

### SCANDINAVIA IS WATCHING EVENTS IN FATHERLAND

#### Effect of Peace Talk, and Possible Sovietism Trouble Claiming Attention of Many Swedes.

Stockholm, Jan. 8.—The whole of Scandinavia is watching with intense interest for the action of the German government during the momentous debates upon the final settlement of peace. All operations on the money markets where big deals in German marks have been pending have ceased for the present.

Every line of commercial activity is motionless pending the next fortnight's events which are fraught with extremely grave possibilities for these countries which in the future must depend largely upon German trade.

Passenger traffic from the Scandinavian kingdom into Germany ceased December 18. This ostensibly was to prevent a Christmas rush into Germany but in reality was in preparation for decisive events across the frontier.

#### EVENTS BEING WATCHED

In Stockholm's business circles everyone is conjecturing upon the trend of political and economic affairs in Berlin. The editors of two Stockholm newspapers who are maintaining the closest possible touch with Berlin by telephone and telegraph see nothing to indicate the growth of a militaristic party or the overthrow of the present government by the conservatives.

Their fear is that the working classes, driven by utter hopelessness of ever emerging from the hard times, may turn to sovietism. This overshadows all other questions. In the United States the most important phase of Germany's condition is whether she will be able to pay indemnities or whether she will accede to the demands for the delivery of deeding and dredging machinery. ### BOYCOTT IN CHINA IS GAINING GROUND

#### Japanese Goods Burned and Their Ships Are Leaving Pekin Without Cargoes.

Pekin, China, Jan. 8.—Since the Japanese attack on the students at Poo Chow the boycott in China against everything Japanese is being carried out more seriously than ever.

Telegrams from all the large centers give details of the burning of Japanese products and large demonstrations. The country's united chambers of commerce, representing 1400 cities, threaten to punish any merchant found buying from the Japanese.

Japanese ships leaving here are without cargoes. Japanese merchants have appealed to their authorities to break down the boycott and the Tokyo government recently communicated to China the measures that must be taken to stop the boycott and prevent anti-Japanese propaganda.
