

WOMEN INDORSE MEASURES WHICH ARE NOW PENDING

Federation of Women's Clubs Takes Up Matters Affecting City and State; New Activities.

Indorsement of numerous movements, resolutions and legislative bills covering a comprehensive program of social, civic and educational matters of vital importance to the city and state, characterized the monthly meeting of the Portland Federation of Women's organizations held Saturday at the Hotel Portland, Mrs. Alexander Thompson presiding.

The matters indorsed were a bill sponsored by the federation through its legislative chairman, Mrs. A. C. Newell, providing for the supervision to be directed by county judges in the various counties; a bill providing adequately for the children who are wards of the state; an amendment to the bill providing for the care of feeble-minded children under five years; a bill to provide for a court of domestic relations which is constitutional.

CITY MEASURES INDORSED

City matters receiving indorsement were a proposal to ask for an ordinance requiring autos and other vehicles to be parked some distance away from public comfort stations; the action of the censor board in the recent trouble with a local moving picture man; the work of Dr. D. W. Mack, city milk inspector, in bringing up the standard of Portland's milk supply.

Major Mills announced the movement of the Chamber of Commerce to keep the Alcazar company in Portland, and asked the cooperation of the federation. Miss Elsie White announced a course of lectures on the social phases of industrial problems to be given at the Hotel Portland, January 26 to 29 by Dr. F. H. Marvin. Mrs. John Bruce announced a tea to be given by the Woman's New Thought club at the Portland hotel for the benefit of the scholarship loan fund.

COURSE ON FABRICS NAMED

Mrs. Thomas Sharp announced a course on fabrics and textiles now being offered by the University of Oregon. Miss Zulema Kostomarov asked for contributions of books for use among the sailors; such contributions may be left at Central library.

The president announced that out of the home products dinner given with great success some weeks ago, had grown a demand for a committee on home industries and that she had named Mrs. D. M. Watson chairman of that committee. It was voted to add to the federation committees one that would consist of three women whose duty it will be to attend all conventions of public interest held in the city and report back to the federation. committee, reported success in her efforts to have some undesirable theatre programs eliminated.

The Smith-Townner bill, providing for a department of education in the federal government with a secretary in the president's cabinet, was ably presented by Mrs. Sue L. Fratis, representing the National Education association. It was voted to secure a copy of this bill and make a study of it at the next meeting, preparatory to passing resolutions favoring it and writing to Oregon's representatives in Washington, urging its passage.

ADDRESS IS INSPIRING

Miss Lottie E. Stearns of Milwaukee inspired and entertained the great audience which filled the assembly room to the doors, with her address on a program for the children of today and tomorrow, covering in a surprisingly short time the need for equal pay for equal work for women; a national eight hour law for women, wholesome amusement, which should be either informing, inspiring or refreshing; school buildings as social centers; supervised recreation, proper nourishment for the children of

the poorer districts in cities, who cannot afford to buy sufficient food. Miss Stearns' address was sprinkled with delightful humor of the most refreshing sort.

All Is Over Over There; General To Return to U. S.

Washington, Jan. 10.—(L. N. S.)—Headquarters of the American forces in France were closed on Thursday night, General William B. Conner, in command of the A. E. F. in France, today cabled the war department. General Conner left for Antwerp last night and informed the department that he expected to sail on the Northern Pacific on January 11, arriving in New York about January 18. "Everything finished according to schedule," General Conner added.

SOCIAL DISEASE AND POISON GAS EXPERT GOESEAST

Dr. Aldred Warthin, Who Spoke Before Academy of Medicine, Noted Authority Work Cited.

Dr. Aldred Scott Warthin, eminent pathologist who discovered methods of treating German poison gas, and a leading authority on social diseases, left Portland for Seattle Saturday night, en route to Ann Arbor, Mich., where he is professor of pathology at the University of Michigan. He came to Portland expressly to address the Portland Academy of Medicine on medical aspects of poison gas.

For 18 months after the Germans first launched poison gas attacks against the allied armies, Dr. Warthin, as consultant pathologist, conducted experiments for the chemical warfare service.

MEDAL IS AWARDED

The results of his Ann Arbor laboratory in treating gas led to publication of a book, now regarded as an authority, and for which the American Medical association awarded a medal to Dr. Warthin.

Besides his work in the chemical warfare service, Dr. Warthin lectured to thousands of soldiers on dangers of venereal disease.

He was perhaps the first to begin the fight on syphilis, beginning the campaign in 1895.

His experiments in social hygiene led to the discovery that many diseases not theretofore traced to sex diseases were caused by syphilis.

