

LEAD THEM ALL CENSUS SLOGAN IS GETTING RESULTS

Campaign to Put Portland Over
Top With Big Return Waged
With Vigor by All; Advice Given

Considerable interest is evidenced among Supervisor Bennett's corps of enumerators in the slogan adopted by their chief and the Chamber of Commerce in making Portland "lead them all," and an individual rivalry is going on from day to day among the census takers to top the list in the number of schedule sheets filled out.

The honor of bringing Portland out first is, of course, one reason for top-notch activity. But there are other incentives. A more complete census can be secured with a minimum of callbacks in the covering of allotted territory in the shortest possible time to count those who may be termed "unsettled."

Then there is the enumerator's point of view. For every name he secures is a fee of 4 cents. It is essential to him that the list be secured as fast as possible.

Supervisor Bennett, in praising the commendable spirit of cooperation displayed by the majority of Portland people, today offered instructions on how to aid the enumerator.

People are advised to refrain from waiting the time of the enumerators by indulging in idle gossip.

One of the enumerators had fine sailing Wednesday in the enumeration of the city jail. The family was a large one, and the census man checked the inmates off in rapid succession. He lost 8 cents in the refusal of two Bolsheviks to give any information.

S. B. Vincent, manager of the Chamber of Commerce publicity bureau, announced Wednesday that slides for use in motion picture houses have been finished and will soon be thrown on screens throughout the city, with the cooperation of theater managers, to assist in making Portland the headliner in the census act.
