TODAY'S FORECASTS

Portland and vicinity—Tonight and Friday fair, continued cold; winds mostly westerly. Oregon and Washington—Tonight and Friday fair; continued cold; gentle westerly winds.

WEATHER CONDITIONS

Low pressure prevails in Alaska and the pressure is moderately low in the lower Mississippi valley and in Arizona. The remainder of the country is covered by a great high pressure area, the center of which is in Eastern Washington. Precipitation has occurred in Alaska, the Yukon and Manitoba, and over a belt reaching from the southern Rocky mountain region to the north Atlantic coast. The heaviest rain reported in the United States was 1.62 inches at Memphis, Tenn. The weather is much milder in the northern Rocky mountain slope and on the middle and south Atlantic coast, and is much colder in parts of Idaho and Utah and from Manitoba and the upper Mississippi to the westward over the Lake region. The temperature is above normal in Canada and the extreme northern Plains states, and below normal in the country east of the Mississippi river, and below normal in other sections.

Relative humidity in Portland: Noon yesterday, 77 per cent; 5 p. m. yesterday, 66 per cent; 8 a. m. today, 77 per cent.

Zoning Measure Topped—The proposed zoning ordinance presented to the city commissioners by the city planning commission will be discussed by Roger B. Sinnott and F. V. Holman at the meeting of the Portland Realty board at the Benson hotel Friday noon. Considerable

opposition to the act has developed during the past two weeks. The committee appointed by the president of the board to investigate the work of the city planning commission will make its report, and W. B. Shively, chairman of the legal committee will answer the question, "Is a Zoning Ordinance a Valid Exercise of Police Power?" Officers of the board elected last week will be installed.

To Consider Legislation—The Social Workers' association of Oregon will meet Monday in room 520 courthouse at 8 p. m. to consider legislation that will come before the special session of the legislature, opening January 12. Special attention will be given to an amendment to the court of domestic relations bill which will clarify the question of constitutionality and allow the court to function freely.

Health Meeting Friday—A meeting of Washington county people interested in the organization of a county public health association will be held Friday at 2 p. m. in the library at Hillsboro. Miss Jane Allen, supervisor of public health nursing in Oregon, will preside. The work of organizing public health associations in the various counties is a part of the work conducted by the Oregon Tuberculosis association.

Walpole Lecture Here January 22—Hugh Walpole, English novelist, will lecture January 22 at Masonic temple, on "Russian Vignettes." The lecture was arranged by the Drama league, of which Mrs. Edwin Seely Parsons is president. Walpole was in Russia during the war, and from Petrograd came his last book, "The Dark Forest," in which he deals with the Russian question.

Course in Textiles—The University of Oregon is offering a new course in textiles and fabrics, beginning Friday evening at 7:15 at Central library. The first lecture will be given by Ella F. Lawrence, dean of the school of architecture. The course, which will consist of 14 lectures, is to be strictly practical, a number of talks to be given by experts from some of the local department stores.

Women to Get Medals—Ninety-five Portland members of the American Red Cross canteen service are to receive medals for their work during the war, following an appropriation of \$110 made yesterday by the B. O. council at the regular weekly council meeting. Activities of the canteen service in Portland were under the direction of Mrs. Ferdinand Reed.

Returned Soldiers Have Clubrooms—The Private Soldiers' Legion has arranged for club quarters at 247 1/2 Stark street and will establish a club, employment office, pool and card tables and reading room, shower baths and facilities calculated to attract ex-service men and make them comfortable. It is expected to open the doors in a few days.

Injuries May Be Serious—August Stevenson, 41, of 88 1/2 Third street, a sailor on the West Harlan, may have suffered internal injuries from a fall through a hatchway Wednesday afternoon, according to reports from St. Vincent's hospital. Stevenson fell 10 feet, while the steamer was in dock at the St. Johns terminal.
