Number of Boats Tied to Damaged Steamer Are Endangered Astoria in Willamette River.

Springing a leak from being struck by a floating obstruction in the river, the steamer Oregona, of the upper Willamette fleet, moored at the sank about 6 o'clock Wednesday night, seriously endangering the string of other boats to which she

The watchmen in charge of the boats noticed the water coming in and notified the harbor patrol. The fireboat David Campbell answered an alarm and on arriving found more than a foot of water in the hull of the Oregona. The boat was listing sharply.

Eand pumps had been manned by the watchman and other employes at the scene, but the water came in more and not until the Campbell's steam was hooked onto the siphons and pumping had continued until nearly midnight was the danger over.

As soon as possible workmen applied a soft patch over the hole, about six i inches long, which apparently had been gouged by a big log, propelled by the swift current. The opening was on the port side, about amidships. The Oregona was tied up with

Grahamona and the Pomona of the same line, the tug Hercules and the former Albina ferry boats Mason and Lionel Webster. The Oregona was in the middle of this string, and had she sunk, some of the other boats would probably have gone down with her.






