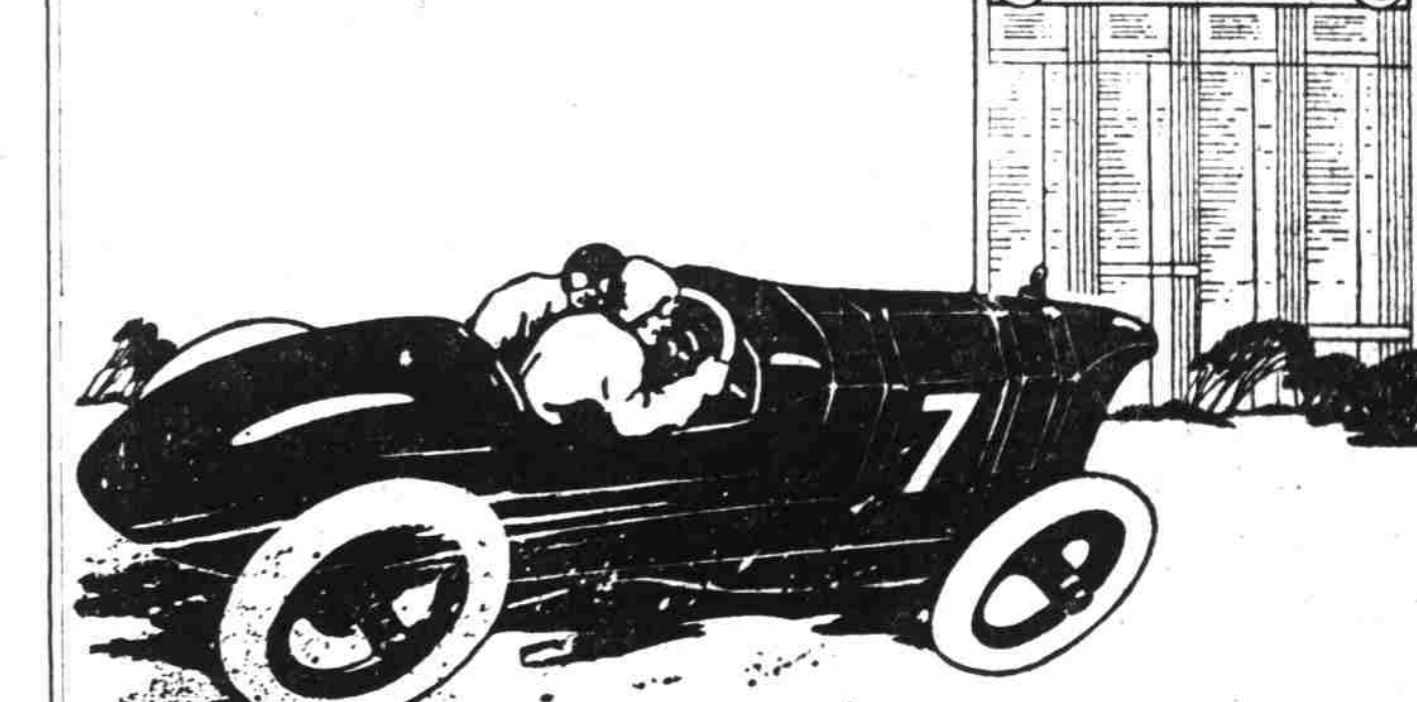
