

MASTER GEORGE'S MAGIC FAILS AT DOOR OF PRISON

"Divine Healer," Dishwasher and
Cure-All Proves No Match for
Strong Arms of U. S. Statutes.

Yellow jaundice, dreaded by
scores, is nothing more serious than
a stubbed toe since Master George
Pfadenhauer, self-styled divine healer,
dishwasher by trade and cure-
all by desire, was arrested Thursday
evening by federal officials.

"Master" George has a positive
cure for yellow jaundice—its value
is attested by those who have tried
it. Here it is:

"Put the shamy of the nightgown in
the stovepipe."

Nine thousand ill, all the work of
arch witches, and a cure for every one,
were discovered by the arrest of Pfaden-
hauer, dishwasher in an East Morris-
town street restaurant, who is charged
with making the mistake of laying
claim to divine powers through the
United States Navy.

A complaint charging Master George
with using the name of a grand through
the circulation of his booklet "Divine
Healing," at \$1 a copy, has been pre-
sented to the grand jury.

George, through spells of dishwash-
ing at 75 cents a day, is said to have
sold hundreds of copies of his "heal-
ing" booklet, in which he asserts he
has made numerous astounding cures
in everything from boils to nightmare
and from cramps to yellow jaundice.

Here are some of the remedies offered
by Master George in the booklet that
caused his arrest:

"Fever. Read the last verse of the
ninetieth psalm and the ninety-first
psalm seven times, with a suitable
prayer in the name of El Schaddai. Call
the three angels mentioned in this work
before. Boil an egg very hard, peel it,
write upon the egg Aha, Mahy, Froha.
Eat hot in three bites. This has healed
a case of cramps, chills and fever in
one treatment."

AVANT, CHILLS!

"Magical remedy for chills: Proceed
to a dog tree (unknown to anybody),
take a piece of twine, make some knots
in the twine around the tree, one for
every chill you have. After making
thus a few knots, then make one knot
for the chill to come. Do this shortly
before the chills commence."

"Liver grown. If a child is liver
grown, put it through a horse collar
three times backward, massage with
warm goose fat; if not obtainable, take
chicken fat or the next to it."

"How to recover stolen goods: Take a
fresh laid hen's egg, in the name of the
thief tie a string of green silk around it

Witchcraft, Master George avers, is
the cause of all the world's ill. The
black art is everywhere, bewitching in-
fluences permeate every life, and the
devil is in everyone.

"The devil doesn't like me very well,
because in every battle I had with him
he always came out loser," George
writes—at \$1 a booklet. "The devil's greatest help,
is ignorance," Master George declares.
"False prophets find followers by the
million, and most people let others do
the thinking for them instead of think-
ing for themselves."

"As far as I am concerned, personally,
all my healing is done through Jesus and
his angels."

The three good angels upon whom
George calls for all his cures are Itum,
Otum and Utum—very good friends of
his, he declares.

Approval of his teachings comes from
many points on the coast and in the
West, letters held by Pfadenhauer
show. Repeat orders for his ludicrous
book let are many, and many of his
cures were "approved" in testimonials
of those who had tried them.

Hood River Forks
Closed Until June
Each Year by Order

Upon petition of residents of Park-
dale and Mount Hood, Or., members of
the board of the Oregon fish and game
commission at their regular meeting in
Salem Wednesday decided upon the closing
of the three forks of Hood river
until June 1, each year, and passed an
order to that effect, according to F. N.
Brown, chief clerk of the commission.

The petition claimed that fishermen
took during the early months of the
year many spawning fish, with the re-
sult that the commission's work of re-
plenishing the stock of Hood river was
greatly nullified. The order closes the
east and west forks above their junction
and the middle fork above the junction
with the east fork.

