

WOMAN SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT AWAITS FINAL SIGNATURES

Unanimous Vote Cast by Senate
For Joint Resolution; All
Needed Now Is Signature.

State House, Salem, Jan. 14.—Oregon's formal ratification of the woman suffrage amendment to the federal constitution is now complete, except for the signature of President Vinton and Speaker Seymour to the joint resolution, which will be promptly affixed.

The senate by unanimous vote at 2:45 yesterday afternoon passed the joint resolution of ratification introduced by Representative Mrs. Alexander Thompson in the house Monday morning, and to Mrs. Thompson, the only woman member of the legislature, goes the honor of sponsoring the measure through which the people of Oregon express their approval of national suffrage for women. The governor does not sign the resolution.

Senator Farrell of Multnomah who had introduced a resolution in the senate similar to that introduced by Mrs. Thompson, appeared before the senate committee on resolutions in session this afternoon and smoothed out the waters.

which were threatening to become somewhat troubled, by waiving any claims to recognition and deferring to the woman member in the consideration of the ratification measure.

Contrary to the general impression, Governor O'Connell is not required to sign the measure. Procedure requires that the resolution be returned from the senate to the house for engraving. It will then be signed by Speaker Jones and returned to the senator for the signature of President Vinton, after which it will be filed with the secretary of state. Congress will then be formally notified of Oregon's action on the amendment.

Middle West Cities Have Hundreds Sick With Some Malady

Kansas City, Jan. 14.—A mysterious stomach malady, which so far has baffled the efforts of physicians to locate a cause for it, is sweeping Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma, according to reports received here today. Topeka today reported 1000 cases. Muskogee, Okla., 800; Jefferson City, Mo., 800 cases, while there were said to be several hundred cases in Kansas City. Four deaths have occurred at Skiatook, Okla., with several hundred cases.

According to best reports the victim is afflicted with backache, headache, vomiting and other symptoms, similar to those of "flu." However, the backache is not as severe, if precautions are taken early. Dr. E. G. Brown, city health officer, says the malady is "intestinal influenza," while Dr. C. H. Lerrigoff of the Kansas state board of health believes it to be either winter cholera or winter dysentery.

Other Kansas towns besides Topeka reporting cases today were Atchison and Pittsburg. Oklahoma City also reports some cases today.

No Gas Shells Made Here Were Fired on Huns, House Is Told

Washington, Jan. 14.—(I. N. S.)—No American made gas shell was fired by the American army against the Germans, Colonel Amos A. Freis, corps of engineers, Tuesday told the house committee investigating expenditures in the war department.

The reason, Colonel Freis said, was because the American army had only 114,000 gas filled American-made shells. It was feared that if the Americans should begin using their own shells, the French, who had been supplying the American army with gas shells, would discontinue such supplies.

Delay in getting American-made gas shells to France was attributed by Colonel Freis to the belated organization of the American chemical warfare section of the army.

Coffinberry Put On Censor Board

Frank Coffinberry, formerly manager of the Orpheum theatre here, was this afternoon appointed by Mayor Baker as a member of the board of motion picture censors, vice C. M. Hill, manager of the Famous Players-Lasky corporation, who resigned his place following differences with other members of the board.

Love Dies, Wife Swings Hatchet

Fort Worth, Tex., Jan. 13.—(I. N. S.)—Mrs. Ellen Huett, 27, is held by the authorities today in connection with the murder of her 70-year-old husband, William Huett, whom she is said to have murdered with an ax when he told her his "love was growing cold." His body was found in the Huett cabin, three miles east of Riverside, Saturday, his head crushed and a blood-stained ax lying near the body. Mrs. Huett was taken into custody, but beyond repeatedly declaring that "Will told me his love was growing cold," refused to talk. Huett died late yesterday.

Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa To Be Installed At Whitman College

Whitman College, Walla Walla, Jan. 14.—Installation of the new chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, national honorary society, in Whitman college will take place next week on Tuesday and Wednesday, when the vice president of the national fraternity, F. L. Sheperdson, LL. D., of Springfield, Ill., will arrive to conduct the installation exercises. He will be assisted by the Rev. Frederick Kentor, D. D., of Tacoma, Wash., and President Stephen B. L. Penrose of Whitman college.

Six honorary members, including three of the college faculty, will be taken into the fraternity at this time. Phi Beta Kappa graduates will be presented to Professors W. D. Lyman, department of history; B. F. Brown, physics department; and Helen A. Peppoon, professor of Latin, and also to Bishop Frederick W. Keator, Dr. E. E. Shaw and Judge Mackay F. Goss.

De Curtin had not regained consciousness this morning.

Arrow Ambulance company cars carried all of the injured to the Good Samaritan hospital.
