

PORTLAND READY TO MEET GENERAL PERSHING SUNDAY

Three Hours Added to Stay Here Gives Opportunity for Public Parade and Some Sightseeing.

Planning to give the citizens of Portland and Oregon... very opportunity to show General John J. Pershing their appreciation for his services to America and the allies during the world war.

That the city will be forced to pay its respects to Pershing on a Sunday will not restrain Portland from showing in a fitting manner its sincere admiration for the commander in chief of the American expeditionary forces.

It is fitting that Portland—the first state to fill army quotas and war time subscriptions during the war—should be the first Western state to receive the general after the war.

THREE MORE HOURS Three hours have been added to the time of the stay of Pershing in Portland, through arrangements made by Senator George E. Chamberlain.

NOTABLES TO BE PRESENT Upon arrival at the Union station, the military party will be officially received by Governor Olcott, Mayor Baker, H. B. Van Duzer, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

LINE OF MARCH A special guard of non-commissioned officers of the army, navy and marine corps will march at the side of Pershing's car.

MOMENT TO HIMSELF Pershing's speech at the armory will be brief and he will go from that meeting to his hotel.
