

HOLMAN URGES THAT WORK ON BRIDGES PROCEED

County Commissioner Declares That Situation Demands Project Be Started on Its Way.

ROCKPILE IS DISCUSSED

Quarters Ready Now and Bids for Erection of Stockade Will Be Opened Next Wednesday.

Declaring that continued delays in the matter of repairing and reconstructing the Willamette river bridges was a menace to the public safety, County Commissioner Holman stated this morning that immediate action is necessary and actual work should be begun without further delay.

"I can't see where the continued asking for reports is accomplishing very much," he said. "I contend that it is high time to engage in actual work of reconstruction of these bridges, having in mind more the safety of the people in crossing the spans than the necessary expense incident thereto."

Holman stated that he had been pleading at every budget planning for appropriations for these bridges and had been overruled, the belief apparent by being that the bridges would "do for another year." He stated that in October, 1918, the city police were requested to regulate the traffic on the bridges, but took no action for a year.

A month ago the state highway commission was requested by the county commissioners to inspect the bridges, but until this morning, when a communication was received by Commissioner Holman, no official cognizance was taken of the request, so far as the county commissioners knew.

Concerning the Kelly Butte rockpile, Holman said that the quarters there were ready for occupancy and that the bids for the erection of the stockade will be opened Wednesday. He said that criticism of the condition of Kelly Butte, which had fallen into disrepair since it was abandoned, was due to ignorance of the facts, the commission not having any money for that purpose since they believed it would not be used again. After the Centralia episode Sheriff Hurlburt stated that he would be prepared to prepare Kelly Butte as quickly as they could.

The crusher is nearly worn out, but Kelly Butte will be operated with its present facilities until equipment can be replaced.

At the meeting of the commissioners Monday bids will be authorized for replacement equipment and will be opened the first week in December, so that the costs of the new materials will fall to the 1920 budget, which is now in course of preparation.

Fitzpatrick Leads Fight on Gompers In Chicago Session

Chicago, Nov. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Led by John Fitzpatrick, president of the Chicago Federation of Labor, and the acknowledged leader of the radical element in the American Federation of Labor, delegates to the labor convention here tomorrow, called by Fitzpatrick for the expressed purpose of organizing a national labor party, are expected to launch the first open attack "from within" on Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor.

Several hundred delegates are here today to attend the conference. Labor leaders here say Fitzpatrick has aligned himself with other anti-Gompers men and that these are determined to oust Gompers, who has repeatedly opposed Fitzpatrick's efforts to organize a national labor party and place a strictly labor ticket in the next presidential election.

3 Plans Considered For Public Market; No Decision Reached

Decision as to extending the Carroll public market has not been reached by Commissioner Bigelow. Three distinct plans of extension are being considered.

One plan is to extend the market to the waterfront. Building Inspector Plummer says this extension is the best in that the market should be kept from branching west of Fifth street or south of Yamhill street. Another proposed change in the erection of stalls from second to fourth on Taylor street.

Others advocate the purchase of the Corbett and Failing blocks, bounded by Yamhill, Salmon, Fifth and Sixth streets. Plummer asserts that these blocks could only be secured at a sum close to \$10,000, which would make their purchase prohibitive to the city.

3 Highwaymen Hold Up 2 Men; Robbery Nets Thugs 50 Cents

C. P. Smith, who lives at Forty-first and Knapp streets, reported to the police early this morning that he was held up at Forty-first and Knapp streets about 10:45 Friday night by three highwaymen. A short time after this T. J. Connelly, who lives at Crystal Lake boulevard and East Thirty-seventh street, reported the same three men stopped him and took 50 cents from him. Smith lost nothing. Neither victim saw a gun. All three were dressed in English tight-fitting suits. Two of the men were about 5 feet 11 inches tall and the other about 5 feet 5 inches. All were young.

EUROPEAN LEAGUE OF NATIONS SEEN

Paris Believes American Senate's Action Means Return to Old Systems of Control.

