

# SIX BILLS WILL ORIGINATE FROM OLCOTT'S OFFICE

### Administration Measures to Be Conspicuous at Special Session of Oregon Legislative Meet.

When the special session of the legislature convenes at Salem January 12, it will have what might be termed an "administration program" of seven propositions submitted for its consideration from the governor's office. Six of these come direct from Governor Olcott and form the basis of his call for the extraordinary session; the seventh comes from the executive office, through the hands of the secretary of state, in the shape of the vetoed Rogue river fish bill, which automatically will come before the assembly for passage notwithstanding the veto, or for defeat, as the case may be. It was the one bill of the regular session of 1919 vetoed by the late Governor Withycombe.

#### FINLEY DISMISSAL

Governor Olcott's proposals consist of "six points" five of which formed the basis of his call for the special session, the sixth, the determination of the fish and game commission controversy, having been added after the discharge of State Biologist Finley by the commission.

The injection of the fish and game commission controversy into the session has stirred up a political storm the scope and extent of which is difficult to pre-estimate. As a result of the charges and countercharges that have been freely bandied about for months past, the dumping of the quarrel into the legislature has brought the commercial fishing interests into battle alignment on the one hand, facing the anglers and sportsmen's contingent on the other, with the governor's office between them, a position not at all comfortable or potentially pleasant. And, to make the situation still more tense, the perennial Rogue river controversy will add its medium of political dynamite.

#### LITTLE HOPE OF PEACE

Irrespective of whether it should do so, it is undoubtedly true that the fish and game quarrel has stirred up the dread of factional and political strife until the whole outlook of the session is tinged with it, making the probability of a short session even more remote than it otherwise would have been, and with the hope for peace and harmony close to the vanishing point.

The cornerstone of Governor Olcott's call for the session was the stated need of immediate action on the part of the workmen's compensation act to be so framed as to give sick and accident benefits to incapacitated workmen more in keeping with the increased cost of living than is possible under the existing restrictions of the law. These benefits, fixed in the days before present day costs were thought of, are inadequate, in the opinion of the industrial accident commission, to meet the necessities and needs of sick or injured workmen coming within the law. It was the desire both of the commission and of the governor that the situation should be remedied in justice to those who might come under its strictures.

tures. Opposition to the proposal, if it exists to any extent, has not made itself particularly audible, and it is not believed by such members of the legislature as have openly discussed it that there will be any serious objections raised when the amendments come up for consideration.

#### GALLAGHER AMENDMENT

The so called "Gallagher amendment" to the constitution, providing for the guarantee of interest payments on irrigation district bonds by the state, also calls for attention by the legislature. This amendment, which is more in statutory than in constitutional form, was intended to be self-executing, that intent being so stated in the body of the amendment. Since its adoption by the people, however, question has been raised as to whether the amendment can stand alone without statutory enactments to aid it. Just what the traditional is few seem to know, or at least to express with clarity. What its limits are will undoubtedly be fully diagnosed by the irrigation congress which is to meet in Portland this week. Ample remedies will be framed and made ready for introduction by the time the session is convened.

Since the voters ratified the amendment by a substantial majority at the special election of June last, thus giving their consent to the proposed amendment, it is not believed that opposition will develop to such legislation as will make the amendment clearly and fully effective.

The governor also called attention to the need of added funds for the administration of the soldiers and sailors educational bill, which was passed in 1919, providing for state aid for service men who might desire to attend any of the institutions of higher education in the state.

#### MANY SEEKING AID

This same question was raised during the discussion of the measure in the house, prior to its final passage. At that time the sufficiency of the appropriation carried by the bill was called into serious question, but it was argued that the number of service men seeking state aid would undoubtedly be small enough to permit the administration of the act without difficulty. Unexpected demands for aid, however, have created the act, and it will be the problem of the legislature to provide additional funds, or not, as it may determine.

There are two additional propositions which will be suggested for consideration by the governor's office. One is the ratification of the national equal suffrage amendment, the other the submission of a capitol building amendment to the state constitution, which would be in effect, a repeal of the amendment abolishing that penalty, adopted by the narrow margin of 127 yeas at the general election of 1914. As to these, there is no question about the ratification of the suffragist amendment without doubt, nor does there seem to be much doubt of the submission of the capitol amendment to the electorate.

This "administration program," large and varied as it is, does not constitute more than a minority of probable measures and proposals which, it is already apparent, will be laid before the session.

# School Board Aided Pupils to Torment Her, Says Teacher

Baker, Jan. 5. — Charging that the school board has been encouraging the children to annoy her, Miss Elvira Forsberg, teacher of the Dear Fiat school near Sparta, has resigned. Owing to the absence of Miss Elmetta Bailey, county school superintendent, Miss Forsberg's charges have not yet been taken up.

The teacher says that the pupils have been throwing cartridges into the stove, stopping up the chimney with rags so that classes could not be held inside the building for a day at a time, and throwing chalk, spit-balls, and snow-balls in the school room continually.

Miss Forsberg also charges that the pupils hurled her rubbers upon the school house roof one day and as a result she walked home with wet feet; that on one of the coldest days of the season they hid her coat and hat.

She charges the board with neglect in purchasing supplies that were ordered from the county and that they have provided, and that instead of aiding her in suppressing insubordination the directors have refused to listen to her complaints and have actually abetted the mischievous.

"They have accused me of profanity, of attempting to burn down the school and of many other things. I believe I always have had a good reputation and I am not going to put up with this treatment any longer," Miss Forsberg said.
