

LOCAL BOLSHIEVSKI WILL BE DEPORTED OFFICIALS ASSERT

Mrs. Julia Saulit Is Among 28
Arrested Here Who May Be
Herded Out of United States.

are not promptly deported will be tried under state syndicalism laws, the promise of District Attorney Walter Evans Saturday indicated.

The communist party and the communist labor party are practically the same organization, members aver. If there is any difference it lies in the fact that the latter is slightly the more radical. It is that branch of the party to which John Reed of Portland gave his greatest organization talents last summer.

WOMAN HAS REGRETS

Sponsoring radicalism of the brand promulgated by Reed, Mrs. Victor Saulit is held in the woman's division of the city jail, bemoaning the fact that she cannot be released on bail and the fact that she is denied communication with friends.

Mrs. Saulit talked freely of certain features of her radical activities. She was secretary of the Communist Labor party for six weeks, she declared, and is in accord with its aims. Such aims are expressed in the literature taken in the Friday night raids, including the slogan, "Dictatorship for the Proletariat," espoused by K. W. Oter, who calls himself state secretary of the Communist Labor party. Oter, 35 years old, who declares himself an American citizen, is under arrest with his "Communist" comrades.

"I came to America from Khatonia 11 years ago, and have been in Portland almost all the time," Mrs. Saulit said on Saturday. She was married some time after her arrival in Portland.

WHAT JOHN DID

"I was secretary of the Communist Labor party for six weeks. You, that is the branch John Reed helped organize last summer. My husband was not secretary of the party.

"I really don't matter much whether I am deported or not. Of course, I would prefer to pay my way back to my own country, but I suppose the government will not allow me to do that. There's no use crying about being deported, because if the government orders me deported I know that I will have to go. In fact, I would rather voluntarily if allowed to do so.

"I was born in Khatonia and lived my life there until I came to Portland. My name is Julia and I am 33 years old. Khatonia is a republic since the war—an independent soviet state. The woman takes her arrest calmly, her only concern being as to the safety of her belongings. She fears her landlady will throw her trunks into the street when she hears the story of the cause of the arrests that took Saulit and his wife Friday night. Mrs. Saulit does object to being denied the papers or the right to seek liberty on bail.

SEVEN FOR DEPORTATION

Seven of the 28 under arrest were taken on federal deportation warrants issued by the commissioner of immigration. They are charged with being undesirable aliens, and at least one, Havelock, has admitted being smuggled into the United States from Austria. The seven are: Mr. and Mrs. Victor Saulit, Russians; George Havelock, Austrian; Max Schmidt and Herman Niendorf, German, and W. G. Kewell and Frank Cusack, British. Authorities declare there is little doubt that this group will be promptly deported.

The "wild" literature and banners seized in the raids on the radical Friday night were only slightly more outspoken than the men arrested.

Havelock, confessing himself smuggled into the United States, grins happily from his cell in the jail. When asked to step into the front row to have his picture taken, he sneered, "I suppose you want to get all the Trotsky's first." Havelock wears a heavy beard and seems to enjoy comparing himself to Trotsky. When asked to remove his hat, Havelock, in broken English, responded stubbornly after he had said: "Aw, what's the idea? We're not in church."

Saulit, declared to be a dangerous radical, made light of his arrest. He had in mind, police believed, his arrest during the war for failure to rise from his seat at the Hellig theatre when the national anthem was played. For that offense he was sentenced to jail, and upon appeal was released in circuit court.

Efforts also were being made, it was stated, to gain control of all labor organizations with the cry "Down with capitalism!"

