

### HOPE OF UPRISING IN OREGON GUARD FADES AS CAMP DISAPPEARS

Guardman Imprisoned for Failure to Drill Reported to Have Gone to Canada.

Said to have cherished visions of an uprising in which the enlisted men of the Oregon National Guard would massacre officers of the regiment and then loot the city, W. Camb, member of Company H, is reported to have fled to Canada after finding his hopes vanquished by incarceration in the Multnomah county jail for five days for failure to attend weekly guard drills. A pro-vest marshal's warrant is out for his arrest.

Guard organizations resolve from \$1.50 to \$2 every time a member attends a regular drill. Unwilling to lose such support Company H brought Camp to task for failing to report for drill. He continued his absence and after trial by courtmartial was sent to jail for five days. Immediately upon his release he is said to have disappeared. Unwilling to victimize any individual the officers declare their men urge that an example be made of Camb and a search may be started.

Several guard members have recently been fined \$10 by courtmartial for non-attendance at drill. The fines were suspended during good behavior.

Enlisted men, upon proving inability to attend drill will be honorably discharged, given a discharge if such inability is temporary, or otherwise considered.

### Marshfield Officer Loses Life in Effort To Save Ship's Safe

Marshfield, Jan. 1.—Deputy Sheriff W. H. Jeter, who was drowned near Cape Blanco Wednesday, lost his life in an effort to get at the fore part of the wrecked J. A. Chancelor to save the ship's safe, which was supposed to be there. A story was afloat that a safe containing considerable money was aboard the wreck. Jeter thought that it was his duty to attempt to get it for fear that it might be stolen. He had been left to guard the beach against any beach combing.

Together with Eugene White, Carl White and Charles Wright of Port Orford they hauled a boat from that place and launched it, but the boat was capsized. The three others got ashore safely. Jeter's body came ashore later and was recovered and taken to Port Orford, awaiting directions from the young deputy's mother. Jeter was about 25 years old and was appointed deputy by Sheriff Tolman of Curry county.

### Three Young Men Taken Believed to Be Robbers Sought

Two hotel room robberies were cleared up Wednesday afternoon by the police in the arrest of Lawrence Buckbee, 15; Frank Smith, 23; and William Hardisty, 17, according to information given by the arresting officers, Inspectors Maloney, Horack and La Salle. The robberies cleaned up are: The room of Harold Lockerbie, 330 Y. M. C. A., and T. Taylor, 38 Lincoln hotel. Buckbee and overcoat stolen from Lockerbie's room, and Hardisty was claimed to have had on the shoes taken from Taylor's room. Smith had a loaded .38 calibre revolver, which the police believe he stole. Hardisty was turned over to the juvenile court. Smith and Buckbee will be taken before Municipal Judge Rossmann on Friday.

### Accused Woman Stabs Man Husband Found In Her Apartment

Cumberland, Md., Jan. 1.—(I. N. S.)—Because he refused to exonerate her of unfaithfulness in the eyes of her husband, Mrs. Kate Uhl, 25, the mother of three children, today stabbed to death Bryan Pownall, a nephew of William G. Pownall, head of the Pownall Lumber company.

Mrs. Uhl was trapped in her apartment by her husband, Mervin Uhl, in company with Pownall. He accused her of unfaithfulness and ordered her from his home. The young wife summoned Pownall and pleaded with him to tell her husband that it was Pownall's fault he was paying her attention. Pownall refused and Mrs. Uhl seized a butcher's knife and stabbed him over the heart. Pownall's home is at Romney, W. Va.

An inquest into the affair will be held this afternoon. Mrs. Uhl is being held.

### Canada to Be Given 100 Planes to Keep Fighting Pilots Fit

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 1.—(I. N. S.)—One hundred British airplanes of the type used in the war zone and now the property of the admiralty have been promised for Vancouver next spring as the necessary incentive to promote commercial flying in British Columbia and to keep Britain's fighting pilots fit. This is the word brought here today by Major McLaren, wearer of the Croix de Guerre and who has a record of 57 German planes to his credit. McLaren secured the definite promise from the admiralty heads before leaving London.

### Opposes National Prohibition

The Portland League of Catholic Foresters of America has declared that it is opposed to national prohibition and the proposed local zoning system. In a resolution adopted it characterizes prohibition as "un-Christian, opposed to nature, antagonistic to the divine order and a breeder of bigots, hypocrites, liars, sneaks and petty criminals and thieves." It is opposed to the zoning system because it eliminates from some zones churches and schools.
