

ALLEGED I. W. W. ARRESTED HERE GET JAIL TERMS

Six of First Ten Taken in Raid on Headquarters Are Convicted and Given Heavy Sentences.

THREE HELD FOR GRAND JURY

One I. W. W. Says Girl Waits for Him at Altar; Judge Says, Tell Her to Put It Off for Months.

Only one man of the first 10 men tried as I. W. W. in the municipal court Wednesday afternoon, following the raid on the local headquarters on the night of the Armistice celebration, was released without sentence. He was William Melmont, who entered a plea of not guilty, alleging that he was only standing out in the street watching proceedings and was unfortunately caught

in the crowded stairway and taken to the police station through error. Judge Rosman gave him the benefit of the doubt, and allowed him to go free.

Six of the others tried Wednesday were given jail sentences and heavy fines, and three were held over for grand jury investigation. All the others, out of the "class" of 57, expressed a desire to delay their hearing in the municipal court until after the grand jury investigation, which is being conducted.

CLARK IS SENTENCED

The raid on the headquarters of the council of soldiers, sailors and workers, where the I. W. W. have rented desk room, was conducted by patrolmen led by Captain Lewis. Lieutenant Harvey Thatcher and Sergeant Ervine, acting under orders from Mayor Baker and Chief of Police Jenkins.

The heaviest penalty was meted out to Joseph Clark, convicted on the same charge several months ago, with his first case now in appeal on \$1000 bond. Clark demanded the right to know the law before he entered his plea. The complaint against him was read, but this was not sufficient to satisfy him. He wanted to hear it read out of a clothbound statute book.

HIS GIRL MUST WAIT

Fred Putnam explained to the court that he had only gone down to the hall to get a copy of the Battle Daily Bulletin. He denied membership in the organization, alleging that he was employed by the Associated Engineering Company. "I'd certainly like to get off," he said. "My girl in Los Angeles is waiting to marry me now."

"Set your wedding date four months from today," replied the judge, with a faint smile. \$100 and 120 days.

Floyd Hyde, who was chairman of the monster mass meeting protesting against class prisoners which was broken up in the Plaza block two months ago, was about to be released on a suspended sentence when he spoiled his chances by delivering an oration, in addition to his plea for clemency because of his wife and children. He was sentenced to serve six months, with sentence suspended, and held over for the grand jury investigation.

HE DEFINES SABOTAGE

Elmer Randolph, who was sentenced to four months and fined \$100, gave as a definition to sabotage, in reply to a question from the court, "Don't work too hard or kill yourself with labor."

Someone in the courtroom muttered, "No such luck."

Offering a lack of education as his plea, James O'Brien was fined \$200 and sentenced to serve six months. "In Portland there are free night schools that even furnish you books," was the reply made by the court.

William Rockwood, who said he was a fireman on a freighter running between the United States and England, was fined \$200 and sentence to serve six months. Boris Skogland was sentenced to 60 days. Skogland could scarcely speak English, and had great difficulty in understanding the questions put to him. Harry McGovern, a brother of Pat McGovern, who was sentenced to 120 days on a similar charge several days ago, was held over for the grand jury. Fred Kellert was also held over for the grand jury.

"In order to consider exactly what constitutes vagrancy," said Judge Rosman, addressing the prisoners just before they were removed from the court room, "one must consider the purposes of providing laws, in establishing courts of justice, and in maintaining institutions for the protection of law abiding citizens."

VAGRANTS TIME WASTERS

"Vagrants belong to a class that is forever wasting time, idling about, either planning to commit crimes and

likely to commit crimes themselves, or associating with others who are engaged in tearing down instead of building up the government.

"The essence of vagrancy is association with other men of criminal tendencies, always in the mood and likely to commit violence. We cannot judge alone by actual figures of money in possession. There are hundreds of law-abiding citizens who may be very deep in debt, and yet their position in the community, their reputation for steady loyalty and absolute allegiance to the laws of the country prevent even a suggestion of vagrancy being coupled with their names."

"No man can make a success of life without getting pleasure out of his work. Your one thought, even when you are at work, is to bring the two factory whistles as close together as possible. The trouble is not with our government, our constitution or our laws. The trouble is within ourselves. Do not deceive yourselves into believing that you can reform the world. I feel safe in asserting that no book worth reading, no invention worth considering, no music worth hearing, no building worth occupying, no piece of art worth looking at, no poem worth repeating has ever been produced by an I. W. W."

PRINCE RUBS ELBOWS WITH CROWDS IN N. Y.; HAS DELIGHTFUL TIME

Britain's Heir Apparent Guest at Brilliant Social Function Given by Mrs. Reid.

New York, Nov. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Although he had danced until after 1 o'clock this morning, following his visit to the opera, the Prince of Wales was fresh as the proverbial daisy as he came ashore from the British battleship Renown this morning. Perfect weather prevailed for his visit to the United States military academy at West Point. The prince was delighted over his experience of last evening when he mingled with the crowds in Fifth avenue. Accompanied by a secret service agent and a member of his suite the prince walked for some distance down the avenue, looking into store windows and elbowing his way through traffic jams at the street crossings. A taxicab almost ran him down at a street corner, but he laughed over it.

A dance was given at the home of Mrs. Whitelaw Reid and was the biggest and most brilliant social affair that has been held in New York since the outbreak of the war. Miss Millicent Rogers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Rogers, with whom the prince had danced in

Washington and White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., proved the favorite dancing partner of the young honor guest.

Police Chief Asks Public Cooperation In War on Thieves

Greater cooperation on the part of the public is asked by Chief of Police Jenkins in combating criminals. Motorcycle policemen have been stationed at telephones in several parts of the city. If the public will aid the police by calling at once, the chief announced, these motorcycle men can be on their way to the scene of the crime within one minute, as the police have perfected a system of getting into immediate communication.

Additional men will be sent from police headquarters, but the motorcycle policeman on the east side will have an advantage over the headquarters men if he gets the call in time. What the police need is a good description of men engaged in robberies.

Charge Made That Disloyal Men Are Employed Denied

Salem, Nov. 30.—A charge made by Sheriff Wilson of Clackamas county in a letter to Governor Olcott that certain men in the employ of the Western Contract company, engaged in state highway work in that section, are un-American and not entitled to be paid out of the funds of good American citizens, is emphatically denied by C. P. Knowles.

Nunn, state highway engineer, this morning, Knowles states that there were at one time a few agitators in his camp, but that these had been eliminated by discharge. Inasmuch as Knowles is an overseas veteran; with 18 months' service in France to his credit, and a member of the American Legion, members of the state highway department here are inclined to regard the statement as sufficient.