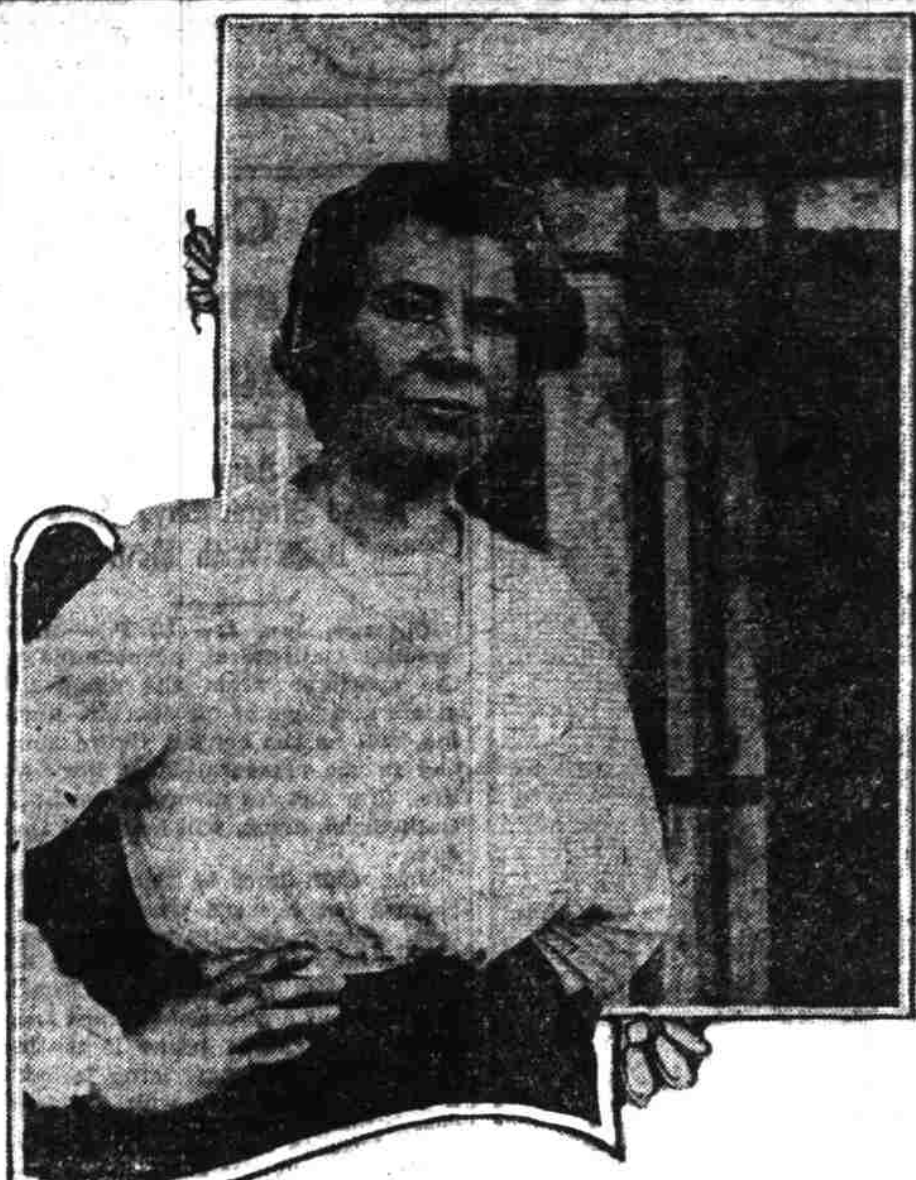
Appeals were made by the leaders of the communist organizations for violence and bloodshed in the two big strikes—those of the miners and the

steel workers. Alien leaders traveled all over the country, urging strikes and other labor troubles, hoping thus to bore from within and lead the large number of American workmen into their organization.

CAUSE OF UNREST

Much of the present unrest, the evidence shows, can be checked up to them. Twenty-five Communist papers were started in cities throughout the country, and tons of revolutionary literature were printed. Most of the alien editors have been caught in the big raid.

The department of justice declared it has conclusive evidence indicating that the whole campaign was being directed by the Bolshevik government of Russia. The United States, rich in resources, was the first stronghold of democracy that Lenin and Trotsky desired to "sovietize." The whole program was to establish the same form of government in this country that Russia now has.

The department now has under surveillance leaders known to be direct agents of Bolshevism in this country, and a few personal emissaries of Lenin and Trotsky are likely to be arrested in the near future, it was learned. The government will allow those arrested to have hearings if they desire to make an effort to prove they were not participants in the revolutionary plot. These will be held by the labor department, subject to review by federal court only upon the issuance of a writ of habeas corpus. Ringleaders in the plot will be released upon \$10,000 bail.

LAW IS STRONG

A number of Americans of radical sympathies were caught. These will be turned over to the states for prosecution. Ten states have drastic laws for American advocates of force and violence against the government. These are: California, Washington, Oregon, Illinois, New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Indiana, West Virginia and North Dakota.

Documents made public by the department of justice state that the communist and communist labor parties took the manifesto of Lenin and Trotsky's meeting at Moscow last March and made it their platform in this country. Every member swore allegiance to these principles, the records of the organizations show.

"Alongside the deposed dynasties of the Romanoffs, Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs and the capitalistic cliques of these lands, the rulers of France, England, Italy and the United States stand revealed in the light of unfolding events and diplomatic disclosures in their immeasurable villainy," the manifesto says.

