

# MORE THAN 3000 SCHOOL TEACHERS TO VISIT SESSION

## State Association Will Hold Its Annual Meeting in Portland on December 29, 30 and 31.

Salem, Dec. 20.—More than 3000 Oregon school teachers are expected to assemble in Portland for the annual convention of the State Teachers' association, December 29, 30 and 31, according to F. E. Carlton, assistant superintendent of instruction, who declares that interest in the forthcoming event gives promise of the largest attendance in the history of the state association.

Three educators of national reputation are included in the convention program. They are: H. B. Wilson, city superintendent of schools, Berkeley, Cal.; Frederick G. Bonner, Ph. D., professor of education, Teachers' college, Columbia college, New York; and Mrs. Sue L. Frate, Pacific coast field representative, N. E. Oakland, Cal.

# POLICE HAVE 150 CASES OF WOMEN, GIRLS LAST MONTH

## Officers of City Protective Bureau Handle 90 New Cases; Six Apply for Assistance.

During November 150 women and girls came before the officers of the women's protective bureau, either for aid or correction. Of this number 43 were cases continued over from October and 17 cases were reopened. The remainder were new cases.

Of the 30 new cases coming before the bureau six persons applied in person for aid and 45 were referred to the bureau by friends. The balance were brought in by women working with charitable organizations. After listening to both sides of the story the women operatives adjusted 10 of those brought before them as incorrigible, 31 as immoral, 28 cases were found to be due to domestic trouble, two women were adjudged insane, five were caught stealing and the balance were either sick or runaways from home.

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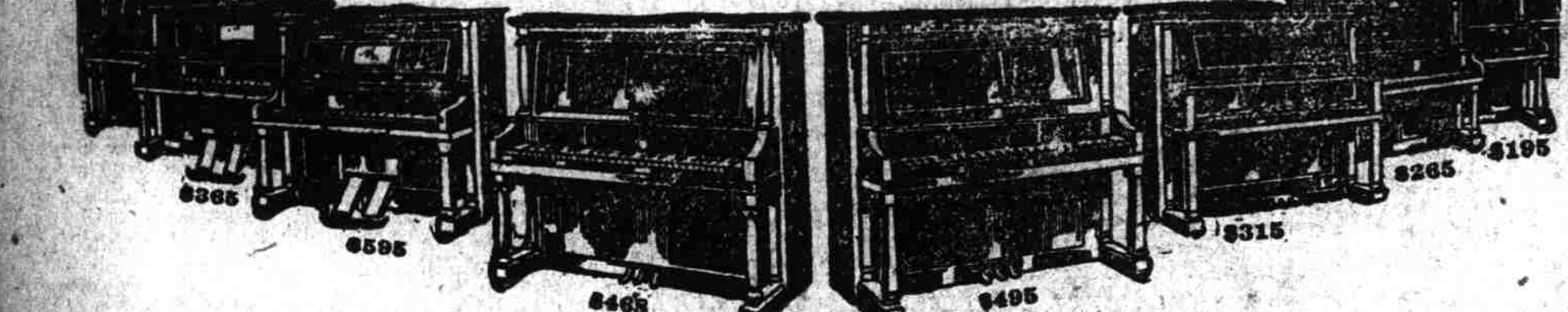
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
