

INVESTIGATION OF OUSTING OF FINLEY IS TO BE PROPOSED

Legislature Also to Be Asked to
Inquire Into Other Charges
Against Fish and Game Body.

Salem, Jan. 12.—A legislative investigation of the fish and game controversy, including the dismissal of W. L. Finley, state biologist, by the fish and game commission, is provided for in a concurrent resolution which is now ready for introduction at the special session of the legislature which convened here this morning.

The resolution provides for a special committee of five members, three from the house to be appointed by the speaker and two from the senate to be appointed by the president, who would be empowered to make a thorough investigation into the "grave and serious charges" which have been made through the press and by direct allegations by certain individuals and a view of the members of the state board of fish and game commissioners, in the administration of their duties, have been sustained and concluded by the legislature that the members of said board are dominated and controlled by the commercial fishing interests of the state and that the members of said board have failed to give the sportsmen of this state a square deal in fish and game matters and in the handling of the game protective fund.

The investigation would also cover charges "that the board of fish and game commissioners arbitrarily and without cause dismissed from its service one of its members, viz: W. L. Finley," as well as "all other matters relative to the condition of the board of fish and game commissioners." In any manner materially affecting the fish and game matters of this state.

It is proposed that the investigation be instituted immediately with a view to reporting back to the legislature before the adjournment of the special session if possible, but, failing in this, shall continue its investigation and report to the next regular session.

The committee would be empowered to subpoena witnesses and require their attendance to testify under oath. Provision is also made for necessary stenographic and clerical assistance. Traveling and other expenses necessarily incurred in the process of the investigation would be allowed the members of the committee.

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ent. Regardless of this, discussion has been evident, the people of the state have developed distrust, and a condition has grown up which demands a speedy and effective change.

In prefacing my proposals as to what I deem the most expedient and effective changes I wish to say frankly that my familiarity with the situation and with the temper of the people in all parts of the state convinces me beyond shadow of a doubt that unless some material and beneficial changes are made the life of one of our greatest industries—the salmon industry—may be placed in jeopardy. In addition the conservation of our wild game birds and fish may also suffer and their propagation may decline.

WRANGLING MUST CEASE
I have no intention or desire to enter into the merits of the various controversies which have shaken the fish and game administration. Regardless of what the merits of these controversies may be, the fact remains that bickering and wrangling have developed a hopeless situation which must be met by a new deal if we are to attain what we all desire—highest efficiency and the best results. Doubt and distrust have existed as long as such continue we will have a condition not conducive to the best welfare of the interests involved, or of the state as a whole.

To meet the situation openly and frankly, to forget old trials and tribulations may be difficult to do, but I deem it our duty in the premises to do so. For that reason I have formulated certain suggestions which I trust you will weigh carefully and consider ad-

visedly. If my suggestions may be improved upon, it is a better plan can be devised to bring about the same results. I will welcome that solution with the same sort of an open mind which I am asking all interested to have when they approach this situation for final determination.

Briefly I propose the following recommendations for your consideration:
Creation of a new commission of three members to have complete control and jurisdiction over the enforcement of all laws, over the expenditure of all money and over such other matters as may pertain to the state's administration of the commercial fishing interests of the state.

SEPARATE COMMISSION FAVORED
Creation of a new commission of five members to have complete control and jurisdiction over the enforcement of all laws, over the expenditure of all money and such other matters as may pertain to the state's administration of the wild game and fish life of the state.

For your information I will advise that a week ago I called together in Salem members of the fish and game committees of both the house and senate to discuss various phases of the fish and game controversy and if possible to formulate a bill for presentation to this session.

As a result of that meeting such a bill, I understand, will be presented to you providing, in a general way, for one commission with two separate divisions within the commission, to have control over the commercial and sportsmen's interests, respectively. With an additional member independent of the two divisions acting in the capacity of mediator.

I still feel, however, that a complete separation of the two interests would lead to more harmonious relations. But there must be give and take in a conclusion where the minds are thinking along many lines and the best compromise the legislature may effect which to my mind will bring about harmony and good results will be acceptable to the executive office.

KEEP GOVERNOR OFF COMMISSION
Whatever may be your disposition of the matter, I wish to assert positively that the chief executive of the state should not be a member of either of any fish and game commission. It is not properly in line with the sphere of his duties. It is not for the best welfare of the interests to be represented, nor is it productive of the best results. To separate the executive office from a membership of the commission is a right and proper thing to do and I assure you would be a move meeting with my hearty approval as a move dictated by discerning wisdom.

