So It Is in Lives of Lucio and Simpicio, Who Are So United No Man Can Tear Asunder.

Everywhere Lucio Godino goes Simpicio gets a hunch that there is an interesting picture on the opposite wall of the Benson hotel lobby. Lucio, willing or otherwise, is certain to be a party to its inspection.

Lucio and Simpicio, 11-year-old natives of Manila, Philippine islands, are "Siamese" twins. They were guests in Portland over Friday night and until 10 o'clock this morning, when they resumed their journey toward Washington, D. C., there to enter school.

The twins are joined at the hips as the result of some odd circumstance of nature, but are otherwise normal, healthy youngsters.

The lads this morning declined to pose for a picture on the ground that a San Francisco newspaper man had failed to return a large picture he borrowed and thus cast suspicion upon the whole profession. However, they had their own collection of snapshots and while Simpicio protested that he would not part with a one of them, Lucio fished one from his pocket and passed it over.

The boys have made four trips to the United States. They speak English well and from choice, although when communicating with their guardian they mix English and Filipino in an amusing way. Each spelled his name out in English as readily as any American school boy.

The boys are traveling to Washington with Theodore R. Yango, resident commissioner from the islands, who is en route to Washington by way of Portland and Seattle. With them is also Marian Mercado of Manila, secretary to Yango.

The lads are independent in all their actions except walking, for, unless there is to be a tugging match, both must determine upon a single course. They walk side by side, but at a slight angle. Seated, they are forced to assume the same angle of posture.

BRIGHT LITTLE FELLOWS

Yango declares the boys are unusually bright and have advanced well in their school work. Perforce, both must make about the same advance in studies, else the other is handicapped. They dress themselves individually, apparently taking turns at that part of their anatomy of which they are common owners. They think and act independently, each having the full individual use of normal, thoroughly developed pairs of arms and legs. Their physical characteristics are similar only to the same extent as are those of other normal twins.

No record of a disagreement between the twins is available to their guardian and speculation as to the result of a physical encounter makes an interesting subject for those who see the twins.

Committee of Five Appointed to Sift Pederson's Claim

Marshall N. Dana, W. F. Woodward, Otto Hartwig, Franklin T. Griffith and E. B. McNaughton were this morning appointed by Mayor Baker as a committee to determine whether or not the city has any moral responsibility in the claim placed by Hans Pederson, contractor, and his bondsmen for the sum of \$50,000, which they assert as their loss in the construction of The Auditorium. Mayor Baker, in appointing the committee, asked each member by letter to render an unbiased opinion after sifting down all facts. Opinion rendered some time ago by City Attorney LaRoche was that the city is not legally bound to pay the claims. Question of moral responsibility has existed for some time.

CHINESE EX-SERVICE MAN CUT TO DEATH IN HIS STORE IN ASTORIA

Criminals Who Were Caught Robbing His Place Last Summer Under Suspicion.

Astoria, Nov. 25.—His head a mass of lacerations, a towel jammed into his mouth and bound with stout twine from head to foot, Frank Gowan, a Chinese merchant and an ex-service man, was found dying in the basement of his store, 388 Commercial street, late Friday night. He was removed to St. Mary's hospital, where he died before he could give a coherent account of the crime or a description of his assailants. The police are holding one man, Elmer Meltau, for investigation, but stated today that they did not think he was in any way implicated.

Gowan's store is less than a block from the county jail and was robbed last summer. The robbers were caught at that time in the place by Gowan and were subsequently convicted and some of them sentenced. The police are inclined to the belief that possibly one of these men may have had something to do with the murder.

William Spellmire, whose place of business adjoins the Gowan store, heard groans coming from the basement of the Gowan store, but for an hour or more paid no attention to it. Later he notified the police and accompanied them when they broke into the store and found Gowan, mumbling incoherently. The interior of the man's room, which is in the rear of the store, bore evidences of a struggle, and there were

many knife marks on the door leading to the basement stairs. Gowan lay on his side, his head in a pool of blood and a towel securely tied over his mouth. His feet were tied together and the cord was then wound round and round his body, his arms being tied and then bound to his body. Coroner E. B. Hughes is conducting an investigation.

Lester Humphreys' Commission as U. S. Attorney on Way

Commission as United States attorney in the Oregon district was mailed today to Lester W. Humphreys from Washington, D. C., according to a telegram from Attorney General Mitchell Palmer.

Humphreys was recommended a few weeks ago for the post, but delay in issuing his commission prevented his installation. He succeeds Bert E. Haney, who retired to private practice. Humphreys was recommended by Assistant United States Attorney Elton Watkins, resigned, it is said. Acting United States Attorney Barnett Goldstein will tender his resignation.

Two Small Fires Started

The fire department extinguished two small blazes this morning. At 640 First street an electric motor became overheated at 1:30 a. m. and caused a small fire. At 1:45 a. m. fire was found at the foot of Pettygrove street, where someone had carelessly thrown hot ashes into a barrel.

WOMAN RESIDENT OF GLADSTONE INJURED WHEN HIT BY AN AUTO

Mrs. W. F. Swigert's Leg Is Broken and Bad Gash Is Cut in Her Forehead.

Oregon City, Nov. 25.—Mrs. W. F. Swigert, about 55 years of age, residing in Gladstone, was seriously injured Friday noon when she was struck by a slowly moving automobile, driven by Richard McGarrity of Glen Echo station. The accident took place on the slippery pavement of Main street. Her leg was fractured and a bad gash was cut in her forehead. She was then taken to St. Vincent's hospital in Portland.

Mrs. Swigert was crossing the street towards the ruins of the Methodist church, and when nearly half way over she changed her mind and started to retrace her steps. She did not notice the approaching automobile, which was coming from the north.

Problem of Child Welfare Taken Up On Modern Lines

Organization of a society composed of representatives of institutional groups, under the leadership of the child welfare commission, to talk over their mutual problems, plans and ideals, was decided upon at a meeting this morn-

ing at the Portland hotel of the welfare commission and about 50 representatives from different institutions.

Officers will be elected at a future meeting. Among the speakers this morning were Dr. David N. Roberg, state health officer; Dr. D. W. DeBusk of the commission, who presided; Judge Jacob Kanler, W. G. MacLaren of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective association, Clarence Gilbert of the Waverly Baby home, Fathers O'Hara and Thompson of the Catholic institutions, and F. J. Beach of the Boys' and Girls' Aid society.

Financial aid and the limited amount of funds allowed from the state came up for discussion, but no definite action was taken.

Search Being Made For Runaway Girl

Operatives of the women's protective bureau are endeavoring to find 16-year-old Amy Mitting, who ran away from the House of the Good Shepherd Thanksgiving night while a party was in progress there. Several years ago the girl gained notoriety when she ran away from home, as her mother at that time claimed to be Princess Konvaleski of royal Russian blood. Mrs. Mitting now resides in San Francisco.
