MUNICIPAL PLANT TO DO MOST OF PAVING IN CITY COMING YEAR

Arrangements Made for Taxpayers to Pay on Time Instead Of Cash.

The municipal paving plant will handle the greater part of the paving outlined for the present year, according to Commissioner Barbur, in charge of the public works department, and R. S. Dulin, in charge of the paving plant. Authorization for the purchasing agent to advertise and receive proposals for furnishing the largest amount of asphaltic cement, approximately 1000 tons, was granted by the city council Wednesday. Arrangements will be made which allow the city to receive the material in quantities of 300 tons at a time. Barbur states he has completed arrangements with various banks for financing the work outlined. This will allow benefited property owners to pay for the work on time payments. Barbur points out that such an arrangement will doing the work-that of making prop erty owners pay cash.

Numerous petitions are before the city at present asking for pavements to be laid. Barbur and Dulin are uncertain whether the municipal plant can handle all the work that has been placed before it. 