Paris, France, Nov. 20.—(Delayed.)—"The Versailles treaty is dead," was the message flashed about Paris following the news that the United States senate had adjourned without ratification. The mortuary report was stoutly disputed, however, some persons close to Washington and the supreme council insisting that a compromise would be reached during the recess.

Though the French foreign office is said to have been advised that a compromise is still possible it is known that the officials have been considering the possibilities of leaving America out of the calculations and are taking steps to tighten the alliance with England. No doubt is expressed that Foreign Minister Pichon, while in England with President Poincaré, discussed the serious situation of France and the need for a closer union of France and Britain.

Opinion here ranges from the expression of Le Temps that "United by two wars of independence, the American people are in a position to never doubt America" to those of pessimists declaring that America has deserted Europe.

Official French opinion is taking on a tone of asperity. A man high in industrial life here said: "It was short of absolute victory. We were checked by promises that America would assist in the reorganization of Europe for the permanent safety of humanity. Now America, if I read the Washington dispatches right, seems inclined to desert France, not to speak of the smaller nations. In this I do not forget that America helped us to win such a victory as we obtained, but some of us cannot understand the reasoning apparently of the American representatives in the United States."

NEW ALLIANCES SEEN
Another student of international affairs predicted that France and Britain would now seek to dominate Europe by the old-time methods and would settle well-worn issues like the Adriatic and Turkish problems to suit their own advantage, the smaller nations again becoming political pawns. A prominent editor said: "It is evident that the majority of Americans could not believe that we should favor the League of Nations. If the treaty is really dead they will have the dubious satisfaction of seeing a league created under a new form—a real league of Europe—the great nations, and the smaller nations, splendid isolation, including more or less isolation in foreign trade."

Today's dispatches from Washington followed immediately by a proposal in the supreme council that the treaty ratifications take place December 1. An apparently inspired dispatch appearing in the Paris combination newspaper published on Saturday, the printer of the strike, asserted that the date was officially fixed but it is understood that it was suggested only as a date "to aim at." The resumption of the discussion of this subject, however, was deemed significant either of the belief of the allied representatives that the treaty was killed or of an effort to hasten a compromise in Washington. The American peace delegation finds itself compelled to keep silent in all decisions. It is just watching the preparations of Europe to restore a complete state of peace, wondering what President Wilson will do about summoning the council of the League of Nations and wondering whether the Washington dispatches mean what they say.

CO-ED ADMITS SHE SHOT HER RIVAL IN SPIRIT OF REVENGE

Sensational Confession Clears Up Mystery Shot Case Which Stirred Wesley Students.

Delaware, Ohio, Nov. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Staid Ohio Wesleyan college thrilled with the details of the most sensational love "triangle" case in its history which was climaxed today by the confession of Blanche Davidson, 19, freshman co-ed, that, actuated by jealousy, she fired the mystery shot which late yesterday seriously wounded Gladys Racey as she ascended the stairway of Gray's chapel.

The confession came, according to the police, shortly before noon today at the police station following a long grilling. The girl, at first defiant, became tearful and finally told the officers her story.

REVOLVER IS FOUND
A revolver wrapped in a woman's stocking found near the scene of the shooting, yesterday gave the police the clue which led them to suspect Miss Davidson.

According to the police the Davidson girl told them she had carried the revolver for several days awaiting an opportunity to "get" Miss Racey, whom she described as "my rival."

According to the confession the third figure in the "love triangle" was a well known young student at Ohio State university, whose name was given to the police, they say.

The girl told the officials that both her and Miss Racey had "found favor in his eyes," but that lately his attentions had been showered on Miss Racey.

Friday she cut the Spanish class, which both girls attended, and waited in the hallway until the Racey girl left the classroom. She then followed her up the stairs, shooting when the landlady was reached, the police say she told them.

