

TEACHER ON LOW WAGE MAY HARM, SAYS DR. STEARNS

Eastern Educator Declares Instructor Who Spreads Socialism Is Result of Under Pay.

SPEAKS TO ANDOVER ALUMNI

Finds Cities, Where Socialists Deliberately Hold Salaries Down to Aid Their Propaganda.

"The gum chewing teacher who helps spread Socialist propaganda is a direct result of under pay," declared Dr. Alfred E. Stearns, principal of Phillips academy, Andover, Mass., in an address before Andover alumni Monday afternoon at the University club.

The schools are becoming fertile ground for the spread of socialistic, bolshevist and anarchistic ideas, added the head of the oldest endowed secondary school in the United States.

Sherman R. Hall, head of Hall & Co., and formerly director for Oregon of Four Minute Men, presided at the gathering.

AVERAGE SALARY VIS LOW

"The average salary paid secondary

sulted, first, in the fact that the number of vacancies in the teaching staff of the public schools today has been variously estimated at 42,000 to 100,000 of 750,000 usually employed. Yet practically all who were formerly on the substitute lists are now teaching. Many teachers have been practically driven off the boards. The disappearance of men teachers is significant. The women teachers are of a totally different class from what they were 10 to 15 years ago. The vast majority of those going in today are comparatively young girls with practically no cultural or intellectual background, and with intent by only a few to make teaching their life work. Approximately 60 per cent of those teaching are teaching up to the full limit of their training.

"If we had the right character of teachers this movement throughout the country for organization of teachers' unions would not be under way. This is definitely a result of inferior pay."

MANY TEACHERS SOCIALISTS
"In a large city of the Northwest that I visited recently a member of the school board said my statements were borne out absolutely by the situation there. That 100 professed Socialists were teaching in the schools of that city. That there were three full-fledged Socialists on his own school board, of which he had been a member. That these men would probably block every attempt to increase teachers' pay in that city for the very reason that increased pay would attract a better class and would deprive them of the hold which they had, and which they hoped to increase, by this most effective instrument for the spread of their propaganda."

I. W. W. Threat Is Ignored by Vets At Salem Meeting

Salem, Nov. 18.—Undaunted by the receipt of an I. W. W. warning to "remember Centralia," 150 veterans of the Civil, Spanish and world wars assembled in the armory here Monday night to consider ways and means for overcoming the "red" menace and declared themselves as being in readiness to at any time bear arms. If necessary, to put down any suspicion of a radical uprising in this community.

The warning letter, which was received by F. S. Thompson, commander of the Sedgewick post No. 10, G. A. R., admonished the veterans to "soft-pedal a little," declaring that the G. A. R. members were safe, but that the Spanish war and world war veterans had "better not get too gay, or they will get theirs, all right."

PROHIBITION LEADER PREDICTS DRY WORLD WITHIN TEN YEARS

Wheeler Expects Only Polar Regions and African Jungles From Dry Territory in 1929.

Washington, Nov. 18.—(L. N. S.)—Those seeking climate where there is no danger of interference with the rights of bartenders are advised to consult real estate agents in the Polar regions and the jungle section of Africa. The rest of the world will be "Saharized" by 1929, says Wayne B. Wheeler, "dry" leader and general counsel for the Anti-Saloon League of America, cheerfully predicted today.

Wheeler expected the jungle precincts in Africa and the Polar regions because they are the only sections not heard from in the reports of "dry" activities. He pointed out, however, that the mail service in those parts has always been poor and, maybe, it would be just as well to wait a while before packing the furniture.

England, he said, may be the last country to join the dry column because of its "hard drinking women." "We'll get half of Scotland very soon," he said, "but our only hope in England at the present is local option. Our job is made hard there by the fact that so many women, chiefly those of the working classes, are inveterate drinkers. Before the war it would have been easier for us. Now the women of the working classes are having one grand, glorious time with their war earnings, and the fact that their sex so greatly outnumber the men is giving them the feeling of reckless independence."

Wives of Carnival Men Admit Thefts From Albany Store

Albany, Nov. 18.—Apprehended in Independence and brought back to Albany by Sheriff Kendall, Mrs. Dorothy Piman and Mrs. Marjorie Larry, young married women, face a charge of shoplifting from the Hamilton store. They were cabaret girls with an amusement company. They married carnival employees recently at Vancouver and came to Albany, where the show paraphernalia is stored for the winter. Both women have admitted their guilt.

Bank Sued by Farmers

Tibany, Nov. 18.—Alleging that George J. Wilhelm, president of the Farmers & Merchants bank of Harrisburg, has refused to allow them access to the corporate books of the bank, in which they are stockholders, John R. Cartwright and George A. McCart, farmers of Harrisburg, have brought suit against Wilhelm and the bank.

Man With I. W. W. Credentials Gets 60-Day Sentence

Eugene, Nov. 18.—G. E. Murray, carrying credentials with him, authorizing him to organize I. W. W. bodies and collect monthly dues for the I. W. W., will spend 60 days in jail. He was found hiding in a potato car at Junction City. He gave the name of John Everett, but his handwriting corresponded with that of the I. W. W. credentials. He was given a jail term and a description of him was sent to the Centralia officials, as it was thought that he might be one of the Centralia I. W. W., making his way south.

Members of 2 Labor Unions Won't Work Together in Plant

Maynard, Mass., Nov. 17.—(L. N. S.)—War between the "conservative United Textile Workers of America," a part of the American Federation of Labor, and the "radical" Amalgamated Textile Workers union was launched here today when 700 weavers affiliated with the former union struck rather than work with 400 weavers claiming membership in the latter organization.

The Assabet mills were most affected. They are a subsidiary of the American Woolen company.

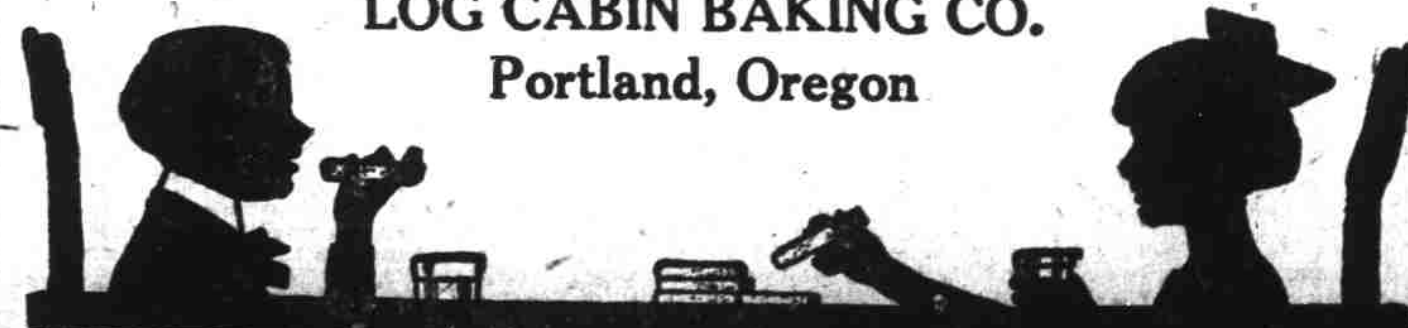
