

WATERPOWER BILL IS PASSED WITH THE SMOOT AMENDMENT

Utah Senator Wins Fight, While Lenroot Conservation Forces Are Beaten by Vote of 52-18.

Washington, Jan. 16.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—The Smoot theory of water power legislation prevailed over the Lenroot idea in final clashes over the Jones bill Thursday, resulting in passage of the measure substantially as reported by the senate committee, with a vote of 52 to 18.

Prior to this, Smoot forces, by a vote of 44 to 22, succeeded in restoring the senate amendment which limits the federal charge for power developed on public lands to 25 cents per horsepower, which the senate had rejected on a previous vote.

Another principal difference was over provisions of the recapture clause, which, Lenroot declares, amount to granting perpetual licenses to power corporations and gives away forever these natural resources.

VETO MAY BE USED
This result follows, he asserts, because the government will not take over works at the end of 50 years and will not be able to lease to any applicant because of provisions for payment of severance damages compelling renewal of lease from year to year to original corporations.

Lenroot is confident that the president will veto the bill if it passes with the senate amendments. The fight will now be carried to the conference committee of the two houses. Jones of Washington, Nelson of Minnesota, Bankhead of Alabama, Smoot of Utah, Fall of New Mexico, and Myers of Montana were named conferees for the senate, all of them strong partisans of the senate amendments.

LINEUP OF SENATORS
House conferees probably will be each of Wisconsin, Elnott of Oregon, Haugen of Iowa, Hamilton of Michigan, Sims of Tennessee and Ferris of Oklahoma, who are expected to stand just as strongly for the house bill, under which the federal waterpower commission would be granted full discretion to fix charges and not be so closely restricted on recapture.

Those voting against the bill were Borah, Gore, Gronna, Harris, Harrison, Kenyon, Kirby, Lenroot, McCormick, McKellar, Norris, Nugent, Reed, Sheppard, Stanley, Trammell, Walsh of Massachusetts, and Williams. Both Oregon

senators were recorded for it, as were all others from the Far West who were present except the two from Idaho.

GRAND JURY CALLS FOUR GROCERS FOR QUERIES ON SUGAR

One of Men Said to Have Criticized Government for Activity in Trying to Regulate Prices.

Four grocery retailers who are accused by United States Attorney Humphreys of getting undue profits through the sale of sugar, were before the federal grand jury most of this morning. The future status of their cases will be made known through the jury's report, probably Saturday.

One of the men arraigned is said to have criticized before the grand jury the government's price control activity, declaring that the law which prevented a dealer from interpreting for himself what constitutes a fair margin of profit is vicious.

Jobbers and wholesalers who persist in forcing retailers to purchase two sacks of cane sugar at \$15.90 for each sack of cheaper beet sugar at \$11.27 a sack will be prosecuted under the food control act, Humphreys said Thursday after a conference with W. K. Newell, food administrator.

Responsibility on Jobber

Several weeks ago arrests were made in cases where retailers were accused of selling sugar above the retail price set by the food control act. Thursday morning the responsibility for the sugar situation was shifted to the wholesalers and jobbers, who were accused of unfair practice in forcing the retailers to accept the higher price sugar if they wanted the cheaper beet sugar.

Humphreys says there is no reason why beet sugar should be sold only with a double quantity of cane sugar. He believes it only a device to "work off" the higher priced stuff now arriving.