DISEASE IS DEADLY

"One tenth of all deaths in the United States—100,000 a year—are traceable to syphilis," Dr. Warthin said.

He was president of the American Association of Pathologists in 1908 and president of the International Medical Museum from 1910 to 1913. He has written more than 100 articles on social diseases.

While here, he met many former students, among whom are Doctors Guy Strohm, Thomas Joyce and William Knox. Miss Ida Manly, psychology teacher in Portland schools, he recognized as a classmate of 23 years ago, when both attended Indiana university. During his stay in Portland, Dr. Warthin was a guest of Dr. Knox.

9 Teachers Engaged By K. C. Night School For Ex-Service Men

Nine teachers have been selected for the night school to be opened in Portland this week for former service men by the Knights of Columbus committee on war activities, announced Saturday by John P. O'Hara, principal of the school. The night school will be held at 290 Grand avenue North, and all the course, a well as material and textbooks, will be entirely free to the former soldiers, sailors and marines who enroll. Alterations in the building have been in process for a week, and will be completed in time for the opening of the school next Thursday evening.

The teachers definitely selected thus far are: Samuel E. Tromley, accounting and salesmanship; Professor Benjamin of Washington high school, English; John E. Curtin, deputy city auditor, mechanical drawing; George A. Goodbrod, radio telegraphy; Mildred J. Marriessy, head of the normal training department of the A. N. Palmer company, will teach penmanship; Charles Deagle, typewriting; D. J. McLoughlin, arithmetic and grammar course; E. J. Morin, auto mechanics, assisted by Paul J. McGinley.

O'Hara will act as principal of the school, and will also teach classes in American history and citizenship. Registration headquarters will continue open each day, from 10 a. m. to 8 p. m., in room 203 Beck building.

First There, First To Get Choice Beds, So Mazamas Aver

PROVE PORTLAND'S POPULATION; ALL MUST BE COUNTED

Chamber of Commerce Urges Citizens to Be Enumerated and Aid Census Taker Every Way.

"It is as much your duty as a citizen to be enrolled in the census as it is to vote."

With this statement the keynote of a public appeal to assist in every way rapid and complete enumeration of Portland residents, the Chamber of Commerce committee on publicity Saturday night put new blood into the campaign to "Prove Portland's Population."

William D. Bennett, director of the federal census in Oregon's third congressional district, declared he expected the chamber's action would further help in getting everyone counted.

"Portland is known as a big, progressive city," reads the chamber's appeal, signed by O. W. Melke, chairman, and Winthrop, Hammond, William Young, S. B. Vincent, W. S. Kirkpatrick, George Hall and F. W. Vincent, composing the publicity committee.

TRUE COUNT IMPORTANT

"Everyone must be counted. Investors, manufacturers and others throughout the United States and elsewhere will be impressed and aided in their future investments and activities by the increased population of cities."

"When the census taker calls at your house he will be there to 'get you'." "Portland enjoys the reputation of being a safe town financially, industrially and commercially. But to prove her strength, Portland will have to prove her population."

"Remember, there is a reason for everything. There is a mighty good one for the census."

ABSENTEES LINED UP

Supervisor Bennett declared every effort will be made to count all absentees. Enumerators are reporting every house, whether occupied or not, and in this way a check is maintained. Families not counted by enumerators will be registered through correspondence.

The enumerators should complete their canvass by Saturday, Bennett declares. As fast as workers finish districts assigned to them they will be detailed to assist in the incomplete districts.

Slavs Attack Americans

BLOODY HATCHET TELLS STORY OF HOW YOUNG DENTIST MET HIS DEATH

Mutilated Corpse Indicates That Murder Was Committed by Man Who Nursed Grudge.

New York, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—His throat cut from ear to ear, his eyes plucked out and the skull chopped to pieces, the body of Dr. Jacob D. Hanania, 34 years old, dentist, was found lying in his office shortly before noon today. A bloody hatchet lay a few feet away. A paroled convict from Sing Sing, thought to have a grudge against the family, is suspected.

According to the young dentist's family, who lives in the apartment where his offices are, the ex-convict called at the office this morning and asked to have a tooth pulled. When the mother, Mrs. Matilda Hanania, went into the office a little later she found the body lying in a pool of blood.

On a table in the same room was an unfinished note.

A woman patient of Dr. Hanania's told the police that as she was leaving the office this morning she saw a dark man enter the dentist's private room. Members of the family say a man answering that description came on the boat to this country with the father of the young dentist eight years ago.
