



DISCUSS END OF WORLD ON SUNDAY

Trinity's Pastor Sees Explanation in Matthew XXIV; Interesting Sermon Is Promised.

The interest aroused by Professor Porta in his prediction that December 17 will see destructive storms has prompted Dr. A. A. Morrison of Trinity Episcopal church to discuss the "end of the world" subject Sunday morning at 11 o'clock.