The fish and game situation is one close to the hearts of many thousands of our people; it is one of too far-reaching importance to allow petty considerations to override and curtail the people of the state of Oregon, you will enter into a discussion of this question calmly and dispassionately, with your minds removed from local and personal prejudices and with the single goal in view—the greater welfare of all the state.

WOULD CONFINE LEGISLATION
In the foregoing message I have endeavored to point out as clearly and as succinctly as possible those matters of material and essential importance which I have deemed most worthy to present to you for consideration. It will be noted that I have somewhat enlarged, in my message, upon the scope of the subjects brought to your attention in the proclamation convoking you into special session. In doing so I acted only after grave consideration, realizing full well the necessity of confining your deliberations to a brief time as it is possible to secure the best results. Those additional matters came to my attention since issuing my original proclamation and I believe should have your early and earnest attention.

With no thought of intruding on your legislative authority, I feel that this session should not be opened to miscellaneous legislation and should be confined to consideration only of the subjects I have outlined, or matters of similar urgency and importance. I am certain everyone of us feels that the expense of this session should be curtailed to the minimum and that none of us desires to extend its time a solitary day past that which is absolutely necessary to the transaction of important business.

GOVERNOR IS IMPARTIAL
In making my recommendations, I am giving you the result of my best judgment and they are submitted to you for what they are worth. What disposition may be made of them is for legislative action only and I desire to make it clear that during your consideration of legislation no influences, direct or otherwise, will come from the executive offices to endeavor to serve legislative opinion in one direction or another.

All of us are profoundly mindful of the responsibilities entailed in the tasks set before us. All of us have the aim and object in view to assist in what way we may toward continued peace, prosperity and well being of this great

interests and an arbitrator, to sit as chairman by the election of the eight members.

MEMBERS DIVIDED
What fate this measure will meet is a question. There are still many of the members who do not see reason for the change in the present system of administering the law, and who will contend for the retention of the same system, leaving it to the governor to determine whether there shall be a change in the personnel of it.

There are others led by Senator Thomas who will insist on two separate and distinct commissions, working as units. But the main bunch seems to be back of the bill which has been drafted by the committees, judging from the general talk heard about the lobby.

Already there is beginning to be rumors of who will be elected by the legislature to sit on the commission should the proposed bill be enacted and approved by the governor. For the commercial interests Frank M. Warren, Chris Schmidt of Astoria and Kendall, president of the American Can company of Portland, are the most talked of, while Stone, Fleischner and Jack, present members of the commission, with L. E. Bean and Frank Hesse, a lawyer of Astoria, are being whispered as the possible electees to represent the anglers and sportsmen.

The big road bill will be in the hands of the house committee tonight and probably will be out onto the floor in a day or so after that. It now carries the entire appropriation of \$100,000, though this may be cut to \$50,000 in the event that Chairman Dennis of the house committee discovers that the income from automobile licenses and other sources of revenue now available would not be sufficient to finance and retire a bond issue of such size as would be created by the \$100,000 added to the issues already authorized and outstanding.

The measure to fix the standard of gasoline is also in the course of making and will probably be introduced Tuesday. It is now drawn to repeat the gravity test provisions of the existing law and substitute the boiling test, with the addition of state examination and supervision as to quality, either by the Agricultural College, University of Oregon or the state bureau of mines.

There seems to be strong sentiment in both houses for the adoption of a resolution of final adjournment fixing the time for Saturday next. There are those who oppose this and in some strength, contending that they are willing to work as rapidly as possible for the sake of an early adjournment, but that they do not want to bind themselves until they see how things are going to shape up. This wing has a resolution in tow providing, in substance, that it shall require a two-thirds vote of the membership of each house to permit the introduction of any bill.

Salem, Jan. 12.—When the name of the late Senator Walter A. Dimick of Clackamas county was reached in the roll call of the upper house immediately after the body was convened in special session this morning, senators and visitors stood while President Vinton paid a tribute to the memory of the late senator whose death occurred since the adjournment of the last regular session.

A resolution by Senator I. N. Smith continuing in effect for the duration of the special session the organization as well as the rules and committee of the last regular session was adopted over the opposition of a few members who opposed the resolutions on parliamentary grounds.