MEANS OF BATTLE

"The revolutionary era compels the proletariat to make use of the means of battle which will concentrate its entire energies, namely, mass action, with its resultant, direct conflict with the governmental machinery in open combat. Any other methods such as the use of bourgeois parliamentaryism will be of only secondary importance."

Registration of those who were interned at Ellis Island was not completed tonight and officials declared it would take two days more to prepare the aliens for individual inquiry. Arrangements have been made for the accommodation of many others who are expected to land at the island during the night, although with the present crowd the immigration bureau is taxed to capacity. Government officials obtained blankets and most of those who were held were forced to sleep on the floor. A strict watch was kept and no one was allowed to talk with the prisoners except the clerks who conducted the registration.

The work of registration will continue through Sunday, in an effort to hasten the individual inquiries so that officials may bring about a speedy deportation of those who are held guilty.

Wood-for-President
League Organized in
Missouri by G. O. P.

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 3.—(I. N. S.)—Supporters of General Wood for the Republican nomination for president today announced the formation of a Wood-for-President league in Missouri with Judge Henry Lamm of Sedalia, state chairman. It is the purpose, the organizers announced, to enroll at least 100,000 men and women in the state as members, and to actively promote General Wood's candidacy.

I. Kirkwood, owner of the Kansas City Star, it was announced, is vice chairman.

RED ACTIVITIES BRING SEDITION BILLS TO FRONT

Measure to Deal With Disloyal
Elements Will Come Before
the Senate Without Delay.

Washington, Jan. 3.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—All kinds of "Red" activities are given attention in bills which congress has made ready to take up in earnest when the members return to their labors after the holiday recess.

The sedition bill is to be considered in the senate at once, and Senator Sterling, who is in charge, has promised to keep it moving until a final vote is taken. It will consume a part of each day when congress meets, dividing honors with the waterpower bill.

The senate immigration committee will take up the bill of Representative Johnson of Washington, which the house has passed, to authorize the deportation of aliens who are members of organizations that teach the use of violence or sabotage, without evidence of individual acts.

BILL AIMED AT ALIEN SLACKERS

The house immigration committee is to consider another bill for the deportation of aliens who withdrew their first citizenship papers in war time in order to escape military service under the draft.

The senate judiciary committee has before it a bill presented by Attorney General Palmer to stamp out anarchy and Bolshevism.

The house foreign relations committee has a bill before it to make permanent the war time requirement that prospective immigrants shall have their passports vided by an American consul before the trip is begun.

The house judiciary committee has pending bills for the punishment of sedition and the circulation of radical literature.

A subcommittee of the senate foreign relations committee, consisting of Senators Moses, Borah, Knox, Pomerene and Shields, will take up the investigation of Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, claiming to be the Bolshevik ambassador to this country, who has spirited his records out of jurisdiction of a state investigating committee in New York.

RED ENVOY PROPAGANDIST

Martens was recently declared by Senator Thomas of Colorado to be in the singular position of an ambassador who has never presented his credentials in Washington, but has rented two floors of the Woolworth building, where a large office force is employed in sending out propaganda.

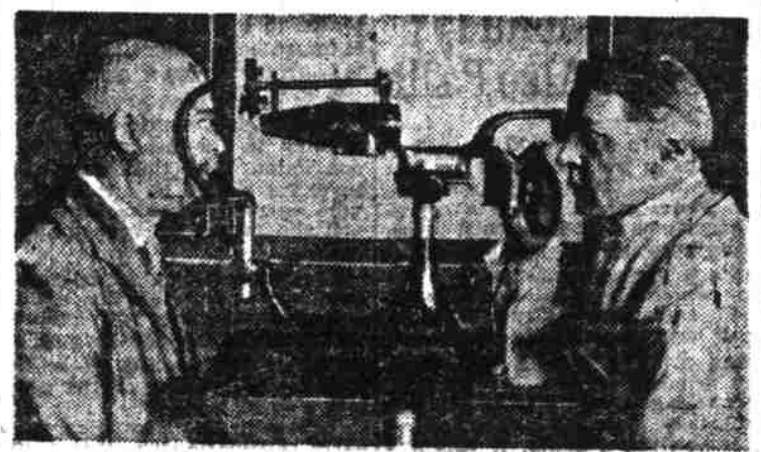
The house committee on immigration also plans a further investigation to fix responsibility for failure to deport a larger number of radical aliens. Since this move was started the "soviet ark" has sailed from New York and taken away a large number of those with whom this inquiry was concerned.

