

LUMBER INDUSTRIES TO GET 60 PER CENT CARS THEY ORDER, PROMISE

Shortage of Cars and Inadequacy of Roads to Handle Shipments Hampers Business for Time.

Washington, Jan. 1.—(WASH-INGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—“If the lumbermen of Puget Sound, Grays Harbor and Columbia river territory receive 60 per cent of the number of cars required for shipment of lumber during the coming six months they will be in great luck,” said Congressman Johnson, after a conference of the Washington state delegation with W. C. Kendall, manager of the car service section of the United States railroad commission.

Kendall said he would make every effort to supply for the next few weeks 50 per cent of the actual demand. Johnson said: “The trouble is because of a shortage of cars and the inadequacy of railroads to do the business from Puget Sound. One or more of the transcontinental railroads will have to be re-tracked. Which one, and who will pay for it, is a matter of conjecture. In addition, the railroads of the country are short fully 100,000 cars. In November, 1918, the administration ordered 100,000 cars and the last 5000 of these are being delivered just now. Five per cent of all freight cars are completely out of repair and the number will increase rapidly.

Kendall told Senator Poindexter and Congressmen Hadley and Johnson he was straining every effort to keep as much as 40 per cent of the required box cars going to Puget Sound and he realized that failure to make the necessary lumber shipments east would not only disrupt business of the Pacific Northwest, but would cause business in the entire territory served with lumber from that section to sag.

Oregon Growers May Erect Big Cannery On Site at Roseburg

Roseburg, Jan. 1.—The officers of the Oregon Growers' association are appraising the property of the Umpqua Valley Fruit union, that an exact estimate of the property will be ready when the plant is delivered Friday. The packing plant and grounds in this city are valued at \$2600. The union will handle the broccoli crop, after which all interest of the union will be turned over by the state association and the local union will be merged with the larger body.

The Umpqua Growers' association is considering building a larger cannery on property recently acquired north of the dispatcher's office along the S. P. tracks. The Oregon Growers will enlarge the plant of the union so as to handle all the fruit adjacent to this city.

Klamath Falls Woman Who Shot Physician Starts Prison Term

Klamath Falls, Jan. 1.—For the shooting of Dr. George Mitchell last fall, Mrs. Minnie Nicholas of this city was taken to the state penitentiary to serve a sentence of one year. She pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with intent to kill.

Dr. Mitchell was shot in the abdomen, but recovered. The shooting was caused over the alleged whipping of Mrs. Nicholas' dog by Dr. Mitchell. Mrs. Nicholas is the wife of T. P. Nicholas, former mayor of Klamath Falls.

Bend, Jan. 1.—Unanimous selection of officers for the Bend Commercial club characterized the balloting of the annual meeting of the business men's organization held Wednesday. Hennessy, directors.

The Dalles, Jan. 1.—Following an outbreak of rabies among the dogs of this city, Health Officer Dr. Fred Thompson has issued a mandate that all canines either be muzzled or kept within the home. Gertrude Dohm, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Dohm, was bitten by an infected dog and has been sent to Portland to take the antihydrophobia cure. The head of the dog had been previously sent to Portland and inspection found the animal infected with rabies. The head of another dog, which is thought to be inflicted with the dread disease, has been sent away for determination.

in Multnomah county and the question has arisen as to her eligibility to a seat at Salem as a representative from this district. According to Governor Olcott the matter must wait until the next session of the state body for determination.

REPUBLICAN SENATORS SEND CANDIDATES QUIZ TO GET TREATY VIEWS

Inquiries Are Directed Chiefly to Wood and Lowden, Who Have Not Expressed Their Stand.

Washington, Jan. 1.—(U. P.)—Senators who are determined to make the League of Nations an issue in the next campaign are ready to demand that candidates now in the race for the Republican presidential nomination declare

themselves immediately on the league, it was learned today.

Letters have been prepared to be sent all candidates who have not yet taken a definite stand. These include Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois and General Leonard Wood.

Lowden will be quizzed first. He will be asked to tell whether he favors American participation in the league as it is established by the pending treaty and what he would do about withdrawal if elected president.

The inquiries to be directed to the candidates are to be so framed, it is understood, that the aspirants for the nomination will find it hard to ignore them.

Neither Wood nor Lowden has so far made any definite statement. Senator Johnson, California, and Senator Poindexter, Washington, are irreconcilable foes of the league and have made their policies clear.

Road Proposed From McEachern Shipyard On to Williamsport

Astoria, Jan. 1.—Tentative plans have been decided upon for the proposed road along the Young's bay waterfront from the McEachern shipyard to Williamsport. The route runs on an easy grade along the shore line and provides for an 80-foot right-of-way and 50 for the Belt Line railway. The greater portion of the fill will be made by pumping sand from the river channel. The Port of Astoria will make the fill.

The port commission has protested to Senator Chamberlain against the sending of the coast guard cutter Algonquin to Alaska, contending that the vessel is of great assistance here in shipping. Senator Chamberlain has replied, stating that the department says the Algonquin

is needed in Alaska to protect the fishermen.

Frank Patton, cashier of the Astoria Savings bank, has received notice from the secretary of the American Bankers' association of his appointment as the only Pacific coast member of the committee on liquid investments. The committee, composed of bankers representing each section of the country, will consider and recommend to the bankers' association the classes of securities in which savings funds can be invested.

Arthur G. Wells Is Santa Fe Manager

San Francisco, Jan. 1.—(U. P.)—Arthur G. Wells, Los Angeles, has been appointed federal manager of the Santa Fe railroad with headquarters in Chicago. Wells has resigned as general manager of the Santa Fe lines west of Albuquerque.

Sensational Raid On Bank Nets Big Liberty Bond Sum

Omaha, Neb., Jan. 1.—(U. P.)—Six armed bandits robbed the Farmers and Merchants' National bank at Benson, a suburb, of \$90,000 to \$100,000 in Liberty bonds and \$15,000 in cash Wednesday. The robbers forced eight customers and four bank clerks into a vault and systematically looted the bank. They escaped in a large touring car.
