

WOMEN ASSIST IN DEMOCRAT PLANS FOR CONVENTION

Mrs. Mary Foy of Pasadena and Mrs. George Bass of Chicago Members of Committee.

New York, Jan. 17.—(I. N. S.)—For the first time in the history of the party, women aided the committee on arrangements for the forthcoming Democratic national convention to shape its preparations for the big event, at its meeting here today.

There are two women on the committee, Miss Mary E. Foy of Pasadena, Cal., as the national committee woman from California, and Mrs. George Bass, chairman of the women's bureau in the Democratic national committee of Chicago. Both were in attendance.

One of the chief things before the committee is the selection of a temporary chairman for the convention, which is to be held in San Francisco on June 28 of this year—to make the campaign "keynote" speech.

It is probable that the better part of the afternoon will be taken up with matters affecting the transportation and accommodations of the delegates to the convention, as well as the city's hotels and rooming facilities and prospects will be made for the consideration of the committee.

George F. Mara, an attorney of Bridgeport, Conn., is to be sent to San Francisco by the committee to establish headquarters for those directing the arrangements for the convention. It was announced. He will make an exhaustive survey of the situation and report at length to Homer S. Cummings, chairman of the national committee.

On his way to the city, Mr. Mara will stop over in St. Louis and confer with members of that city's chamber of commerce and with other local party workers, who aided in preparing for the 1916 convention of the party, which was held there. The information thus obtained will be used by Mr. Mara in perfecting the convention arrangements upon his arrival in San Francisco.

The Dalles, Jan. 17.—Police Chief Frank Heister today ordered his patrolmen to kill without question all dogs loose on the city streets without muzzle or not led by chains, as the result of a rabies epidemic.

Odessa Falls Before Bolshevik Armies, Washington Hears

Washington, Jan. 17.—(U. P.)—The Bolsheviks have captured the important city of Odessa, on the Black sea, the state department was advised today by Polish authorities in Bucharest.

The outskirts of the city are occupied by the Red forces and the Bolshevik troops are entering the town, according to the advices.

There are said to be approximately 100,000 refugees and inhabitants in Odessa. British troops have been carrying out some of the refugees and a French ship is similarly engaged.

Wade Deep Snow to Arrest Deer Slayers

St. Helens, Jan. 17.—As the result of a storm which lasted several days and took them through deep snow, Deputy Game Warden Ed Clark, William Brown and Charles (Dix) Greaves, Victor Bergeson and Fritz and William Brown, brothers, on charges of killing deer out of season. They caught the three in Soladon valley, near Vernonia. The men pleaded guilty and were fined \$25 and costs each and each paid \$5 to recover his gun. The hides and some venison were seized.

Class A—Exemption \$1000

Applies to a single person not the head of a family, a divorced person without dependent child living alone, a single person living with husband or wife, when \$2000 exemption is divided between them on their separate returns.

Class B—Exemption \$2000

Applies to a married person living with husband or wife and without other dependents where no separate return claiming all or a part of the \$2000 exemption is filed by the other; also to a head of a family.

Class C—Exemption \$2500

Applies to a head of a family and to a married person living with husband or wife and having one dependent (other than husband or wife), if such dependent is under 18 years of age or is incapable of support because mentally or physically defective.

Class D—Exemption \$3000

The same as Class C, except there must be two dependents other than husband or wife.

Class E—Exemption \$3500

The same as class C, except there must be three dependents other than husband or wife.

Class F—Exemption \$4000

The same as Class C, except there must be four dependents other than husband or wife.

Members of a partnership or stockholders of a personal service corporation make individual returns and pay at rates for individuals on their proportionate share of the profits of the partnership or personal service corporation whether distributed or not, and, in addition, on any personal gains outside of such business.

Individuals are entitled to deduct from their net income, before computing income tax, donations made to corporations organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific or educational purposes or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals or to the special fund authorized by section 7 of the vocational rehabilitation act to an amount not in excess of 15 per cent of the taxpayer's net income as computed without the benefit of his deduction, providing such donations are actually made on or before December 31, 1919.

Individuals are also allowed to deduct from their net income before computing income tax all city, county and state taxes actually paid during the year (except special assessments) also all taxes on luxuries, amusement, and transportation, club dues, etc. (except income and surtaxes) paid during the year 1919.

Also bonuses paid to employees if same are in a reasonable amount for services actually rendered during calendar year 1919—Christmas gifts pure and simple are not deductible.

Net income is gross income from all sources less allowable deductions and credits, not including living expenses.

Democratic Wheel

Horse of Jackson Would Be Delegate

Medford, Jan. 17.—J. Frank Wort, man, farmer and banker of Medford, and long a Democratic wheel horse in Jackson county, has announced his candidacy as one of the 10 state delegates from Oregon to the Democratic national convention at San Francisco. And he will have the solid party backing from this county. The argument will be used in his behalf that Jackson county for many years has returned a good Democratic majority in every presidential campaign.

A movement has been started, backed by the farm bureau, to raise by popular subscription a fund of \$1200 to aid in maintaining the county home demonstration office, virtually abolished recently when the county court refused to make financial provision in aid of its maintenance. The women's club and banks and commercial organizations of both Medford and Ashland will aid.

NEW KLAMATH FALLS HOSPITAL WILL BE COMPLETED FEB. 15

Building and Equipment Are Modern and Will Cost Over \$100,000 When Finished.

Klamath Falls, Jan. 17.—With the completion of the Warren Hunt hospital and pharmacy, on or about February 15, Klamath Falls will have a hospital as well equipped as any on the Pacific coast. The building is three stories in height, of pressed brick and tile construction with a concrete foundation. When complete, including its equipment, it will cost approximately \$100,000.

The general scheme of the hospital is unique in that it embodies the "group medicine" plan. The first floor will house general business and physicians' offices, pharmacy and reception rooms. Provision is made for the care of 20 medical cases on the second floor and all surgical cases will be taken care of on the third floor. Three operating rooms are located directly over the surgical wards.

Each floor is equipped with a special diet kitchen. The building is heated from the new city steam plant. Fixtures and interior finish throughout the building are of mahogany. A modern motor ambulance will be one of the features of the concern.

Only patients of Dr. Warren Hunt, Dr. L. T. Truax and Dr. G. A. Massey, owners of the building, will be admitted for treatment. Frank M. Robinson is manager of the hospital pharmacy and pharmaceutical laboratory.

DALLAS LEGION IS DEFEATED BY LOCAL HOOP AGGREGATION

Multnomah Guards' Early Lead Prevents Defeat; Visitors Are Strong in Second Half.

VERY poor umpiring might have accounted for the defeat of the famous Dallas basketball team, flying the colors of the Dallas post of an American legion, at the hands of the Multnomah Guards, Saturday night, had not real basketball playing accounted in part for a lead of 12 points established by the fast working local team in the first half of a lively contest. They held the long end of a 20 to 17 score.

The body was taken to Portland for cremation. She died on Wednesday, Jan. 14, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. L. Collins, 1412 1/2 street, Dallas, Texas. She was a pioneer of 1853, crossing the plains by ox team. Her father, Lewis Ray Kimes, was drowned while the emigrant train was crossing the Missouri river.

On New Year's day, 1867, she married Judge Collins at Buena Vista, Polk county, residing in that county for the remainder of her life. Of her 10 children, seven survive, among them Dwan Collins, well-known Portland newspaper man. The others are: Edgar L. of San Pedro, Cal.; Frank W. of San Francisco; Mrs. E. E.