Wisconsin Prohibits Select Candidates For Nation's Head

Madison, Wis., Jan. 3.—(I. N. S.)—The prohibition party in Wisconsin went on record here today in favor of Daniel A. Poling of Boston, and Representative Charles H. Randall of California as alternative candidates for president in 1920 on the party ticket. Both men are widely known for their prohibition activities. Marie C. Prihm of Los Angeles, and Frank S. Regan of Rockford, Ill., were favored for vice president.

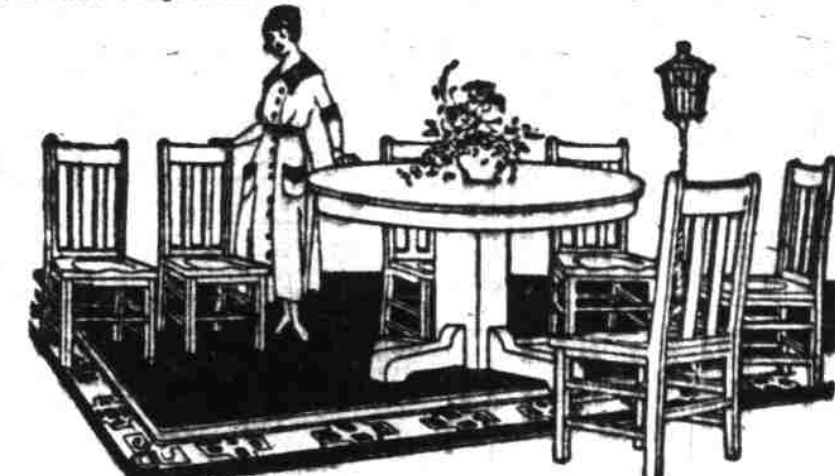

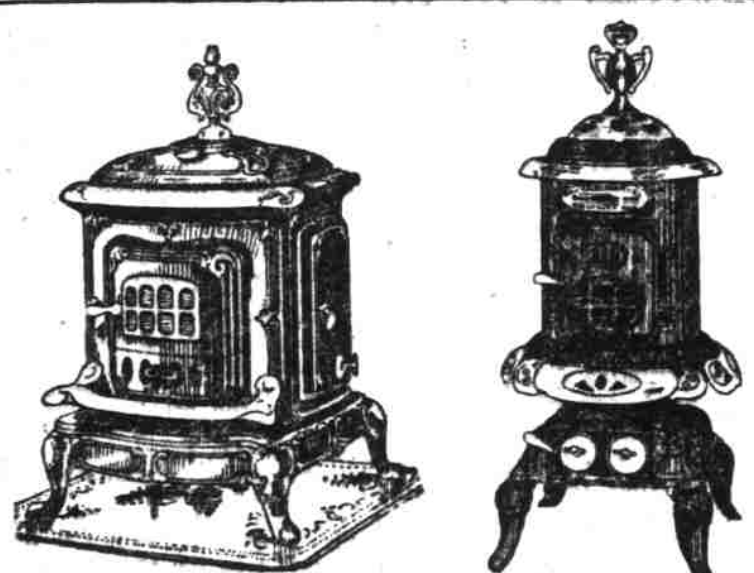

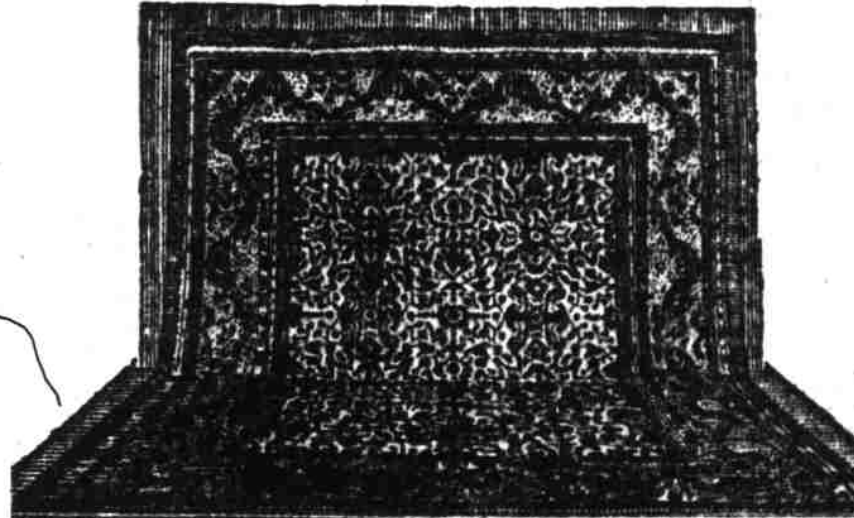
