

ARMENIAN GENERAL OPENS DRIVE FOR NEAR EAST RELIEF

Walla Walla Woman One of Chief Speakers in Local Campaign To Be Launched.

A distinguished statesman, diplomat and military officer of Armenian birth, General Mesrop N. Agzapetian, former commander of a Russian division combating German trained Turks, will be one of the two leading speakers to launch the educational campaign planned to precede the drive for funds for Armenian and near East relief in Portland on Sunday.

The other speaker, a former Portland woman, is Mrs. E. T. Allen of Walla Walla, who recently returned to the United States after several years' service as a relief worker in Armenia and Persia. Mrs. Allen was one of 12 American women who narrowly escaped capture at the hands of the Turks during the siege of Urumia, Persia, in 1917.

General Agzapetian will make his first appearance at the First Baptist church, East Twentieth and Salmon streets, at 11 o'clock Sunday morning. At 3:30 p. m. he will speak at the First Methodist church, and Sunday evening at 7:30 he will address an audience at the White temple, where, if the plans of the committee are carried out, General Pershing will appear for a 15 or 20 minute informal talk, following his address at the Auditorium.

On Monday General Agzapetian will speak at the noon luncheon of the Portland chamber of commerce and will be escorted from there by Samuel C. Lancaster, state director of the Armenian relief campaign, to the Hotel Benson to address a gathering of campaign forces of the city and state, together with representatives from all the city's civic clubs. This conference has been called to discuss details of the statewide campaign to be made February 10 to 20, and General Agzapetian's address will be a feature of the program. He will leave for San Francisco at 4:30 p. m.

Mrs. Allen will speak at the First Christian church, Park and Columbia, at 11 a. m. Sunday, and in the evening will speak at the First Congregational church.

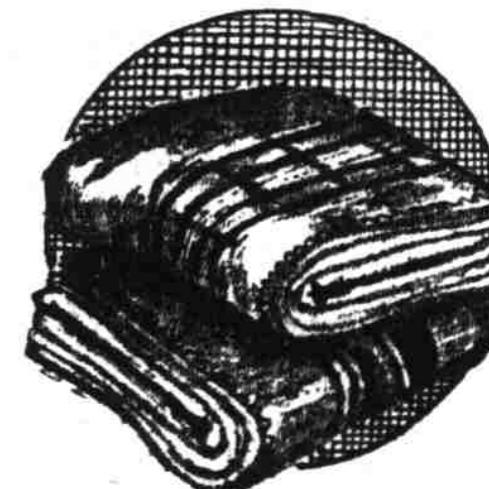