Approved in Astoria

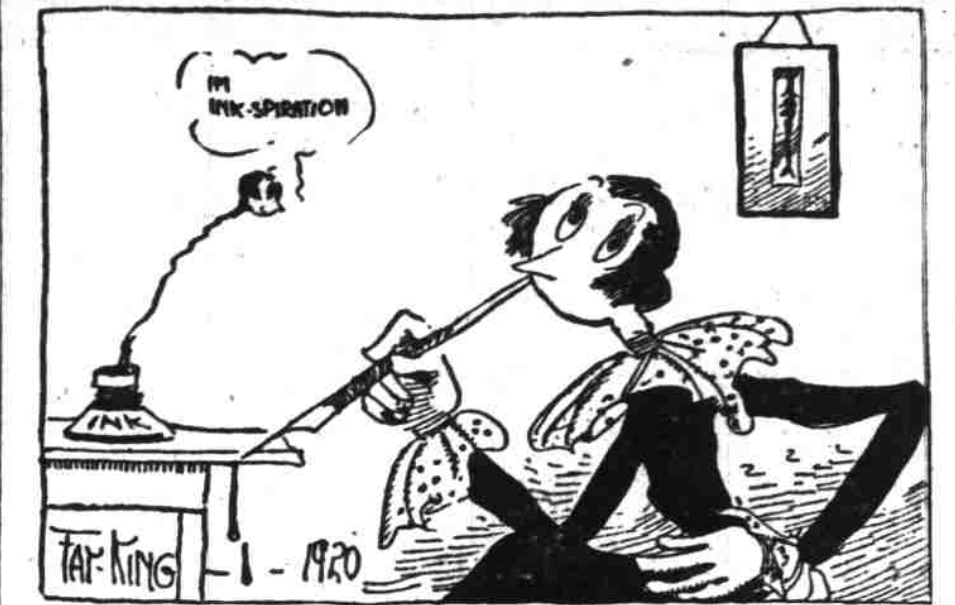
Astoria, Jan. 15.—At the special elec-

INSURANCE COMPANY MAY COVER ORIGINAL OREGON TERRITORY

Marked Growth of Business
Prompts President's Proposal
for Expansion Coming Year.

Expansion of the operations of the
Oregon Life Insurance company to cover
Washington, Idaho and part of Mon-
tana, embodied in the original Oregon
territory, was proposed by President A.
L. Mills at the annual luncheon of offi-
cers and salesmen of the company at
the Imperial hotel Thursday noon. The
company was organized 14 years ago
and has been writing life insurance ex-
clusively in Oregon.

Total new business written during
1919 amounted to \$6,598,000, according
to the president's report, being an in-
crease of \$2,000,000 over the previous
year. The total amount of insurance
in force exceeds \$20,000,000; assets
amount to over \$2,000,000 and the com-
pany's reserve increased from \$1,390,-
000 to \$1,682,000.

In his annual address President Mills
expressed the belief that business con-

ditions in the country would pass
through a period of recession during
1920. It would be impossible to continue
at the present high industrial tension,
he said. "In this slowing up process
Oregon and the Pacific coast will be
the last section of the country affected,"
said Mr. Mills.

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MOTHER KILLED HER DAUGHTER, CONFESSES SON

Mrs. Tabor Alleged to Have Ad-
ministered Chloroform to Pre-
vent Birth of Child.

Paw Paw, Mich., Jan. 16.—(I. N. S.)—Mrs. Sarah Tabor, 80 years old,
will be brought to trial for the mur-
der of her daughter, Maude, it was
said by the authorities here today,
following the confession of the aged
woman's son, Walter O. Tabor, that
his mother killed her daughter be-
cause she "didn't want Maude's baby
to be born."

The birth of the child, Tabor's con-
fession said, would have made another
heir to the Tabor estate, which was
valued at \$40,000. An overdose of
chloroform was administered and the
body then put into an iron-bound trunk

and secreted in the Tabor cellar. That
was in 1918. More than three years
later it was found by Mrs. Florence
Critchlow, another member of the Tabor
family, and Mrs. Sarah Tabor and
Walter were brought back from Ore-
gon, where they had gone after Maude's
death.
