

SPORTSMEN SEE NEW DANGER IN FISH SOLUTION

Claim Made That Commercial Interests Are Behind New Bill; Declare Governor Is Deceived.

That the sportsmen are being "hornswoggled" and that "even the governor is being misled," were declarations of sportsmen here when they learned that State Senators Norblad and Handley and Representative L. E. Bean had vested themselves with the responsibility for drafting the bill by which it is proposed to create a fish and game commission of seven members at the special legislative session.

"Most unsatisfactory," ejaculated H. B. Van Duzer.

"The sportsmen are not represented in that move," said Richard Price, president of the Multnomah Anglers' club.

"This move emanates from the commercial interests," declared Arthur K. Downs, president of the Oregon Sportsmen's league.

ALIGNMENT IS CLAIMED
It was pointed out that Norblad and Handley, one of Astoria, the other of Tillamook, represent the commercial fishing interests, and that Bean has been ranged with the fish and game commission and the commercial interests and against the sportsmen throughout the long fish and game controversy.

Attention was further called by the sportsmen to the fact that the suggestion for a fish and game commission of seven members was authored by Frank M. Warren, representative of the commercial interests on the fish and game commission, and that it was espoused by the commercial salmon men in opposition to the governor's recommendation at the statehouse conference in Salem last Monday.

Governor Olcott recommended the divorce of game and commercial interests by the creation of two commissions, one of five members to handle the sportsmen's interests, one of three members to direct salmon propagation.

GOVERNOR FINALLY ASSENTS
The counter proposal, which the governor said later he could accept as a compromise without hoping that entire harmony would result from the scheme, is to keep all fish and game administration under one commission but to divide the commission, three to handle game and game fish, three to handle commercial fish, the seventh to act as auditor.

It was immediately asserted that no matter what decision the arbiter might make, he would be accused of favoritism, and that the only way to quiet the controversy, for the time at least, is absolutely to divorce the contentious interests.

It was also recalled that although the fish and game legislative committee at the statehouse conference allowed the sportsmen and the commercial interests to ease the strain on their chests by the simple expedient of letting them take up practically all the time until L. E. Bean moved a sudden adjournment, the legislators with but one exception withheld any commitment of their own position.

THOMAS STATES VIEWS
Senator C. M. Thomas of Medford was the exception. He declared himself unqualifiedly in favor of the governor's recommendation. He said that if the legislature fails in its duty, the Southern Oregon people will submit to the initiative two bills, one closing the Rogue and Umpqua rivers to commercial fishing, and the other withholding all state aid from commercial fishing. Other legislative committees made no public revelation of their views. At the executive session which followed in the governor's office it was said the majority of the committee had approved Warren's proposal for a commission of seven members.

B. F. IRVINE URGES STUDENTS OF O.A.C. TO PRACTICE THRIFT

Recklessness Blamed for Spirit of Unrest Gaining Headway in Countries of Europe.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 8. — "If the 50,000 American men-sleeping in Flanders field could afford to give their lives for their country surely you and I can afford to give a small handful of good citizenship to help wipe out all trace of those movements

which seek to destroy your government," said B. F. Irvine of Portland, editor of The Journal, and a regent of the college, in a talk before the student body at convocation Wednesday.

Irvine's address was on thrift and the possible benefits to be derived from it. He spoke of the results of thriftlessness, and how it made for the development of all of the "isms" of Europe today. He accounted for the lack of this spirit of lawlessness in Germany by the fact that the people there owned their own homes and tenantry was at the vanishing point, while in Russia people had been so long mere serfs that they were now rebelling. He urged the students to preach the gospel of thrift and to so help in developing the spirit which makes for each family owning its own home.

The regents of the college were meeting in quarterly session here and were all in attendance at convocation. President W. J. Kerr addressed the students and welcomed the 300 students, who have registered at the college for the first time this semester, as well as the old students back for another term's work.

Special musical numbers were given by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Grissen of Portland. Grissen is a violin teacher at the college.

Parrish Has Bill to Compel Vaccination In Oregon Schools

It will be unlawful for any person to attend school in any part of the state unless vaccinated, if the vaccination bill that City Health Officer George Parrish will have introduced at the special session of the legislature is passed.

The bill likewise makes it unlawful for parents and guardians to permit any child to attend school who has not been vaccinated. No vaccination certificate will be recognized after it is seven years old. Persons unable to pay for medical service will be vaccinated under supervision of the state, county or municipal health officers.

Deschutes County Is Searching for New County Agent

Bend, Jan. 8.—The Deschutes county farm bureau is at loss to find a successor to H. E. Koons, who recently resigned as county agent. H. G. Avery of Jerome, Idaho, has declined the offer made by the farm bureau, and the farmers of the county may choose a local man fitted for the position.

A movement backed by business men of the city has been started here to hard surface the main streets. The constant resort to temporary repairs and the high cost of sprinkling cindered streets are objected to. Probably some definite action will be taken this coming spring.

Engineers of the Oregon rating bureau are in the city and may recommend a

downward revision of the fire insurance rates.

Central Oregon's delegation at the Oregon Irrigation congress, which opens in Portland today will be one of the largest in the history of the congress. Central Oregon has many important matters to bring before the meeting this year, the most important of which is the cooperation of the entire state with this section in backing the development of the proposed Benham Falls project, if the experts' reports are favorable to development.
