

DEMOCRATS TIED FOR LEADERSHIP

Hitchcock and Underwood Are in
Deadlock in Contest to Suc-
ceed Senator Martin.

Washington, Jan. 15.—(U. P.)—
Senate Democrats were deadlocked
today over the choice of a floor
leader to succeed the late Senator
Martin.

With the vote between Senators
Hitchcock and Underwood a tie, the
Democratic caucus broke up shortly
after noon with no date set for an-
other attempt to elect a leader. The
caucus adjourned subject to call by
Hitchcock and Underwood, who in the
meantime will attempt to break the
deadlock.

Refusal of Hoke Smith of Georgia to
vote for either candidate caused the
deadlock.

There were 48 senators present. With
Smith refusing to vote, the Hitchcock
and Underwood factions each had 21
votes. Senators Swanson, Johnson,
South Dakota, and Smith, Arkansas,
were absent.

Young Indian Who Shot and Killed His Father Is Sought

Yakima, Wash., Jan. 15.—Indian po-
lice are helping the deputies in the
sheriff's office to scour the reservation
to locate Columbus Tule, young Indian,
who, Saturday, shot and killed his
father, David Tule, following a quar-
rel over matters pertaining to their
farming operations on the reservation.
Tule mounted his horse and rode away
following the shooting.

to meet General John J. Pershing when
he arrives in Portland Sunday are to
report at headquarters in the Chamber
of Commerce at 11:30 o'clock Sunday
morning, so assignments to automobiles
and distribution of official badges may
be made, according to a notice sent out
by the chamber this morning.

All major arrangements are com-
plete for the reception of the distin-
guished visitor and the various com-
mittees are working on details. Per-
shing will arrive at 12:30 o'clock on
O-W train No. 5.

Arrangements have been made by the
general committee to reserve five seats
on the Auditorium stage for five repre-
sentatives of the American War Moh-
ters.

At the Army only members of the
reception committee, wearing the offi-
cial badge will be admitted in addition
to ex-service men. The American Leg-
ion pin or army discharge will be the
requirements for admission of the ex-
service man.

Reservations for the banquet at the
Chamber of Commerce main dining
room are being made rapidly and al-
ready nearly one-third of the seats are
taken. Reservations are being made at
\$4 per plate on the seventh floor of the
Oregon building.

Plans for Extraditing Former
German Emperor Are Subject
of Conference.

Paris, Jan. 15.—(U. P.)—The big
three this afternoon, meeting in se-

the former kaiser, it was learned

sador, and Baron Matsui, the Japan-
ese representative, will join them at
4 o'clock when the Hungarian dele-
gation will be handed their peace
treaty.

company, whose logs are shipped in
from the mountains, has been forced
to suspend operations because of its
inability to obtain cars. Manager Ross
reports that he is compelled to refuse
many profitable orders. The condition
is somewhat puzzling to Albany resi-
dents, who see strings of cars come
from the Yaquina branch loaded with

the finest grade of spruce logs, said to
have been logged by the government in
the Yaquina bay district and sold to
the paper mills for pulp wood. These
logs were sold by the Spruce Pro-
duction corporation to the Crown-
City.
