

PAPERS ADVISED TO RAISE RATES

American Newspaper Publishers' Association Urges Advertising and Subscription Increase.

New York, Nov. 13.—(I. N. S.)—The following resolutions have been adopted by the American Newspaper Publishers' association, as a result of the special meeting held here yesterday, to devise means of overcoming a serious shortage of newsprint paper.

"That the regulations of the war industries board for the conservation of news print be strictly adhered to, and that the full text of all these regulations be sent to all the daily and Sunday newspapers of the United States, whether or not they are members of the A. N. P. A."

"That publishers everywhere be urged to materially increase advertising and subscription rates, and at the same time limit the size of their issues."

"That no newspaper enter into a yearly contract for advertising at a rate fixed, but make rates adjustable monthly or quarterly."

"That the A. N. P. A. send out a standard form of adjustable contract for advertising."

"That the paper committee strongly discourage the hoarding of print paper."

"That the white paper committee and the legislative committee of the A. N. P. A. urge the enactment of such legislation as will permit the development of waterpower so that our timber lands may be made fully available for the manufacture of wood pulp and paper; and we also recommend that congress be urged to take steps that will induce the Canadian government to repeal the order-in-council prohibiting the export of wood cut from crown lands."

University Students Have Serpentine in Streets of Eugene

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 13.—Chaplain Gilbert, formerly chaplain of the First army corps, who took of the events in France when the armistice was signed, was the principal speaker of the Armistice day assembly here. The entire student body of the university attended the assembly, after which it formed in a line of march with the band at its head, marching down town, being joined at Eleventh and Williamette streets by the Eugene high school serpentine. The parade ended at the old armory with a dance.

Chaplain Gilbert, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Astoria, said those living would uphold those principles for which so many gave their lives. Other speakers on the program were E. C. Simmons, president of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce, and E. L. Goodrich.

Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 13.—The students of the Auburn high school believed they knew the real meaning of armistice day and refused to attend classes Tuesday. Two hundred and fifty of them were suspended today. "They may return on Monday," said the principal, "if they procure an essay on the meaning of the day."

Vocational Classes Are Organized for State College Work

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Nov. 13.—Organization of the vocational students of the college on the same basis as other classes is nearing completion. George R. Hyslop, professor of farm crops, will act as faculty advisor for the group. The total number enrolled in vocational courses is 313. Many of these were wounded while in service and were sent to the college by the federal board.

The vocational students have heretofore been classed with the freshmen. Because of the large number of freshmen the last two years and the diversity of interests between vocational and degree students, a separate organization was considered necessary. Ernest Larson of Turner is acting chairman of the organization. Chairmen of committees are as follows: Vin-

cent R. Deamer of Los Angeles, constitution and by-laws; James H. Imbrie of Hillsboro, nomination of officers; Clara Owens of Boise, Idaho, class insignia; John E. Lamb of Jefferson, social committee; Winnie Shoemaker, Barometer reporter.

Vocational enrollment in the college by schools is as follows: Agriculture, 99; engineering, 126; commerce, 57; industrial arts, 4; home economics, 27. Of the total college enrollment 10.3 per cent are vocational students.

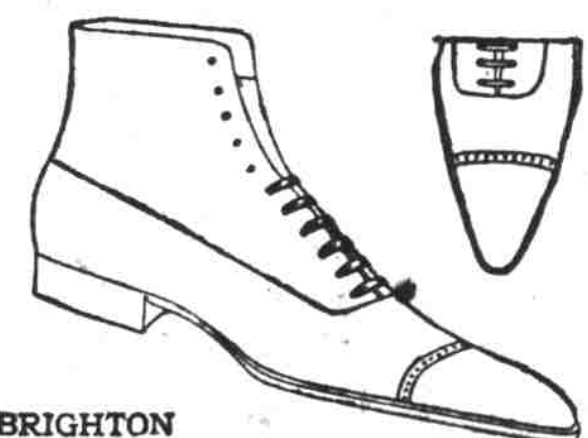
