JUDGE KANZLER DODGES TEST OF COURT, IS CHARGE

Girl Released by Kanzler After Filing of Habeas Writ Attacking Validity of Court.

GATENS CONTINUES CASE

A. M. Crawford and W. C. Campbell Say Law Creating Court of Domestic Relations Invalid.

Test of the validity of the act creating the court of domestic relations, which was brought to issue through a writ of habeas corpus for the release of Louise Bestine, aged 15, from the House of the Good Shepherd, was avoided for the time being Wednesday by Judge Jacob Kanzler, when he appeared before Presiding Judge Gatens and stated that the girl had been released two days after the writ had been sworn out.

Judge Kanzler asked the whole case be dropped on the ground that there was nothing against the girl in his court and that all charges against her had been dropped.

The request brought A. M. Crawford and W. C. Campbell, attorneys for the girl, to their feet in bitter protest. They charged Judge Kanzler with refusing to face the issue as to the constitutionality of his court and contended that whitewashing the charges against the girl after the writ had been brought to test the validity of the court was sidestepping.

"It seems to me a high-handed proceeding," said Attorney Campbell. "To throw this young girl into custody for a space of several weeks without charging her with any crime or misdemeanor and then turn her loose because a writ of habeas corpus is issued attacking the validity of the court."

Miss Bestine was given her liberty Monday, after suffering solitary confinement in the House of the Good Shepherd. The law is clear that once the writ has been issued by the circuit court no action of Judge Kanzler in smoothing things out by releasing the girl can prevent the matter coming up here on its merits.

Judge Kanzler stated that Miss Bestine had been released Monday in the ordinary course of events, after a mental and physical examination had been given to her. He said that as long as she went to school regularly everything would be all right.

Deputy District Attorney George Mowrey appeared for Judge Kanzler on the return of the writ, but stated that he could not defend the constitutionality of the court of domestic relations, for he had already prepared an opinion for District Attorney Walter H. Evans to the effect that the act creating it was invalid.

Judge Gatens allowed Judge Kanzler time to amend his return stating therein that the girl had been released, and that there was no reason for passing on the case at all.

Attorneys Campbell and Crawford said that they would contest this return and file an answer in order to bring the matter to issue on its merits. In this case Judge Gatens may determine the girl was legally imprisoned by a competent court, in which case an explanation of her abrupt release Monday night would have to be given. Or he may hold that she was illegally held by a competent court, which might result in a suit for damages. The only other decision would be that the law creating the court was invalid, and therefore all its acts were void.

Wartime Prohibition Is Unconstitutional, Two Judges Declare

Washington, Nov. 12.—Wartime prohibition was held to be unconstitutional by two federal judges Wednesday in rulings on applications of liquor interests for injunctions against enforcement of the law.

In Providence, R. I., Judge Brown issued a temporary injunction on the petition of the Narragansett Brewing company on the ground that wartime prohibition, ignoring the provision of the eighteenth amendment allowing dealers a period of one year for the disposal of the stocks of liquor. Saloons in the city immediately began the sale of 4 per cent beer.

United States Attorney General Baker announced he would take an immediate appeal.

In Louisville, Ky., Judge Evans indicated that he would grant an injunction restraining the collector of internal revenue from interfering with the sale of 1,000,000 gallons of whiskey held in bonded warehouses.

In Chicago, Levy Mayer, representing liquor interests, applied to Judge Carpenter in the federal court to enjoin the government from moving 6,000 gallons of whiskey belonging to a local concern, on the ground that the wartime prohibition law was passed under false pretenses, inasmuch as the armistice had been signed when it was passed.

Dope From Orient Seized on Steamer

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.) Customs officials have seized opium, gin and whiskey valued at approximately \$50,000 from the steamer Ecuador, which arrived here Monday from the Orient.
