

MEASURE TO BAR JAPANESE FROM LAND PROPOSED

Action at Coming Special Session of Oregon Legislature Sought; Bill is Now Being Drawn.

Japanese exclusion legislation is the last and additional legislative "point" that is going to be dumped into the special session to add to the gaiety of nations.

Barge E. Leonard, representative of the American Legion idea on that subject, is now at work on a Japanese exclusion bill which he expects to have ready for introduction when the legislature convenes next Monday. He, and those who are working with him, are not satisfied with the plan of former State Senator George H. Wilbur of Hood River and the other members of the Anti-Japanese association of that district, who have decided that it would be better to initiate the legislation and put it up to the people of the state at the next general election in November.

IMMEDIATE ACTION WANTED

Leonard and his friends want immediate action and are going to ask the coming session to give it to them. They do not want to give the Japanese nearly an additional year in which to carry into effect their alleged plan of getting control of large tracts of agricultural land.

Mr. Leonard contends that a large proportion of the land now held by Japanese in this country is held in the name of children born in the United States and who will become citizens by right of birth upon reaching their majority. The danger of Japanese ownership of land does not lie, he contends, in ownership by Japanese of legal age, but will come through inheritance and descent.

TWO PLANS COMPARED

When Hood River people started their anti-Japanese agitation some time ago it was thought that the special session, should one be called, would be asked to enact restrictive legislation. This plan was abandoned later and the initiative route was adopted as the best method, it being contended that time for an educational campaign should be given.

Leonard, on the other hand, believes it will be possible to educate the legislature concerning the merits of his proposed measure just as easily and more immediately.

In addition to the Japanese problem, Leonard intends to be at Salem to watch and urge the submission of the proposed capital punishment amendment and also to applaud the ratification of the national equal suffrage amendment.

Howell Boy's Third Trial for Murder to Be Heard in March

Marshfield, Jan. 8.—The third trial of Harold Howell, charged with the murder of Lillian Leuthold of Bandon last July, has been set for the February term of the circuit court at Coquille. The attorneys have agreed and Judge John S. Cole has ordered that the case be taken up at the conclusion of the other jury trials, which will be some time in March. The 18-year-old defendant, who has been twice tried with the result of a jury disagreeing, will have been in jail eight months when his next trial comes up. Various rumors have been afloat of someone else other than Howell confessing to the crime, but these are declared without foundation. The attorneys for the defense say that they will have new evidence to introduce. A detective is working on features of the case which have not yet been made public.

Pendleton, Jan. 8.—George Hartman, city manager for five Liberty loan campaigns, was named Wednesday to head a volunteer committee of the Commercial association which will wage a follow-up campaign before the close of the census. He will choose assistants from the business men of the city.

Well Known East Side Groceryman Dies at Age of 67

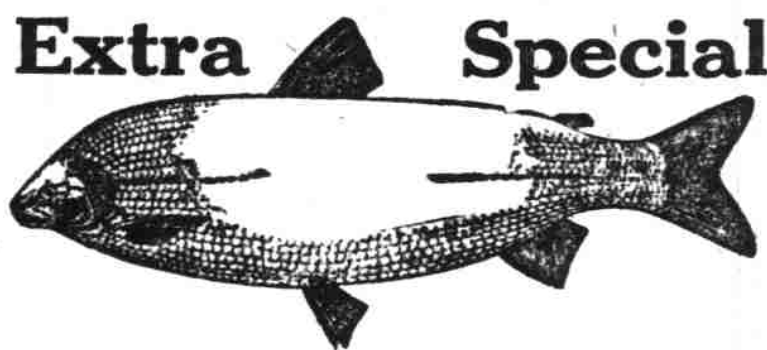
