

# LIVESTOCK PRICES REACH NEW LEVEL AT LOCAL SALES

Eighteen-Month-Old Grand Prize Steer Is Sold for \$56 a Hundred Pounds at Exposition.

## HOG CHAMPION SETS MARK

Carload of Poland China Hogs Sold to Swift Packing Co. for \$25 Hundred, Total \$4790.

Livestock price records reached a new Pacific coast high level at the Pacific International Livestock exposition this morning, when it was announced that Baldy, the 18-month-old grand prize Hereford-Galloway steer, had been sold by the Washington State college to M. J. Oll at \$56 a hundred pounds, making a total of \$694.40. The highest price paid previously on the coast for stock of this class was \$26 a hundred pounds.

Idaho Favorite, a past two-year roan shorthorn steer, was sold at a rate of \$23 a hundred to Hill & McClelland. The total for this sale was \$529.40.

A new high level was also reached in hog prices when Chandler & Johnson sold their grand prize hog, weighing 400 pounds, at a rate of \$50 a hundred.

In the sale of breeding shortorns conducted Thursday afternoon it was announced that the Pacific Northwest Shorthorn Breeders' association had sold 23 cows at \$25.00, an average of \$27.22 each, and 22 bulls at \$19.75, an average of \$28.77.

The top sale in the breeder class was made in Super Prince by Day & Rothrock to M. R. Biggs of Prineville for \$3500. The top cow was Little Sweetheart, which was sold by T. S. Glidewell to the American Importation Co. of Chicago for \$2200. Little Sweetheart was the grand champion breeder cow of the show.

A carload of 16 grand champion steers was sold by Ed Coles of Hayden, Or., to Swift & Co. for \$481.20, or \$22 a hundred pounds. Sixteen Angus steers in the two-year class were also sold to Swift & Co. by George Dixon for \$327. A carload of 60 Poland China hogs were sold to Swift by Chandler & Johnson at \$4790, or \$25 a hundred pounds.

"Radiant" took first prize in the class entered for the Baltimore cup.

## STATE LAW MAKES NO LICENSE PLANS FOR HEAVY TRUCKS

Trucks Above Five-Ton Capacity "Can't Claim Right to Use Highways."

Salem, Nov. 21.—What is to become of the big truck of more than five ton carrying capacity in Oregon?

That is the question that is starting in the face of the owners of these leviathans of the public highway just now. Heretofore the state has been licensing trucks of this size at \$5 per year, but it has been necessary to secure a permit at \$8 per month from the county court before the trucks could use the public highway.

The last legislature made no provision for the licensing of these large trucks in passing its revised motor vehicle law. In fact, a minimum carrying capacity of five tons is specified in the 1919 law.

An interpretation of the law by Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle for the benefit of the secretary of state's office fails to uncover any loopholes whereby the big trucks can claim a right to recognition on the public thoroughfare.

Three applications for the licensing of trucks of more than five tons' capacity have already been received at the automobile department in the secretary of state's office and are expected, as there are probably 100 or more of these trucks in operation in Oregon at this time.

## SUCCESSORS TO INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION

Salem, Nov. 21.—W. L. Brewster of Portland will succeed E. B. McNaughton, also of Portland, as a member of the industrial welfare commission when the latter's term expires, January 1, according to a statement by Governor Olcott.

McNaughton has asked that he be not reappointed on the commission as other interests prevent his attention to the affairs of the welfare body.

## HEUL IS TO IRRIGATE 367 ACRES OF LAND NEAR JOSEPH

Salem, Nov. 21.—The irrigation of 367 acres of land near Joseph, Walla Walla county, is contemplated by Heul Joseph, who has filed with the state engineer's office an application for permission to appropriate waters from Little Sheep and Big Sheep creeks.

The Heul Joseph company and the Dobbin Ditch company of Joseph have filed application covering the appropriation of water from the Walla Walla river for the irrigation of 257 acres in the vicinity of Enterprise.

## GRAVITY WATER SYSTEM PLANS ARE FORWARDED TO SALEM

Salem, Nov. 21.—Plans and specifications for a gravity water system for the city of Heppner have been forwarded to the state engineer's office for approval by the state board of health.

Plans for a sewer system at Seaside have also been filed with the state engineer for approval.

### PORTLAND BANKS HAVE INCREASED THEIR DEPOSITS

Financial Institutions in City Show Healthy Gain Since Last Report Submitted Sept. 12.

### MAKE NEW HIGH RECORD

Twenty-One Out of 23 Have Increased Deposits Amounting to \$9,564,990.23.

In response to the call for statements, issued by the comptroller of the currency and the Oregon state banking department, for the condition of national and state banks as of Monday, November 17, Portland banks show a substantial increase in deposits over the last call as of September 12, and thereby establish a new high record.

Twenty-one of the 23 banks show total deposits of \$176,022,475, a gain of \$2,584,806.23 over the previous call. The gain in loans and discounts is \$10,848,449.02 over the total of September 12. The figures are as follows:

### Sum of \$241,812.68 on Hand June 30, After Meeting Liability Needs of Present.

Salem, Nov. 21.—After setting aside sufficient funds to take care of all its liabilities, the state industrial accident commission had a net surplus of \$241,812.68 on June 30, 1919, according to an examination and audit of the industrial accident fund by J. W. Ferguson, certified public accountant and a member of the commission.