The girl is being held at police station where the confession was made. She will be charged with shooting with intent to kill.

The young woman is a daughter of C. M. Davidson, residing south of this city. She is a graduate of Delaware high school. The revolver she confessed she obtained from a workman employed at the Girls' Industrial home, where she was employed during last summer.

The clerk, The Racey girl, whose home is at Caldwell, passed a good night at the hospital and is believed out of danger.

Irrigation States Join in Conference Held at Salt Lake

Salt Lake, Nov. 22.—Importance attached to the outlining of a policy on which all the irrigation states might unite, was evidenced by the attendance at the conference of the Utah House of Representatives, held Friday of the conference called by Governor D. W. Davis of Idaho. Each state of 13, extending from Texas and Nebraska to Washington, has 10 votes. Each state was represented by from three to 10 delegates by actual count.

The conference at the morning session adopted permanent officers. E. B. Ault, editor of the paper, took charge. Ault and his men were ousted on November 13 and again on November 14 on a writ issued by the federal court in which it was charged the plant was being used to further the alleged plans of radicals against the government.

United States Commissioner McClelland this afternoon ruled that the writ under which the plant was seized on November 13 became void when the plant was returned to its owners that afternoon and that the second seizure was without authority.

I. W. W. Start Fight; Legion Men End It

Corvallis, Nov. 22.—I. W. W. at work among the hundreds of men employed in the new lumber camps in south Benton county gave prospect of trouble in that region Thursday afternoon. Deputy Sheriff Taylor and members of Withycombe post, American Legion, of Corvallis, went to the vicinity armed and prepared for trouble, but found that the agitators had left. According to rumor here, an I. W. W. organization has been maintained at the camp, but no trouble had developed heretofore.

Case of Leprosy Found in Yakima; Veteran Is Victim

Yakima, Wash., Nov. 22.—Yakima physicians agree that a well defined case of leprosy has been located in this county. The victim, Otto Wagner of Sunnyside, is being held under rigid quarantine. Dr. John B. Anderson of the state health office has confirmed the local diagnosis of the case. Wagner is about 50 years old and has lived in Sunnyside for a number of years, working at farm labor. Physicians believe he has had the disease for 10 years. The case is of the tumorous type, which is but slightly contagious. Dr. Anderson says the man cannot be taken out of the county. The victim spent four years in military service in the Philippines. He has not suffered greatly and has been able to work until a month ago.

Yakima, Wash., Nov. 22.—With five suspects lodged in the county jail Sheriff Sam Hutchinson is still of the opinion that the real culprits in the Ernest M. Newcomb murder case are still at liberty, saying he knows who is wanted. The object was robbery, the police say.

"Dope" Haul Is Made
Yakima, Wash., Nov. 22.—A "dope" raid has resulted in the arrest of O. M. Campbell, James P. Davis and Roscoe McKee. Campbell had on his person \$500 worth of morphine in a bag sewed into his coat. Davis had \$125 in money and a roll of Mexican currency.

Mrs. Beauregard Is Acquitted by Jury For Husband's Death

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 22.—A verdict of not guilty was rendered Friday afternoon after five hours' deliberation by the jury hearing the case of Mrs. Elizabeth Beauregard, charged with the murder of her husband, Jules J. Beauregard.

I. W. W. Organizer Given Heavy Penalty

Moscow, Idaho, Nov. 22.—Five to 10 years in the Idaho penitentiary was the sentence handed James V. Bliss, confessed I. W. W., after Bliss had pleaded guilty to a charge of criminal syndicalism. Bliss is the I. W. W. organizer, who narrowly escaped being lynched at Winchester, Idaho, when captured by members of the American Legion.

S.)—Police here today were confident that in the arrest of two men at San Jose they had captured the murderer of Detective Antone Schoenbe, killed here Sunday night last. The two men, who fit the description of Schoenbe's murderers, shot and seriously wounded Deputy Sheriff Condon when taken into custody.
