

ARRAY OF TALENT IN ARMISTICE DAY CASE IS BRILLIANT

Judge, Prosecutors and Leading
Defense Counsel Among Best
and Fitted for Big Battle.

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 10.—The court room at Montesano during the trials of the 11 alleged I. W. W., accused of the murder of four ex-service men at Centralia, Wash., on Armistice day, will be the meeting place of some of the best and most brilliant legal talent in the state of Washington and the entire Northwest.

In Judge John M. Wilson of the Thurston county superior court is found one of the ablest jurists of the state and a man of abundant experience which has fitted him for his present position. Judge Wilson was prosecuting attorney of Thurston county for two terms, served as assistant attorney general and was industrial insurance commissioner of the state of Washington. He was holding the last position when the late Governor Ernest Lister appointed him to the superior bench of Thurston county.

THOMPSON SERVED IN WAR
Attorney General L. L. Thompson is a graduate of the University of Michigan law school. At the outbreak of the war he was serving as assistant attorney general of this state. He immediately left his position and enlisted as a "guy" in the navy. Upon his return from war he was appointed attorney general by Acting Governor Louis F. Hart.

Frank P. Christensen, assistant attorney general, who is aiding in the prosecution of the case, is a graduate of the Boston university law school. He was formerly prosecuting attorney of Island county and served in the army during the entire war.

Herman Allen of Chehalis, prosecuting attorney of Lewis county, is a graduate of the University of Washington law school. He was appointed in 1917 by the Lewis county board of commissioners to succeed Prosecutor Cameron, who resigned in November, 1918. Allen was elected to his present position.

W. H. Abel is a prominent attorney of Grays Harbor and of Western Washington. He was head of the Red Cross activities in Southwestern Washington during the war. Abel served as prosecuting attorney of Grays Harbor county. He is a special prosecutor.

C. D. Cunningham, another special prosecutor, is a graduate of the University of Washington law school. He served as prosecuting attorney of Lewis county for two terms. He enlisted and served in the army as a private.

VANDERVEER EX-CHAMPION
John H. Vanderveer, assistant in the office of the attorney general, is also a graduate of the University of Washington law school. He was deputy prosecuting attorney of Chelan county and is an ex-service man, having served as a "guy" in the navy during the entire war.

George Vanderveer, who is handling the case for the defense, 10 years ago was prosecuting attorney of King county. Vanderveer held boxing championships during his time.

Baker Divorces Gain 200 Per Cent in Year

Baker, Jan. 10.—Divorces have increased by 200 per cent while the number of marriages remains stationary in Baker county, according to County Clerk A. B. Combs, in a report for 1919. During the year there were 120 divorces. Weddings numbered 208. Divorces are higher by 90 than the average for the previous 20 years.

BIG CURRY COUNTY DAIRY RANCH TO BE CLEARED OF TIMBER

Many Cows to Be Added to Herd
When Stumps and Brush
Are Removed.

Marshfield, Jan. 10.—E. F. Manuel, who manages the Newlake dairy ranch in Curry county, owned by Graham & Frazier ofureka, Cal., is here to buy a logging engine and other equipment to be used in clearing land on the ranch. The place consists of 1080 acres. About 300 acres are cleared. A crew of men will be put to work and the logging engine will be used to pull out the stumps and brush.

There are now 75 cows on the ranch, but with the land cleared it is estimated that the ranch will carry 500 dairy cows, as it is the richest kind of bottom land and only needs to have the brush and stumps removed. This is the largest undertaking in the way of clearing in Curry county.

Wilbur Man Kills Largest Bald Eagle Ever Winged There

Roseburg, Jan. 10.—Alfred Stevens of Wilbur killed one of the largest bald eagles ever seen in this vicinity. The eagle had preyed upon lambs in the neighborhood of the North Unquiqua ranchers for several years. W. F. West of Chehalis, Wash., bought it. The bird weighed 8 1/2 pounds, and had been known to carry off lambs almost equal to its own weight.

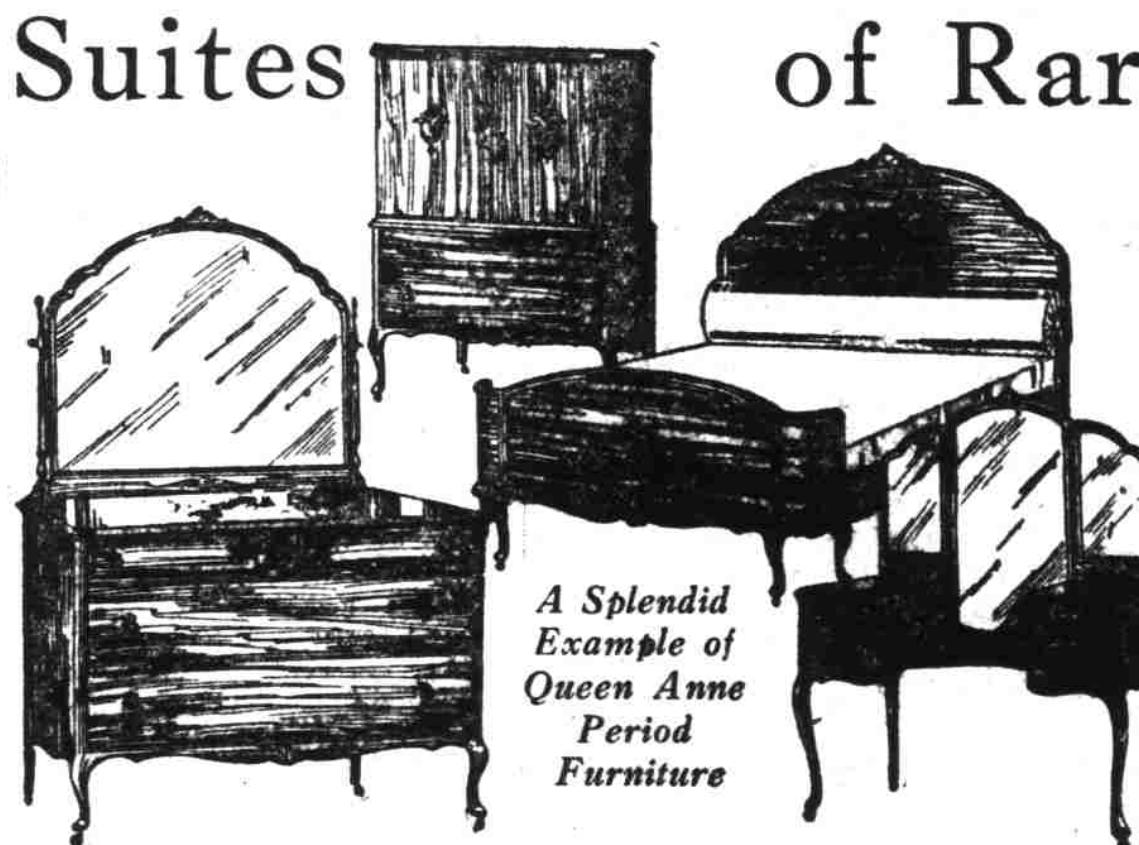

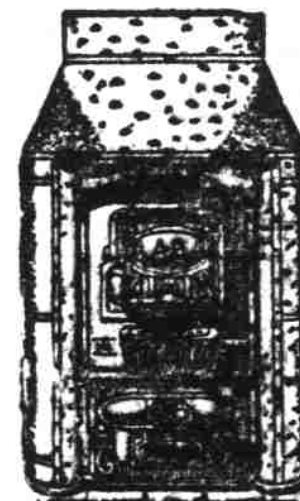
